

PWBA Hall of Fame Welcomes Hulsenberg, Macpherson, Conners

WICHITA, Kan. – The Professional Women's Bowling Association Hall of Fame inducted its first class in 16 years on Wednesday night before an audience that featured hall of fame members and current PWBA Tour players.

The induction ceremony

was held in conjunction with the 2019 United States Bowling Congress (USBC) Queens, the first major of the PWBA Tour season, that starts Thursday morning at Northrock Lanes. BowlTV.com provided live coverage of the ceremony held at the Wichita Marriott.

The 2019 PWBA Hall of Fame class of Wendy Macpherson and Leanne Hulsenberg, both inducted for Performance, and Donna Conners, selected in

the Meritorious Service/Builder category, was the first class to join the hall of fame since 2003.

Hulsenberg captured 26 PWBA titles from 1987 through 2002, including the 1999 USBC Queens, and won her second major title at the 2011 U.S. Women's Open. She is third on the PWBA all-time titles list behind Lisa Wagner (32) and Aleta Sill (31) and made more than 100 appearances on television.

The 1987 Bowling Digest Rookie of the Year, when she won three titles, Hulsenberg became the first bowler to capture back-to-back PWBA Player of the Year honors in 1990 and 1991. She was selected to the Bowlers Journal International All-American Team 18 times, including 12 selections to the first team, and was named Women's Pro Bowler of the Year three times (1990, 1991, 2002) by Bowling Digest.

She was inducted into the USBC Hall of Fame in 2008.

Meanwhile, next door, Vito beat Stephens 236-235 to move




Joe Vito and Joe Lecroy

Just Paying Attention

Last week news broke about the retirement of longtime Wichita State bowling Coach Gordon Vadakin after 46 years of coaching, after starting one of the most recognizable collegiate bowling programs.

That got me to think, what would it take to start a new program today, with both a men's club team and a NCAA Division Two women's team? Named as head bowling coach one year ago this week for Upper Iowa University in Fayette, Iowa, Dr. Nichole DePaul-Miller has crisscrossed the country attending collegiate clinics while visiting and signing recruits for the Peacocks' inaugural 2019-2020 season.

I have known Nichole since her days bowling for Northern Illinois University where it was easy to see her passion and dedication for the sport. Before shoeing up at the USBC Queens last week, the former Kegel Foundation staffer, USBC staffer, chemistry teacher, and current PWBA touring player recounts to JPA some of what's happened in these first twelve months of the program.

This week in the first of

a two-part interview, Coach DePaul-Miller talks about this unique journey of starting a collegiate bowling program literally from the ground floor.

JPA: What were some of the things that the UIU athletic director know and didn't know about competitive collegiate bowling?

Coach DePaul-Miller: My athletic director knows a lot about bowling as his family has bowling background. Rick Hartzell felt bowling was the next big thing happening as high school bowling has increased its participation in the state of Iowa and surrounding states of Illinois, Wisconsin, and Minnesota.

However, the amount of traveling the teams will have to do to bowl tournaments (women will bowl ten tournaments, men will bowl at least twelve tournaments), as well as, the length of the bowling season is the biggest thing not known.

JPA: What have been some of the pleasant surprises you've experienced in this first year thus far?

DePaul-Miller: The recruit-

ing process has been smooth for me at Upper Iowa. With the connections I have in the bowling industry, I have been able to attract quality youth bowlers from across the United States. Both teams have depth and experience to be ready as a competitive program in the first year of our existence. Also, we have had support from various brands in the industry to get us ready for our first year of competition.

JPA: How easy/difficult was it to get corporate/industry sponsors to sign on? Any outside bowling sign, as well?

DePaul-Miller: Being in the industry full time and on staff with several brands, I have the support of each brand for my teams. Also, we have several alumni from Upper Iowa support our teams through donations and marketing the teams because they are bowlers. Per NCAA rules, I am not allowed to publicly market Brunswick/DV8 and Genesis for the women's team. I can for the men's team. They will be sponsored by Brunswick and Genesis.

JPA: There are a number of college coaches on the PWBA Tour. What comments and support have you received from other players whom are also coaches?

DePaul-Miller: I've received a lot of support from players on the PWBA tour after the announcement of my hiring for Upper Iowa. Some advice given to me included trusting the process of recruiting to create the positive culture for the teams. Several friends are coaches in D1 schools with national championships to junior colleges winning the NJCAA championships. By having colleagues on the tour with me, we have time to talk about what is going on

with our teams and find out if we are attending the same recruiting camps.

Next week, Coach DePaul-Miller discusses the roller-coaster of recruiting, questions from parents and what this has meant for her career.

Women's Championships Weekly Glance

 (For May 9 - 15, 2019)- New leaders emerge in three Diamond Division events at 2019 USBC Women's Championships With the United States Bowling Congress Queens taking over Northrock Lanes in Wichita, Kansas, this week, the Diamond Division at the USBC Women's Championships saw new names at the top of the team, doubles and all-events standings.

Defending Diamond Team champion Golden Approach Pro Shop of Dayton, Ohio, moved back into the lead May 12 with a 2,682 total on games of 811, 879 and 992. Ballard vs. the Big C of Keller, Texas, had taken the lead earlier in the day with 2,663.

Team USA's Shannon Pluhowsky led the charge for Golden Approach Pro Shop, finishing with a 299 game for a 714 series. She was joined by Australia's Rebekah Martin (658) and Rebecca Whiting (657), along with new team-

mate Ann Coleman (653).

Golden Approach Pro Shop claimed the 2018 title with Kelly Belzeski as its fourth member.

Tournament newcomers Lauren Pate of Inver Grove Heights, Minnesota, and Jordan Newham of Aurora, Illinois, finished strong to take the lead in Diamond Doubles with 1,417 on May 14.

Pate led the way with games of 221, 264 and 289 for 774 series, and Newham added 179, 246 and 218 for 643.

Pate, a recent graduate of McKendree University, rolled a double in the 10th frame, while Newham, who just graduated from Vanderbilt University, converted a 4 pin to sneak past Jessica Aiezza of Mechanicville, New York, and Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York, who had taken the lead moments before with 1,411.

During the same squad, USBC Hall of Famer Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, took

the lead in Diamond All-Events with a 2,211 nine-game total.

Kulick used sets of 775 in doubles, 737 in singles and 699 in team to become the sixth player in tournament history to surpass the 2,200 mark for all-events, and she took the top spot from Colombia's Maria José Rodriguez, who also was on the same squad and held the lead momentarily with 2,196.

Four bowlers roll perfect games at Northrock Lanes

In addition to the big scores in the Diamond Division, four bowlers were able to connect for perfect games during a three-day stretch at Northrock Lanes.

Amanda Flood of Brandon, Florida, was the first to roll a 300 game at the 2019 USBC Women's Championships, and the perfect effort came during her singles set May 13.

Flood started singles a with 245 game, before rolling 12 consecutive strikes in Game 2. She finished with 244 for a 789 series, which is second in Diamond Singles.

Beverly Gonzalez of Sierra Vista, Arizona, leads with 798.

Just hours after Flood's perfect game, USBC Hall of Famer Jeanne Naccarato of Tacoma, Washington, made history as she rolled her second career 300 at the Women's Championships during her final game of





Shocker Bowling Coaching Staff Changes: Lewis & Harris Elevated, Rick Steelsmith Hired

WICHITA, Kan. – Head coach Gordon Vadakin announced his retirement earlier this afternoon. Because of that announcement, the Shocker Bowling program is pleased to announce exciting changes in the coaching staff.

Current assistant coach Mark Lewis takes on the newly created Director of the Bowling Program position while current Marketing, Development and Operations Coordinator Holly Harris has been elevated to the Women's Head Bowling Coach. The Shockers are also pleased to announce the addition of Shocker alumni Rick Steelsmith as the Men's Head Bowling Coach.

Steelsmith had an illustrious collegiate career followed by a successful professional career on the Professional Bowlers Association tour. Rick started his collegiate career at Vincennes University where he was a two-time NCBCA First Team All-American along with the 1985 NJCAA National Team and Singles Champion. He obtained his degree in 1985 in Bowling Center Management from Vincennes and then came to Wichita State. While at Wichita State, he was again an NCBCA First Team All-American twice, becoming the first ever player to be a four-time First Team All-American. Steelsmith was

also named the 1987 NCBCA Most Valuable Player. Rick was part of the 1987 national championship team as well. He received his degree in Business Management from Wichita State in 1989.

While in college, Steelsmith won the 1987 ABC Masters tournament. At the time, it wasn't an official PBA tour stop and does not count as a PBA title. Steelsmith joined the PBA 1988 and earned the PBA Rookie of the Year award to jumpstart his 20-year career on tour. He earned two PBA titles – 1991 PBA Doubles in Buffalo, N.Y. and the 1997 PBA National Championship in Toledo, Ohio – his first major. Steelsmith was voted the PBA Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award in 1997.

Along with collegiate and professional success, Steelsmith had international success. He was a member of Team USA in 1987 and traveled to Helsinki, Finland to compete in the FIQ World Championships. He won two gold medals, one silver medal and two bronze medals. He bowled 300, the first perfect game in FIQ World Championships history. Fast forward to 2014 where he was a member of the senior Team USA and competed in the Tournament of the Americas. There, he won six gold medals.

Outside of professional bowling, Steelsmith owns a multitude of other titles and accomplishments, including: 1988

ABC Championships all-events and team all-events titles (with Vadakin and Lewis), 1986 Bowlers Journal Amateur All-American team, 1987 Bowlers Journal Amateur Bowler of the Year, 1987 World Bowling Writers Bowler of the Year, 1987 Bowling Digest Bowler of the Year and 1987 Bowling Magazine First Team All-American. Rick was inducted into the NJCAA Bowling Hall of Fame in 1998, the Greater Wichita Bowling Association Hall of Fame in 1998, the Kansas State Men's Bowling Association Hall of Fame in 2001, the Wichita Sports Hall of Fame in 2008 and USBC Hall of Fame in 2013.

As good of a player as Steelsmith is, he is also one of the best coaches in the country. He has been the Head Teaching Professional with the JOMA Bowling Company and the Director of Youth Development at West Acres Bowl for the last ten years. He has assisted Wichita State in various national tournament appearances and as an associate coach. During the fall of 2013, Steelsmith served as an assistant coach while Mark Lewis was away with a family matter.

Steelsmith has coached multiple Kansas State High School Champions and Wichita State Selected Team players. More recently, he's coached Kansas native Brandon Bonta, who was named to the Dexter

“Gordon was my coach during my collegiate career at Wichita State years ago. meeting all of the student-athletes and becoming a part of the Shocker Bowling team.”

“When Gordon began talking about retirement, there really was only one person we could think of who we wanted to bring on, and that’s Rick Steelsmith,” Lewis said. “He’s been with us at a few national tournaments, he’s served as an associate coach and he’s bowled for us. He understands the program and is truly one of the best coaches in the world. We are lucky to have him join us.”

Lewis has been with the program officially for over twenty years and served as a volunteer assistant coach for ten years prior to that. He’s been a part of ten national championships. In between his time as a volunteer and coming on full-time, he coached in the United Arab Emirates for two years and had success as a player also. He was the 1988 United States

Amateur Champion and won a series of bowl-offs to represent the United States in the 1988 Olympic Games, where bowling was held as an exhibition sport. He’s won four USBC Open Championships Eagles. He’s a member of the Great Plains USBC Hall of Fame, the Kansas State USBC Hall of Fame, the USBC Hall of Fame and the Wichita Sports Hall of Fame. He attended and bowled for Wichita State from 1978-1981 and was part of the first men’s national championship team at Wichita State in 1980. Lewis was hired full-time in 1999 as the assistant coach.

Harris bowled for Wichita State from 2010 until 2014. She was a two-time NCBCA All-American and an Academic All-American. Harris earned spots on Junior Team USA 2012 and 2013 along with Team USA in 2014. She earned her undergraduate degree in mathematics in 2014. She worked as a student employee beginning in 2012 and was hired full time as the Marketing, Development and Operations Coordinator in July of 2014. In May 2018, while working full time, Harris obtained her master’s degree

in Sport Management. For the last three seasons, Harris has worked alongside Mark Lewis, assisting him with the women’s team.

“This program is so very special to me and I love it so much. I’m thankful for the opportunity I’ve been given and I can’t wait to see where we take this thing. Sharing my passion and love for this program is always something I’ve enjoyed and I can’t wait to continue to do that,” Harris said.

“I’m excited for the next step forward for Shocker Bowling,” Lewis said. “Bringing in Rick Steelsmith to our coaching staff is an awesome addition. Rick brings a wealth of knowledge

and experience that current and future players will be able to learn from to improve their games. Holly Harris has been a valuable member of our program since finishing her time as a player on our women’s team. She has shown over the last few years that she is ready for an even bigger role as the Women’s Head Coach. I look forward to working with Coach Steelsmith and Coach Harris as we continue to have our players and the program strive for maximums.”

The new positions for Harris and Lewis will start June 1st while Steelsmith’s first day with Shocker Bowling is June 11th.

players who advanced to the Round of 8.

Barrett, the No. 14 seed, won the first game of the Round of 16 match 236-222 over No. 3 seed Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, who won his 39th and 40th career tour titles back-to-back earlier this season, but the PBA Hall of Famer came back in the second game by starting with the first five strikes to beat Barrett 236-174 forcing a ninth and 10th frame roll-off.

Both players tied in the roll-off, 40-40, which then sent the match into a one-ball roll-off. Barrett won the match with a strike when Duke left a 6 pin on his shot.

“I was comfortable in the first game, but I knew it was going to be a challenge in the second game when Norm started with the first five,” Barrett said. “I could feel it start to go away from me toward the end of the second game, but since I was out of it at that point, I changed to a different ball in the eighth frame and then used the remaining frames to figure out what I should do.

“I still wasn’t real comfortable in the two-frame roll-off but managed to hang in there. When Norm got nine in the one-ball roll-off, I thought that was my opportunity and I had better take advantage of it.”

match, the No. 6-seeded Rash defeated No. 11 Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri in both games - 227-175 and 237-214 - to advance to the Round of 8.

"I had a good ball reaction in both games and was fortunate to take advantage of the opportunity I was given," said Rash, who won the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship with Matt Ogle for his 13th PBA Tour title earlier this season. "You need to fill frames anyway you can, but in the end, I felt like I only threw one bad shot.

"I was pretty much in control and Kyle was struggling in the first game," Rash added. "It came down to strong finishes in both games. Kyle's an excellent player and I didn't want to give him too much hope."

The first of two Round of 8 telecasts will air next Monday (May 20) on FS1 at 9 p.m. ET with No. 1 seed Jason Belmonte taking on No. 9 Kris Prather and No. 4 Anthony Simonsen meeting No. 21 Andres Gomez. The second Round of 8 telecast on May 27 will feature No. 7 Bill O'Neill vs. No. 15 Wes Malott and Barrett vs. Rash, which will determine the four players who will battle for the \$100,000 first prize June 1-2 with live FOX semifinal and final matches from Bayside Bowl.

Open Championships Weekly Glance

Minnesota bowler joins 100,000-Pin Club at 2019 USBC Open Championships

Michael Schmid of Arden Hills, Minnesota, reached another special milestone at the United States Bowling Congress Open Championships, where he became the 23rd member of the event's elite 100,000-Pin Club.

The 77-year-old right-hander entered the 2019 tournament needing 1,211 pins to reach the plateau, and he got there with a high-flush strike in the ninth frame of his first game of singles May 8 at the South Point Bowling Plaza.

He is the first bowler to reach the 100,000-pin mark during the 2019 tournament in Las Vegas, and he is the third competitor from Minnesota to achieve the feat, joining the late Sylvester Thiel (2005) and active participant Maynard Johnson (2014) on the list.

"This never entered my mind until a few years ago when one of my teammates mentioned I had a shot," Schmid said. "I was really glad to throw a strike to get it, rather than a washout or something. I'm so happy, but I'm glad it's over because I've been worried about it for six months. I kept thinking, 'what if I shot the lowest all-events possible and didn't make it?' I'd take so much heat at home."

Schmid started his 2019 USBC Open Championships campaign May 7 with a 515 series in his team event, and he needed to knock down 696 pins during doubles and singles to

reach the mark.

He added games of 169, 209 and 178 for a 556 set in doubles, leaving him 140 pins short with three games to go. After leaving a Greek Church (4-6-7-9-10) in the seventh frame of his opening game of singles, Schmid left, and converted, a 10 pin to set up the ninth-frame excitement.

Competition came to a halt across the 60-lane South Point Bowling Plaza, as tournament director Duane Hagen immediately presented Schmid with a crystal bowling pin to commemorate his entry into the 100,000-Pin Club.

Schmid finished with games of 197, 153 and 183 for a 1,604 all-events total, bringing his career pinfall total to 100,393, a 191.2 average for more than 500 tournament games.

Late USBC Hall of Famer and eight-time Open Championships titlist Bill Lillard Sr. of Houston tops the all-time pinfall list with 124,087, toppled over 68 events from 1948-2015.

This year's Open Champion-



ships marked Schmid's 58th tournament appearance, a career that began at the 1961 event in Detroit.

Local bowler honored at South Point Bowling Plaza for 65 years of participation

Clinton Zavakos of nearby Henderson, Nevada, was the first of two bowlers who reached milestones this week at the USBC Open Championships as he became the 14th bowler in history to reach 65 years of participation on the tournament lanes.

He was recognized for his longevity May 9 and received a chevron, plaque and custom ring to commemorate the milestone.

Zavakos, an 82-year-old right-hander, also is one of 23 members of the tournament's elite 100,000-Pin Club. He entered the 2019 Open Championships 13th on the all-time pinfall list and added sets of

"In 1987, my parents took out a \$2,000 loan and gave me their minivan so I could go out on tour," said Hulsenberg, who also rolled a 300 game earlier on Wednesday at the USBC Women's Championships. "I won three titles my first year, paid them back, and that was the start of my career. One of the reasons I wanted to be part of the PWBA when it came back was not just because I love bowling, but because I believe young people need role models, since I had so many great ones when I started my career. My wish for all of the PWBA members of this era is that you have the opportunity to do what I did for so long and make as many memories as I have along the way."

Macpherson won the first of her 20 PWBA titles in 1986, capturing the U.S. Women's Open as an 18-year-old high school senior to become the youngest bowler to win the event. She joined the pro tour that summer, taking PWBA Rookie of the Year honors, and won five more majors in her career – three USBC Queens (1988, 2000, 2003) and two Sam's Town Invitational (1990, 1999) titles. She is one of only

two players, along with Mildred Ignizio, to have won the Queens three times.

When she won the Sam's Town Invitational title in 1990 at age 22, Macpherson became the youngest winner of the triple crown. She was named PWBA Player of the Year four times over a five-year stretch from 1996-2000 and was the first player to reach 100 television appearances.

She also won 10 titles on the Japanese Professional Bowlers Association Tour, was the first woman to win a Regular Division title at the USBC Open Championships with an 812 series in singles in 2006, and was inducted into the USBC Hall of Fame in 2009.

"When our tour ended in 2003, tonight's party was only a dream," Macpherson said. "My 18 years of tour life were some of my best years, and my career on tour was exactly what I had envisioned. I wanted to be a pro bowler. I wanted to be on television. I wanted to be a champion. I wanted to be one of the best."

Connors is the founder and executive director of the annual Professional Bowlers Association (PBA)/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles tournament, which celebrates its 20th anniversary this year. She has grown the

event from 32 teams to its current 160 teams, placing the focus of the event on the players and always willing to find a partner for any woman who wanted to bowl in the event.

A USBC Silver coach, the 2012 USBC Joyce Deitch Unity Award winner is a member of the Houston and Texas Bowling Halls of Fame, and won seven PWBA Regional titles.

She is co-owner of Carol Norman's Pro Shop and has done layouts and ball drillings for numerous PWBA players.

"Without the players, I don't have a pro-am, and without the pro-am, I don't have the charity," Connors said. "These players give it all and lay it all out, and I couldn't do it without them. They're just amazing, and I'm so proud of all of them. I would like to say thank you for this most awesome night and leave you with this – the cure is real, can you believe."

Anne Marie Duggan received special recognition

during Wednesday's ceremony. Duggan and Virginia Norton both were elected to the PWBA Hall of Fame in the Performance category in 2003, the year the pro women's tour ceased operations, and Duggan helped bridge the 16-year gap between the hall of fame classes.

"I would love to thank all of the people that helped me get here," Duggan said. "Because it's not just you. You don't think about that while you're doing it, but there are so many people involved in your journey."

The 2019 PWBA Hall of Fame class was selected by the PWBA Hall of Fame committee based on applications received. The committee is comprised of three PWBA Hall of Fame members, three Bowling Proprietors' Association of America (BPAA) board members, three USBC board members, and three media members.

The PWBA Hall of Fame started in 1995 to recognize outstanding competitors on the professional women's bowling tours and those who provided outstanding support of pro women's bowling off the lanes. The inaugural class was comprised of Donna Adamek, Patty Costello, Dorothy Fothergill, Mildred Ignizio, Marion Ladewig, and Betty Morris in the Performance category, LaVerne Carter, Helen Duval and Shirley Garms in Pioneer, and Georgia Veatch in the Builder category.

With the induction of Hulsenberg, Macpherson and Connors on Wednesday, the PWBA Hall of Fame now has 38 members, with 21 inducted for Performance, 10 in the Pioneer category and seven in the Meritorious Service/Builder category.

team competition.

Naccarato, a five-time Women's Championships titlist, is the only player in tournament history to have rolled multiple 300s on the championship lanes. She had started her set with games of 211 and 236 for a 747 series. Her first 300

was at the 2014 event in Reno, Nevada.

Kaidee Sutphin of Maitland, Florida, shot 300 during her first game of singles May 14. She added games of 204 and 190 for a 694 series.

USBC Hall of Famer Leanne Hulsberg of Pleasant View, Utah, was the final player to roll 300 this week, adding another accomplishment to her resume during the second game

of doubles May 15.

After starting with 188, Hulsberg improved with 300 and 259 for a 747 series, which helped her and Blair Blumenscheid of Columbus, Ohio, into third place in Diamond Doubles with a 1,409 total.

The achievement helped Hulsberg, a five-time Women's Championships titlist, join another exclusive club as she joined fellow hall of famer Dede Davidson as the only bowlers to own both a 300 game and 800 series at the event. Hulsberg rolled an 804 series at the 2007 tournament in Charlotte, North Carolina, to help her team claim the Classic Team title.

The 300 also took place on the same day Hulsberg was inducted into the Professional Women's Bowling Association Hall of Fame at the nearby Wichita Marriott.

Wyoming bowler leads Ruby Singles and Ruby All-Events Renzie Kintzler of Cheyenne, Wyoming, rolled 288 in her final game of singles May 13 to take the lead in Ruby Singles

(725) and Ruby All-Events (1,824).

Kintzler started her singles set with games of 224 and 213, before starting her final game with 10 consecutive strikes. A 10 pin on her 11th delivery halted her run at her first career perfect game.

She added sets of 597 in doubles and 502 in team to get to the lead in all-events.

Annette Miller of Roseville, California, previously held the lead in Ruby Singles with 663, and Elainea Myers of Bowie, Maryland, topped the Ruby All-Events standings with 1,802.

Iowa bowler celebrates 50 years at Women's Championships

Fran Smith of Marshalltown, Iowa, was surrounded by family and friends as she celebrated her 50th appearance at the USBC Women's Championships.

The 81-year-old was welcomed into the tournament's 50-Year Club at Northrock Lanes on May 9 and was presented with a chevron, plaque

and necklace to commemorate the milestone.

Smith made her debut at the 1968 event in San Antonio, and she has visited 32 cities and 23 states throughout her career. Her dedication to the sport earned her induction to the Marshall County USBC WBA Hall of Fame.



• Darren Tang of Las Vegas; Henry Dawson of Elma, Wash., and Danaka Heekin of Woodinville, Wash., were victorious in a PBA Northwest Region tripleheader at Daffodil Bowl at Puyallup, Wash., Sunday.

First Lady Unveils Newly Renovated White House Bowling Alley

 If Bowlers Journal's previous reporting on First Lady Melania Trump's affection for bowling did not convince you that the sport has friends in high places, consider the First Lady's most recent overture to tenpins.

Last week, many media outlets around the world ran news of the recent renovation of the White House Bowling Alley, a single-lane lounge first installed under the Nixon Administration in 1973 under the White House's North Portico entrance. (This is not to be confused with the separate White House bowling center installed in 1947 in the West Wing under the Truman administration, which subsequently was moved to the Eisenhower Executive Office Building in 1955.)

Mrs. Trump oversaw the project with help from the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America, then unveiled the establishment's sleek new look by taking the children of Secret Service agents on a bowling outing there on April 30. The center had last seen a renovation in 1994, when it got a makeover during the Clinton years.

NBC4 Washington reported that the "renovation was a major departure from the original design, and the First Lady led the effort to restore the original wooden lane while also updating electrical wiring, mechanics and the interior design."

That interior design includes navy blue chesterfield sofas and

walls lined with large photos of some of Mrs. Trump's official trips as First Lady, such as her tour of Africa last fall. A screen on one wall and another on the masking unit area over the lane feature what has become Mrs. Trump's signature phrase as First Lady, "Be Best," which is part of the campaign against cyber-bullying she announced a year ago this week.

Each of the children who participated in the unveiling wore white shirts printed with the phrase, and they bowled with sparkling new balls — some red, some white, and some blue — each printed with an image of the White House and the words, "The President's House."

The White House's official Twitter feed announced the unveiling on May 1, tweeting, "First Lady Melania Trump welcomed the children of her Secret Service detail to the White House this week to enjoy the newly renovated and restored White House Bowling Alley!" The tweet concluded with a bowling-themed emoji.

That tweet served up the latest reminder of the First Lady's ongoing support for bowling. On April 2 last year, Mrs. Trump arranged for bowling to be part of the annual Easter Egg Roll, a tradition started in 1878 with the Rutherford B. Hayes administration. The South Lawn featured large, inflatable bowling pins that children mowed over with bouncing balls.
