

Kyle Sherman, Amanda Greene Win 20th PBA-PWBA Storm Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles Thriller

ish at Copperfield Bowl Sunday.

The win gave Sherman his first Professional Bowlers Association Tour title. Greene won her only PWBA title in the 2015 PWBA Lincoln Open, but has suspended her professional career to attend law school.

Battling what PBA competitor and FloBowling analyst Brad Miller called "an insane amount of hook," the final game of match play involved a nerve-wracking contest of strikes and splits among the top four teams. In the end, it was a 248 game by Sherman and a 192 by Greene that overtook the first- and second-place teams with an 8,873 pinfall total for 20 games to claim the \$20,000 first prize.

AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois and Eric McCarthy of Omaha finished second with 8,862 pins; tournament leaders Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois and Sydney Brummett of Fort Wayne, Indiana,

USBC will Lower Youth Membership Maximum Age to 18 Starting with 2020-2021 season

ARLINGTON, Texas – The United States Bowling Congress will lower the maximum age for USBC Youth membership to 18 starting with the 2020-2021 season.

The decision to lower to the maximum age from 20 to 18, with agreement from the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America and the International Bowling Campus Youth Committee, will align bowling with other youth sports.

"Over the last decade, we have made changes to USBC Youth programs and tournaments to provide a model comparable with other youth sports," IBC Youth Managing Director of Youth Development



Gary Brown said. "We moved to age-based divisions, as opposed to average, for events, to provide peer-to-peer competition. Setting the maximum age for youth bowlers to 18 aligns us with the standard of other national youth sports organizations."

A U18 division will become the top division for the Pepsi Youth and Bowling.com Youth Open Championships for the 2020-2021 season. During the next season, USBC will address how the age change will impact the 2021 Junior Gold

LIMA, Peru - Team USA's Stefanie Johnson and Shannon O'Keefe knew they would have a great look on the freshly oiled lanes this week at the 2019 Pan American Games, so they used that to their advantage en route to the doubles gold medal Saturday at the Bowling Center

of La Villa Deportiva Nacional (VIDENA).

They validated their assessment of the event's 41-foot World Bowling Rome oil pattern with opening games of 477 and 469, before having to address the expected transition that slowed their momentum

strong team at that. He joined forces with Jakob Butturf, Stu Williams, Ritchie Allen, and Jason Belmonte.

Let's hear what he had to say about that experience. "I bowled the doubles in Portland in 2016, it was like a regular PBA stop, the people were there and partied, but they weren't loud while we were bowling. For me, personally the constant noise during the league made it feel like there were no distractions because it is loud the entire time, it made it easier for me," ALS said.

Lavery-Spahr was one of the last to be drafted, but once selected, found himself on a stacked team. "We had two of the top three in the world, plus Stu who is a top 10 player, and Dick has been an MVP in that building. For me to get to bowl with Belmonte, who is one of the top three bowlers of all-time was really cool. It was an easy team to fit into," he added.

So an environment like this...he's got to be nervous right? "I've been bowling for 14 years and have never felt nervous on the lanes, but having the whole team relying on you, I was nervous. On the second and third days, I either struck or got nine, so I was happy with the performance. It was unfortunate that we bowled as well as we did and got swept out of the building. At our level, we know the difference between a flat ten and a ring ten, and our play was to get softer, but after watching the show I can see that we should have shut down our angles and moved back right. This is what makes bowling so hard, this is a prime example of being really close, but never getting a strike," he said.

That is some great insight from Anthony, and really lets you know just how good these guys are, they know a good

nine from a bad nine, but even with that, it's still tough to get the strike under the brightest of lights.

Team USA Men Earn Silver Medal in Doubles at 2019 Pan American Games

LIMA, Peru - Though Team USA's Jakob Butturff was able to maintain his record pace during the second half of the doubles event at the 2019 Pan American Games, the effort wasn't enough to catch Puerto Rico's Cristian Azcona and Jean Perez, who captured the gold medal Saturday with their own record score.

Azcona (2,927) and Perez (2,889) averaged more than 242 during their 12 games at the Bowling Center of La Villa Deportiva Nacional (VIDENA) to claim the doubles title with a 5,816 total, more than 200 pins better than the previous record of 5,607, set by Canada's Dan MacLelland and Francois Lavoie in 2015.

Butturff's 1,538 set Saturday, 256.3 average, included games of 280, 247, 225, 279, 248 and 259 and was 22 pins better than his record-setting performance Thursday during the first half of the event. His 12-game total of 3,054 topped the 2,930 MacLelland shot on the way to the gold medal four years ago.

Pate overcame some of the struggles he experienced in Thursday's 1,172 set and added a 1,319 effort for a 2,491 total and 5,545 team score.

A 515 final game helped Colombia's Manuel Otalora (2,763) and Alfredo Quintana (2,752) secure the bronze medal with 5,515.

"Jakob had a phenomenal set again today, and Nick was able to settle in and put together some big games, which helped us sneak in for the silver, and that's really special," Team USA head coach Rod Ross said.

"What Puerto Rico did was incredible, and they earned the gold with a terrific performance. Now, we're going to reset, regroup and focus on getting a strong start in singles."

In any team environment, each player usually has a role. With competitors as versatile as Butturff and Pate, those roles sometimes change.

So far this week, Pate is serving more of a supportive role, while making the adjustments he hopes will help him continue to improve during singles. He said that during Saturday's block, his execution was better and he was more

focused mentally.

"Being up close to watch Jakob break his own record was impressive, and it's amazing what he can do," said Pate, a 24-year-old right-hander.

"When he gets it going, it stays going. It really was a team effort, though, and I guess my job so far has been to keep the enthusiasm up, even through my struggles. Even though I didn't bowl as well as I hoped, I had fun."

As doubles concluded on the biggest stage Team USA will compete on this year, Butturff shied away from the attention

Teammates Take U12 Titles at 2019 Junior Gold Championships

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Katelyn Abigania of San Diego successfully defended her U12 girls title and her USA Bowling teammate, Elias O'Hollaren of San Diego, won the U12 boys title at the 2019 Junior Gold Championships presented by the Brands of Ebonite International.

Both Katelyn and Elias were the No. 3 seeds in the championship rounds that aired Tuesday on CBS Sports Network from Thunderbowl Lanes.

Not only did each have to win two matches on the TV show, but both had to defeat the opponent who sent them to the elimination bracket during match play.

"It's amazing, I'm just kind of speechless right now," Katelyn said after her victory. "Coming into this tournament, with high expectations and a lot of pressure on me, I definitely pulled it off, especially

for me being only 12. And now, winning back to back ... (two-time Junior Gold champion) Solomon (Salama) is like 16 now, and he's doing big stuff, so I can't wait to see what's in my future."

Katelyn was the top qualifier for match play, but lost her second match in the bracket to Abby Starkey of Schaumburg, Illinois, 379-359, in the two-game total-pins match. Katelyn then had to win two matches to earn the No. 3 seed for the televised finals.

In the opening match against Gianna Brandolino of Joliet, Illinois, Katelyn trailed by 15 pins through seven frames. But Gianna suffered a 7-10 split in the eighth frame and then missed a single-pin spare to open the door for Katelyn, who stayed clean for a 180-174 victory.

"Like last year, I said it's never over until the game's actually over," Katelyn said. "I

thought I was going to lose the first match. And during match play, since I lost my second match, I thought it was over but here I am again."

In the title match, Katelyn had a rematch against Abby.

Abby could not convert spares in the first, fourth and fifth frames, and though Katelyn did miss a single-pin spare in the fourth frame, she also had three strikes in the first five frames to build a 26-pin lead. She would stay clean the rest of the game, including striking out in the final frame, for a 196-147 victory.

In the boys final, Elias followed his USA Bowling teammate's lead, winning the title as the No. 3 seed. Elias and Katelyn are on the SDLV team



in the USA Bowling National Championships.

In the match-play bracket, Elias lost his opening match to Duke Knudsen of Redmond, Washington. But Elias also made it back through the elimination bracket to claim the title.

"It feels great, especially because I was down after I lost that first match," Elias said of winning the title. "I felt like I was done, because I bowled so poorly in the first match. I came in not wanting to get into the elimination bracket, because I think the elimination bracket brings out the best of everyone."

In his opening TV match against Braden McDonough of Coppell, Texas, Elias strung together three strikes, starting in the third frame, to build a 32-pin lead and would go on to

take a 200-168 victory.

Elias then faced Duke again, this time with the national title on the line.

Trailing by three pins through seven frames, Elias watched Duke trip a 4 pin for a strike in the eighth frame. In the ninth, Knudson was able to convert his 2-4-5-8 leave, but it left the door open for Elias.

He struck in the ninth and then posted strikes on his first two shots in the final frame to take the title, 211-197.

"I didn't know he was going to miss in the ninth, so I was just thinking to put pressure on him, make him have to double in the 10th to win," Elias said when asked his thoughts heading into the final frames. "And then he missed, and I was like, 'I can shut him out now.'"

Competitors in the U12 division bowled 16 qualifying games over four days (four games each day) before the field was cut. The advancers

then bowled an additional four games to trim the field to the top eight boys and top eight girls for match play.

Match play was a double-elimination bracket consisting of two games with total pinfall determining the winner.

The U12 division had 262 boys and 134 girls.

BowlTV.com provided live coverage of the Junior Gold Championships from selected centers, including coverage of U12 match play.

Championships, which will have a separate U20 division. Please visit BOWL.com/YouthAgeChange for additional information.

Starting with the 2020-2021 season, USBC Youth membership policy will state youth membership is available to individuals who have not reached the age of 18 prior to Aug. 1 of the current bowling season. The decision to lower the maximum age will directly impact 3.3 percent of the total youth membership. The change also better aligns USBC Youth membership with new regulations from the U.S. Center for SafeSport requiring training for

those over 18 who participate in a sport with minors.

Any USBC Youth member who reaches the age of 18 during the bowling season is required to complete the U.S. Center for SafeSport online education program, which is free, to continue to compete in leagues that have participants under age 18. This requirement was announced with the release of the revised Registered Volunteer Program (RVP) handbook.

The new age limit marks the second time the USBC Youth maximum age has been lowered. In 2009, USBC lowered the maximum age for youth bowlers from 22 to 20.

during the opening round of doubles Thursday.

Johnson powered them through it with a big third game (276), and O'Keefe regained her stride in Game 4 (235) to help the duo cruise to the victory with a 12-game total of 5,317.

Johnson, whose 1,409 six-game performance Saturday was the highest set in Pan American Games competition by a woman, paced the pair over the two days with an individual total of 2,692. O'Keefe added 2,625.

Mexico's Aseret Zetter (2,637) and Iliana Lomeli (2,416) earned the silver medal with a 5,053 effort and Astrid Valiente (2,528) and Aumi Guerra (2,486) of the Dominican Republic held on for the bronze with 5,014.

The women's field this week in Peru includes representatives from 16 countries.

"Just being at this event is an incredible experience and a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, and to be able to compete in our first Pan American Games together already meant so much," said Johnson, a 35-year-old right-hander. "To come out on top truly is a dream come true. We thought about this moment from the second we knew we both qualified, and it was amazing to stand up there together."

Canada's Caroline Lagrange and Colombia's Clara Guerrero previously shared the record for the event's highest six-game total during doubles with 1,366, while United States Bowling

Teams Selected for 2019 PABCON Youth Championships, TOA

ARLINGTON, Texas - For many young people, summertime is for relaxing, vacationing, going to camp or just enjoying time outdoors in the sunshine.

The members of Junior Team USA go to camp, as well, but it's the annual training camp at the International Training and Research Center, where they work with the coaching staff on everything from fundamentals to team building to their mental games.

The summer also is busy with top-tier events for young competitors, and that includes the upcoming Pan American Bowling Confederation Youth Championships, being held in the Dominican Republic from Aug. 11-17.

Eight Junior Team USA members have been selected by the Team USA coaching staff to represent the United States at the 22-lane Sebelen Bowling Center, the same facility that hosted the 2018 PABCON Women's Championships.

The girls side will include a trio of world champions - Mabel Cummins of Elburn, Illinois, Caitlyn Johnson of Rockwell, North Carolina, and Kamerin Peters of Toms River, New Jersey, along with two-

time Junior Team USA member Kaitlyn Eder of Lithia, Florida.

Cummins and Johnson helped Junior Team USA to a team gold medal at the 2018 World Bowling Youth Championships, while Cummins and Peters claimed the doubles gold medal at the inaugural World Bowling Junior Championships in March. Eder is an eight-time gold medalist at the Lee Evans Tournament of the Americas.

"Our girls have some great momentum after finding success at recent events, and we're looking forward to building on that in the Dominican Republic," Junior Team USA head coach Bryan O'Keefe said. "As always, it's a busy time of the year with many events going on, but that also means they're going to be extra sharp and ready to bowl well."

The boys roster is loaded with experience, too, with Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, Cortez Schenck of Phoenix, Sean Wilcox of Altamonte Springs, Florida, and Tom Hankey Jr. of Great Barrington, Massachusetts.

Wilcox, a first-time team member, also is a member of adult Team USA and recently returned from a record-setting debut at the 2019 PABCON Men's Championships in Peru,

where he earned two gold medals (doubles and team) and a bronze medal in all-events.

Schenck also has experience on both versions of Team USA, and his overall success includes a Masters gold medal at the 2018 World Youth Championships. He'll be making his second appearance at the PABCON Youth Championships and will seek his first gold medal at the event.

Neuer competed at the 2019 World Junior Championships, earning a silver medal in doubles. He also has represented Junior Team USA at the Tournament of the Americas.

Hankey Jr., a winner at the 2019 Intercollegiate Singles Championships and Intercollegiate Team Championships in his freshman season at Webber International, also has collected a handful of gold medals at the Tournament of the Americas.

"While we do say it often, we truly have a very deep and talented team each year, so expectations once again are very high on the boys side, too," O'Keefe said. "All of these guys have been to the top of the medal stand, and we're all excited for a chance to get them back up there."

The upcoming PABCON Youth Championships will feature 21-and-under boys and girls teams consisting of four players each, along with a 16-and-under category made up

of two boys and two girls.

All U21 athletes will compete for medals in singles, doubles, trios, team and Masters competition. Medals will be awarded for all-events as well.

Junior Team USA only will compete in the U21 category at the PABCON event, but eight additional players from Junior Team USA and the U15 Developmental Team will bowl at the 2019 Tournament of the Americas at Sawgrass Lanes in Tamarac, Florida, from July 28-Aug. 3.

The Junior Division at the Tournament of the Americas includes two categories - Junior A (under 20) and Junior B (under 16) - and teams will consist of two boys and two girls.



Team Selected for 2019 World Bowling Women's Championships

ARLINGTON, Texas - The last time Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, represented Team USA at the South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas, she came away with a trios gold medal and an inspirational story.

Two years later, the 15-time Team USA member now will head back to The Entertainment Capital of the World healthy and looking to defend that title, while also hoping to improve on what was an otherwise frustrating week on the lanes.

O'Keefe is one of six Team USA members selected to represent the United States at the 2019 World Bowling Women's Championships, which will be held at the 60-lane Bowling Plaza from Aug. 23-30.

The 40-year-old right-hander will be joined by fellow trios gold medalist Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, New York; Stefanie Johnson of McKinney, Texas; Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York; Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California; and Jordan Richard of Tecumseh, Michigan.

"It's always an honor to get selected to represent Team USA on the lanes, and I'm very excited to get back out there with such a talented group of ladies," O'Keefe said. "Last time turned out to be an interesting week, and while we came away

with a few medals, we're going to work hard to improve on that performance."

Johnson, a six-time world champion with a combined 19 years on Team USA and Junior Team USA, has competed in each World Women's Championships or combined World Championships since her Team USA debut in 2005.

McEwan and Parkin both are veterans on the world stage, while Kuhlkin and Richard both have experienced the World Youth Championships and will make their debuts at the adult edition.

All six players have found success on the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour and will be nearing the end of the 2019 PWBA Tour season when it's time to shift gears from their individual focus to competing as a team.

"I think I'm still a little speechless because part of me didn't think I would get picked, since there are so many talented players with more experience than me," Richard said. "Some of us who are going are really close and spend a lot of time competing with and against each other, and that will help me feel even more comfortable at such a big event."

More than 175 players from 33 countries are scheduled to compete at the 2019 World

Women's Championships, and they will bowl for medals in singles, doubles, trios, team and Masters competition. Medals also will be awarded for all-events, based on their 24-game pinfall totals.

Qualifying will take place throughout the week, and all semifinals and finals will be contested Aug. 29-30 in a special TV setting.

Richard expects to be able to draw from the things she experienced while collecting two medals at the 2016 World Youth Championships and four medals, including two golds, at the 2018 Pan American Bowling Confederation Women's Championships.

"My first World Championships was an eye-opening experience, because even though you expect everyone to be really good, you see it differently when you get there and

see all the countries represented," Richard said. "Just getting to represent your country adds some pressure because you don't want to let anyone down, but having experienced international competition before definitely will help this time."

O'Keefe's return to South Point will be bittersweet, as that was the backdrop for a performance that was more about adrenaline, camaraderie and mentally overpowering physical pain, while suffering through the complications of a kidney stone.

Hours before taking the lanes for the trios semifinals at the 2017 World Championships, O'Keefe was in the emergency room and unsure if she'd be able to stand up, let alone compete in the trios medal round.

Not wanting to let her team-

Mohr Defeats WRW to Win David Small's Championship Lanes Classic for 11th PBA50 Tour Title

ANDERSON, Ind. (July 23, 2019) – Making his third consecutive championship round appearance of the season, Ron Mohr defeated Walter Ray Williams Jr. 279-215 in a battle of PBA Hall of Famers in the title match to win the PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic presented by Roto Grip Tuesday for his first win of the season and 11th of his career.

Mohr, who was top qualifier for the stepladder finals, threw 11 strikes in the title match starting with the first five before leaving a 10 pin in the sixth frame. He then struck the rest of the way to handily win the match.

Williams, the Go Bowling! PBA Tour all-time titles leader with 47 wins, was trying for his fourth win of the season and the 15th of his career to take sole possession of the all-time titles lead on PBA's tour for players 50 and over. He left six 10 pins in the title match including a missed 10 pin in the fifth frame.

"The way Walter Ray was bowling in the previous match I thought I might be the answer to a trivia question, but things went my way today, said the 63-year-old Mohr, whose last PBA50 win came in the 2018 Northern California Classic. "I got off to a slow start in the tournament qualifying 23rd so I really didn't expect to win. There have been a lot of amazing things happen out here (on tour) so I should probably know better than to count myself out."

Mohr, a native of Fort Wayne, finished fourth in last

week's PBA50 South Shore Open and fifth in the PBA50 River City Extreme Open two weeks ago.

"The important thing for me was to slow everything down," said Mohr, crediting his wife Lita who noticed he was rushing his shots in the previous championship rounds. "I really had to focus on not making a shot until I'm ready and that was especially true when Walter Ray missed his 10 pin because I didn't want to do the same thing to possibly let

him back in the match." Williams qualified second for the stepladder after coming all the way from sixth in the final position round of the second match play round.

In the semifinal match, Williams, whose runner-up finish all but wraps up his third PBA50 Player of the Year honor, beat hall of famer Doug Kent 247-209 in the semifinal to advance to the title match.

Eugene McCune Wins PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open; Walter Ray Williams Jr. Earns PBA50 Player of the Year

McCune beats Lennie Boesch Jr. 230-178 in title match; Williams finishes third to clinch third PBA50 Player of the Year honor

WYOMING, Mich. (July 28, 2019) – Three-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, beat Lennie Boesch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, 230-178 in the title match Sunday to win the PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open presented by DV8 for his first PBA50 Tour title as a professional.

A third-place finish by PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Ocala, Florida, was enough for Williams to clinch his third Player of the Year honor on the tour for players 50 and over.

"I don't think I've ever bowled so bad in my life and won," McCune said. "I didn't have a lot of problems with the right lane but no matter where or how I threw it on the left lane I couldn't find a shot. I was fortunate to get some breaks and was able to take advantage of them."

In the semifinal match against Williams, McCune recovered from a gutter ball and open in the seventh frame by throwing strikes in the ninth frame and all three in the 10th to beat Williams 215-201 after Williams opened the door by missing a 3-10 split in the 10th. One of McCune's breaks was a crossover strike in the 10th frame.

In the title match, Boesch, who was trying for his first win of the season and the fifth of his career, got off to an early lead but opened in the sixth and eighth frames after leaving splits while McCune was able to string together five strikes in the middle of the match using his trademark hard-throwing delivery from the corner to

clinch the win.

"I was using a 15-pound ball earlier in the tournament but I wasn't able to carry with it," the 51-year-old McCune said. "I went to a 16-pound ball in the second round which enabled me to throw a straighter line to the pocket. It's more work to throw 16, and I didn't throw it the best tonight, but it was the right choice to deal with the changing lane conditions."

With three consecutive PBA50 Tour wins to start the season and no finishes worse than ninth, Williams has put together a dominant season. He will have one more opportunity to win his 15th career PBA50 Tour title to take sole possession of the all-time titles lead on the PBA50 Tour when he competes in the PBA50 Jax60 Classic presented by Track July 30-Aug. 2 in Jackson, Mich. which will conclude the PBA50 season.

"Overall I've been very happy with the way I bowled this season," said Williams, who holds the all-time titles lead on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour with 47 wins. "I don't think I was always the best bowler in the field every week but you can't argue with three wins and a lot of other good finishes. Hopefully I can get that 15th win in Jackson."

In the opening stepladder match, last week's PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic winner, Ron Mohr of Las Vegas beat Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, a two-time winner this season, 268-213. Williams, who was seeded third for the finals, started the second stepladder match with eight strikes to beat Mohr 266-237 to advance to the semifinal match against McCune.

Mohr beat Williams in last week's David Small's Championship Lanes Classic title match

279-215 for his first win of the season and 11th of his career.

Two PBA60 events – for players 60 and over – will conclude the "senior" season. The PBA60 Jax 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolfe will be conducted Aug. 3-5 and the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by the DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global in Fort Wayne is scheduled for Aug. 7-9.

mates down, O'Keefe powered through the warm-up session and decided she was going to compete.

O'Keefe, McEwan and USBC Hall of Famer Kelly Kulick of Union, New Jersey, defeated Indonesia in the semifinals and topped Germany to claim the gold medal. It was one of two gold medals for the Team USA women at the 2017 event and O'Keefe's seventh world championship. McEwan also earned the all-events gold medal in 2017.

"The morning of the trios medal round, I didn't think it would be possible for me to stand up straight, let alone bowl," O'Keefe said. "But, when (Team USA head coach) Rod (Ross) called Bryan (O'Keefe) to explain how the forfeit would work, I knew there was no way I was going to miss it. I wasn't going to do that to my teammates. I already felt like I let them down the day before, so I had to at least try."

"My teammates helped me get ready and Bryan and Shannon (Pluhowsky) basically carried me to the bowling center. When it was time to bowl, I went to a whole other mental place and something amazing

came out of it."

The medal haul for O'Keefe and her teammates in 2017 also included a pair of doubles bronze medals (Kulick and McEwan and O'Keefe and Josie Barnes).

The Team USA women entered the 2017 World Championships as the defending champions in the coveted team event but fell two pins short of returning to the semifinals, and that has the team even more motivated heading into the 2019 tournament.

"I'm excited to go back, and my role has transitioned a little bit, since I'm now one of the older players on the team," said O'Keefe, whose 2018 included a win at the United States Bowling Congress Team USA Trials and the QubicaAMF Bowling World Cup. "It's really cool to be able to compete in the event again, and in going back to the same location, it's like we'll have a chance to handle some unfinished business."

"It was great to win trios, and any time you earn a medal it's special, but the ultimate goal for us is the team event. We're focused and motivated and definitely comfortable with the venue, so we're looking forward to it."



Just Paying Attention

And now, welcome to August, the annual Troy Walker Media columns, examining how bowling fits into the digital 21st century media world. If you're seeing this annual series for the first time, it was inspired by bowling's truly first viral video, the should-have-been strike rolled by Troy Walker in the 2013 Luci Doubles when the sweep dropped as his 12th ball that would have given him a 300 game surprisingly exploded over millions of electronic devices in the coming days.

This series attempts to explain the how and why bowling is shown and displayed the way it is to the public. In years past, there's been a behind-the-scenes look at PBA XtraFrame coverage while sitting in with Craig Elliott and David Waswo to call the 2017 Luci Doubles. Another year explained the dilemma television broadcasters are facing even today as the younger end of the viewing demographic aren't watching television as much as the prior have.

People have always asked questions about why isn't bowling on Saturdays anymore or get better coverage. Thus, the M.O. of the annual Walker series.

When the PBA changed its main television network after two decades from ESPN to Fox Sports, it gave the television look a boost. The biggest addition was the Specto ball Tracking system from Kegel, offering a constant on-screen graphic illustrating frame-by-frame ball placement and paths downlane, something other sports telecasts had been offering for some time.

Let's imagine if the next step takes the PBA to a place imagined years ago, that's as a major entity on the American sports landscape. Years ago, that meant being a staple of network sports programming nearly year-round. The PBA was on Saturdays before the legendary ABC-TV series "Wide World of Sports," from January through April, but not on Sundays, as WWoS was on occasion.

Today, the media landscape is much different. From the four or five television channels (depending where you lived) to the introduction of specialty networks to regional networks to satellite television to internet and social media, it's hard to believe we lived, much less survived in an era with much

less media.

The role of radio was different as well. AM stations were either full service or music, mostly Top 40 or country while FM was just gaining more significance, although not readily available in cars and hand-held transistor radios until the 1970's. As FM became more available with clearer reception, music formats began to appear. With enthusiastic and entertaining disc jockeys, AM country and Top 40 stations moved to FM, while AM stations changed to news and talk formats. One offspring format on AM became known as "sports talk." At first it was formatted at night on news/talk stations, sports talk took off as its own format in the late 1980's and 1990's, even establishing a few major markets on FM, like 105.3 The Fan in DFW, among a handful of other FM stations across the country.

The sound of the enthusiastic, charming, and delightful disc jockey was replaced by an energetic sports talk show host, encouraging listeners to call the show and voice opinions. Some shows used two hosts to discuss to keep the listening flow of a show at a high level. Throw in whatever the fortunes of the local sports teams happened to be, and you had a sizable chunk of the available listening audience.

But here's where bowling was left out. If a host or show producer didn't like or care for a sport, it was not mentioned or covered, as if it didn't exist. Since there weren't enough regional or national shows liking bowling, you rarely heard about it.

Topics about the four major sports were discussed daily. You'd also hear golf, tennis, (usually around their major tournaments) and other sports, depending on your locale, but not bowling. There were exceptions, of course, but for the most part, there wasn't even a plug about a telecast, personality, or a bowler's charity event.

So what if bowling was more accepted by the sports talk radio world, what would it sound like, and what topics would be covered?

In the last ten years, there is now national radio sports talk simulcasting on TV, regional and national sports networks. Let's take a recent example. Sports talk on radio and TV offered a daily microscopic breakdown of the NBA during eight weeks of playoffs and six

weeks into post season until free agency. How might this translate to the PBA Tour?

Here's the case of Andrew Anderson, reigning PBA Player of the Year. He's been fighting a finger injury all season, which has been explained in a variety of news releases. One downside to more media exposure is the not the constant mentioning, but the constant hypothetical construction of scenarios ranging from him becoming PoY again to saying his career might be finished to he's just a one-hit wonder, a player who had one career season.

Take each networks roster of national radio and television sports talk shows, the ones populating ESPN, Fox Sports, CBS Sports Net, and NBC Sports Net. Each network has three to seven daily shows, each discussing different scenarios and you see where this is headed. If it is repeated so often, it becomes fact. Reporters can ask the player to offer an opinion based on so-and-so's comment on his show that day stating his career is done, and so on, starting that sometimes-weird circle of defending a hypothetical.

There's the Chris Paul-James Harden alleged feud, the subsequent Paul move to OKC, other teams needing more than one ball due to ball hawks, Kawhi Leonard needing space to just be himself, the almost daily LeBron update, and so on. See where this is going? Thankfully, that's what bowling doesn't have to face at the moment.

We hear from time to time players or management saying they don't read the papers (a.k.a. news, electronic or actual newsprint) as not to get distracted from the day-to-day task on the field.

This is what they are avoiding as much as possible. They are under a considerable amount of pressure with a lifetime of work, a big money contract (and don't forget family life) leading up to this point, and some doof reporter asks about a hypothetical situation.

Granted, one really can't compare team to individual sports. But it's the six to eight hours a day of "what ifs" that can be distracting.

As NFL training camps open up, it will be their turn on sports talk radio during the coming weeks that lead to the regular season.

and praise.

Part of being on Team USA is about competing with a one-team mentality. There's also

a hard-to-describe pride that comes with wearing a jersey with USA across the back.

"It's amazing being here to represent our country in what might be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, and to win a medal, whether it's

gold, silver or bronze, is very special," Butturff said. "That's something not a lot of people can say they've done, and it's something we were able to do together. When it comes to events like this, there's no I in doubles or team, so you're out there fighting together and trying to keep your teammate's spirit up, no matter what it takes."

The men's field this week in Peru includes representatives from 16 countries.

The last time the Team USA men won the doubles gold medal at the Pan Am Games, which are held every four years, was at the 2011 event in Guadalajara, Mexico. That win included Bill O'Neill and United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Chris Barnes.

The 32 men at this year's event now will turn their attention to singles, which gets underway Sunday at 10 a.m. Eastern. They will take the lanes first, and the women will begin their first six games of singles at 5 p.m. EDT.

All competitors will complete 12 games of qualifying over two days, before the field is cut to the top eight bowlers in each division for round-robin match play. The top four

bowlers after match play will advance to Tuesday's knockout-style semifinals.

The 2019 Pan American Games officially kicked off Friday night with a formal opening ceremony and will continue through Aug. 11. The bowling competition, featuring 16 men's countries and 16 women's countries, will conclude Tuesday.

This year's Pan Am Games is expected to bring more than 6,700 athletes to Lima to compete in 39 sports and 61 disciplines.

Since bowling was added to the Pan American Games in 1991, Team USA has won 22 of a possible 34 gold medals and claimed 37 medals overall,

20 more than the next-closest country.

Congress Hall of Famer and longtime Team USA member Kelly Kulick owns the highest singles total, 1,376, rolled in 2011.

While the additional accolades always are nice, Johnson and O'Keefe both attribute their continued success together to their team chemistry, communication and ability to push and motivate one another. That has been the case since 2005, when they both made Team USA for the first of 15 consecutive times.

"The chemistry Shannon and I have when we compete together is undeniable, and I always know she has my back, while I have hers, which is pretty hard to beat," Johnson said. "We knew we had to come out today as strong as possible, and we helped keep each other focused the whole way. We had a great start and just kept riding that wave."

The Team USA tandem entered the day in second place, 43 pins behind Valiente and Guerra, but halfway through Saturday's six-game block, Johnson and O'Keefe were 227 pins ahead of their nearest adversaries and nearly 350 pins ahead of fourth place.

The key to their success in the second half of the doubles event was how they attacked

Your Miss Might Not be the Same Across the Lane

Keep in mind it's not only possible but even likely you may miss what you are looking at by varying amounts when you play different parts of the lane. I didn't know that until it happened to me. When I'm playing 8 out, I look two right of where I want to hit; from 9 to 17, I can look directly at it; inside of 17, I have to go back to looking two right.

Now you're probably wondering how in the world I figured that out. Well, my coach, Bill Harris, spent a lot of time out on the channel cap. He would put a penny on the 3rd board and one on the 6th board and tell me to go in between

them without hitting either one. He certainly spent some time chasing that penny on the 6th board, I'll tell you. After he told me to look at the penny on the 3rd board instead of where I really wanted to hit, he didn't have to chase either one.

He moved the pennies across the lane a board at a time, telling me to look in between them. Once we found the place where I really could look in between them and hit there, he didn't stop. Right on across the lane we went until we had discovered everything we needed to know about my ability to target and where I needed to look to hit where I intended to hit.

I will confess I was one mad

student when I kept nailing that penny on the left. After all, less than perfect is not acceptable. Once I understood the only real problem was that I didn't know this information, I was okay. This was just one of the many times he empowered me forever with knowledge. Just think how helpful it would be to you to know you needed to look outside your target when playing deep or far outside but not necessarily when you're playing 12.

Accuracy plays a critical role in our sport and how to properly choose a target is important. This is also important to the mental game. Let's say you're just cruising along, pounding the pocket and getting rewarded, and someone asks you what you are playing. You tell them you are playing 8. They look at you incredulously and shake their head. Folks watching your performance from the concourse begins to snicker when they hear what you've said. They can all

plainly see you're hitting 12.

"I am too hitting 8. Just watch this," you think as you squint, bear down, purse your lips, clench your teeth, and really, really try hard to hit 8 which, of course, you cannot. A better answer for your friend's

question is, "I don't have a clue. I just roll the ball and it seems to work." Or you could ask a clarifying question, "Do you mean where am I looking or where do I intend the ball to go?"

the lanes as the oil pattern transitioned during the middle part of the block. Their strategy came from the things they

learned during Thursday's first round.

"The lanes were a little different today, and we were able to stay right longer, but it became pretty evident when it was time for me to change balls to something that was

a little cleaner but still read the midlane, which happened toward the end of Game 3," said O'Keefe, a 40-year-old right-hander. "By the end of the last game, we'd only moved a few boards left the whole day, so we were comfortable. Overall, we had a great day out there, and it was a lot of fun."

Team USA head coach Rod Ross helped talk through the things the team saw Thursday, and that helped them select their equipment and game plan for Saturday's six games.

He also has been around long enough to know how well Johnson and O'Keefe work together on the lanes, so once the plan was in place, he was able to step back and let them do what they do best.

"We went into today with a really good game plan, they played off each other really well and they made the right moves," Ross said. "It was very exciting as a coach to be a part of this and be able to witness their lane play and excellent execution today on the way to the gold medal. This is a great start to the week."

The last time the Team USA women won the doubles gold medal at the Pan Am Games, which are held every four years, was at the 2011 event in Guadalajara, Mexico. That win included a pair of USBC Hall of Famers - Kulick and Liz Johnson.

Saturday's doubles win wasn't the first for O'Keefe and Johnson at a top-tier event. The two also found the top of the podium at the 2013 World

Bowling World Championships. The latest victory simply was another memorable moment in an incredibly special relationship.

"When I came off the lanes and we hugged, I just told her this was meant to be and I love her and I'm so grateful to be able to share this experience with her," O'Keefe said. "I love all my teammates, but there has always been something special with Stef and I. So, I couldn't picture it any other way."

The 32 bowlers now will turn their attention to singles, which gets underway Sunday at 10 a.m. Eastern.

All competitors will complete 12 games of qualifying over two days, before the field is cut to the top eight bowlers in each division for match play. The top four bowlers after match play will advance to Tuesday's knockout-style semifinals.

The 2019 Pan American Games officially kicked off Friday night with a formal opening ceremony and will continue through Aug. 11. The bowling competition, featuring 16 men's countries and

16 women's countries, will conclude Tuesday.

This year's Pan Am Games is expected to bring more than 6,700 athletes to Lima to compete in 39 sports and 61 disciplines.

Since bowling was added to the Pan American Games in 1991, Team USA has won 21 of a possible 32 gold medals and claimed 35 medals overall, 20 more than the next-closest country.

2019 Open Championships Finishes Run at South Point Bowling Plaza

LAS VEGAS - Though the extra scoreboard watching can be nerve-racking, bowling early in the United States Bowling Congress Open Championships has paid off for Ryan Mouw of Muskegon, Michigan, in two consecutive years.

The 39-year-old right-hander was part of one of the most exciting and high-scoring squads in tournament history, and the 2,156 nine-game total he posted March 24 at the South Point Bowling Plaza not only was enough to outlast two USBC Open Championships titlists bowling at the same time, it also was enough to outdistance more than 52,000 competitors and earn him the 2019 Regular All-Events title.

Mouw, a 15-time Open Championships participant, is one of 32 bowlers to find the winner's circle this year, while he and Regular Doubles champion Cotie Holbek of Burlington, Wisconsin, will be receiving coveted Eagle trophies for the second consecutive year.

Five other previous champions also found their way back to the top of the standings, while 25 bowlers are first-time winners. Titles were up for grabs in team, doubles, singles and all-events in three average-based divisions - Regular, Standard and Classified - along with one Team All-Events ranking.

The 2019 event, the 116th edition of the storied tournament, kicked off March 9 and ran for 122 consecutive days. It was the tournament's fourth

trip to The Entertainment Capital of the World and second visit to the South Point Bowling Plaza.

Mouw arrived in Las Vegas as a defending champion in Regular Team, and he left the Bowling Plaza leading four events - Regular Team, Regular Singles, Regular All-Events and Team All-Events.

He and his S and B Pro Shop 1 teammates of Warren, Michigan, fell just shy of becoming the first team to successfully defend its title, finishing fourth overall, while Mouw's 802 singles effort was good enough for third place. They also finished second in Team All-Events.

championship experience so much, he wanted to share it with a friend in 2019.

He and Steven Fisher of Winthrop Harbor, Illinois, bowled their 1,478 doubles set March 25, while the venue still was buzzing about the show Mouw and his fellow competitors put on the night before.

Holbek, a 26-year-old right-hander and three-time Open Championships participant, led the doubles surge with games of 266, 234 and 276 for a 776 series, and Fisher, a 34-year-old right-hander making his 11th tournament appearance, added 219, 270 and 213 for a 702 set.

Though he came up short in his bid to become the first back-to-back winner in Regular Singles, shooting 647 this year, Holbek is excited to share the spotlight with his partner.

This year's Regular Singles title went to Mitch Beasley of Clarksville, Tennessee, who tossed games of 246, 297 and 269 for an 812 series May 4.

The effort made the 50-year-old right-hander the 36th bowler in tournament history with a perfect game and 800 series on the championship lanes, while the 3-6-9 combination he left at the end of his second game of singles left him just shy of becoming the 33rd bowler with multiple 300s at the event. He first achieved perfection on the biggest stage in bowling at the 2017 tournament, also at the South Point Bowling Plaza.

Another group of bowlers familiar with close calls at the Open Championships found their way to the Regular Team title this year after runner-up finishes in team and Team All-Events in 2018.

Higgy's Aquarium of Westerville, Ohio, which returned four team members from a year ago, rolled games of 1,033, 1,159 and 1,170 for a 3,362 total June 16 and had the shortest wait of all the Regular Division winners.

The team marked in all but one frame of its final game at

the Bowling Plaza and filled 139 of 150 frames overall to find the top of the standings. Team captain Dan Higgins led the effort with a 755 series and was joined by Joe Bailey (695), Chad Roberts (664), Joshua Conner (643) and Charles Tompkins (605).

This year's team title comes after second-place finishes in 2016 and 2018.

The team's continued success also includes six top-10 finishes in Team All-Events, since the tournament began using two oil patterns in 2013. This year, Higgy's Aquarium finished fourth in Team All-Events.

Higgins, Bailey, Roberts and Conner, along with former team member Tony Carson, were the Team All-Events champions in 2016.

The 2019 Team All-Events title was decided April 9, as two-time titlist Anthony Pepe of Long Island City, New York, helped his new teammates accomplish something that has been just out of reach more than once.

The members of Mento Produce of Syracuse averaged nearly 222 as a group over 45 games on two challenging oil patterns to win the prestigious title with a 9,983 total.

The team was led by Derek Magno, who rolled a perfect game during their team event April 8 and went on to finish fifth in Regular All-Events with a 2,142 total. He was joined in the effort by Joe Conti Jr. (2,084), Steve Meyer (1,995), Pepe (1,953) and TJ Mento (1,809).




