

Restrepo Wins 2018 BowlerX.com PWBA Twin Cities Open

EAGAN, Minn. – Although the road to the season-ending Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour Championship may have had more bumps than planned in 2018 for Colombia's Rocio Restrepo, she returned to form Saturday on the way to winning the BowlerX.com PWBA Twin Cities Open.

Restrepo defeated top seed Liz Kuhlkin of Schenectady, New York, in the championship match at Cedarvale Lanes, 224-193, to claim her fourth career PWBA Tour title and \$10,000 top prize.

The finals of the BowlerX.com PWBA Twin Cities Open were televised live Saturday on CBS Sports Network.

The tightly contested title match saw Restrepo gain the early lead after Kuhlkin was unable to strike in her first four frames, which included a missed 4 pin in the first frame. After a ball change to start the fifth frame, Kuhlkin found the right line and rolled four

consecutive strikes to make up the difference and take the lead.

Kuhlkin delivered another pocket shot in the ninth frame but left the 7 pin standing, which she was unable to convert. Given the chance to seize the victory, Restrepo delivered a pair of strikes in the ninth and 10th frames to win her first title of the 2018 season.

Although the win came down to executing in her final frame, the decision at the beginning of her semifinal match to use a different bowling ball on each lane helped to put her in that position.

"I knew I needed to bowl really well against Liz, since she had been phenomenal all week," said Restrepo, who now resides in Louisville, Ohio. "The left lane had been giving the other girls trouble, but since I made the decision to use a different ball from the beginning, I was able to play

Brian Kretzer Wins PBA50 Cup for First PBA50 Tour Title

WYOMING, Mich. (Aug. 12, 2018) – Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio, defeated PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli, 259-225, in the title match of the PBA50 Cup presented by DV8 Sunday at Spectrum Lanes to win his first title on PBA's tour for players 50 and over.

Monacelli jumped out to the

early lead with four strikes in a row to start the title match and looked to be well in control with a 20-pin lead in the fifth frame. A turning point in the match came when Kretzer was able to convert the 2-4-10 split in the fifth frame to stay in the match and then went on to

Teams Selected for 2018 PABCON Senior Championships

ARLINGTON, Texas – The eight bowlers who will represent the United States at the 2018 Pan American Bowling Confederation Senior Championships have been selected by the Team USA coaching staff.

The sixth edition of the PABCON Senior Championships will be held in Calgary, Alberta, Canada, from Aug. 19-24. Competition will take place at the 30-lane Let's Bowl, and be contested on the 41-foot Rome oil pattern.

Team USA's representatives in the men's division will be Steve Badovinac of Parker, Colorado, Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, Warren Eales of Chandler, Arizona, and Bob Learn Jr. of Spring Hill, Tennessee.

Representing the United States on the women's side will be Tish Johnson of Colorado

Springs, Colorado, Sharon Powers of Lakewood, Colorado, Lucy Sandelin of Tampa, Florida, and Paula Vidad of Sun City, California.

USBC Hall of Famer and USBC Gold coach Bill Spigner of Vernon Hill, Illinois, will lead the team onto the lanes.

"I've dreamt about this and prepared for it, and to have this opportunity is a dream come true," said Badovinac, a 50-year-old right-hander who bowled his way onto Team USA for the first time at age 48. "My dad spent 36 years in the (U.S.) Army and was a decorated soldier, and my mom retired from the VA hospital, so being able to wear the red, white and blue and have Team USA on my jersey is an incredible honor and indescribable feeling."

The United States last competed at the PABCON

United States, Korea Win Masters at 2018 World Youth Championships

ALLEN PARK, Mich. - Cortez Schenck of Phoenix ended Junior Team USA's run at the 2018 World Bowling Youth Championships in memorable fashion, claiming the Masters gold medal Friday at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The girls title went to Korea's Lee Jungmin, who defeated her teammate Son Hyeonji in the championship

match.

Schenck, a 19-year-old right-hander, started the best-of-three final with six consecutive strikes, and he threw 17 strikes overall in 2-0 victory over Malaysia's Shahrulkh Zulkifli, which included scores of 244-216 and 247-198.

The gold-medal run marked the first medal round of the

Just Paying Attention

One step toward making athletes more personable is getting them out of their performance atmosphere. This is where social media has stepped in to get them to interact with fans. As we have seen in other sports, there are huge plusses as well as pitfalls. Another way is to have their sports' main television network or live stream service do features with them.

FloBowling has started doing features with a few of the PBA players to show them off to the rest of the industry and also to the fans. And yes, that includes any potential sponsors. One tried and true method is to get athletes to demonstrate what they do, then have a reporter try to duplicate the movement. Either recorded features or live remotes with reporter stand-ups (reporter stands in front of the camera talking to the in-studio news anchor) have and continue to be used to publicize a tournament as a unique event to the area. Examples of this are the roving reporter of a morning TV news team going to a PWBA event and having a few of the players explain the event as well as toss a few balls down the lane. Another

example is the local TV sports beat reporter throwing a few balls down the lane, then tell viewers how tough it is and how much it isn't like Saturday night cosmic bowling. The reporter will then ask the pro the standard "how do you do that" question, followed by the reporter looking like a fish out of water

As you can see by looking at the other offerings FloSports lineup, the live stream sports plate is much more crowded than you may have thought. The PBA's biggest advantage is, it has what many of those other sports wish they had, and that is regular network television exposure.

For those of you fortunate enough to have seen a PBA stop in person with FloBowling in charge of XtraFrame live stream coverage, if your eye was sharp enough, you noticed it's not the same set up as it was before.

First thing, there are four additional personnel with the announce team. From what I could tell observing, one producer and one video switcher sat with Elliott and Kurtis von Krueger. For the ball-by-ball graphics we see on each pair,

there is one data specialist on each pair manually inputting ball count into a program computing the score you see at the bottom of the screen.

When I was on with Craig Elliott and David Waswo at Copperfield Bowl for last year's Luci, it was just the three of us. Extra cameras were used to get images of the overhead score monitors on the XF pairs, Lanes 7-8, and Lanes 11-12. Three cameras per pair, for a total of six. There was an extra light source on Lanes 7- 8, providing extra light to the settee.

Elliott and I controlled the live video source you saw on your device, depending on what was happening on the two pairs. Waz did a majority of the score chasing, getting the standing sheet the nanosecond it was available, and directing viewers to the tourney Facebook page for an image of the list itself. With the occasional guest stopping by, that was pretty much it for three days. Elliott was the tech guy in case something went wrong, which fortunately didn't happen.

If you caught The Fox Network's 'Fox and Friends' four-hour morning news show this past Saturday, we were lucky to see what we did of the annual GoBowling's National Bowling Day and here's why.

Whenever there is breaking news, as was the case this past Saturday, previously planned items get their time on-air cut back. Despite social media posts saying to watch for tips and several 'teaser' plugs promising the segment later in the show, Parker Bohn III, Andrew Anderson, and Daria Pajak only got to talk with the hosts for maybe 30 seconds as two of the three hosts completed their own annual bowling challenge. Add in the heavy rain in

midtown Manhattan Saturday morning and it could have been much worse. A heavy-duty tent covered the lanes, the participants, and even the human pinsetters, also providing ball-wiping and drying service as those were returned to the bowlers in the channels. Another towel-bearing GoBowling staffer made sure the approach was kept moisture-free as anchors walked from the indoor studio to the portable lanes outside on their plaza.

Those weren't the last minute details needing attention, mind you. After the four-hour 'Fox and Friends' show ended at 10:00 am EDT, there was the effort to get Parker Bohn III to the airport so he could get back for the second round of qualifying for the PBA50 Cup in Grand Rapids, Michigan, some 620 miles and a two-hour flight away.

Anderson's schedule was almost as tricky. Competing in the PBA East Region's Bowlers Supply/Storm Open in York, Pennsylvania, 186 miles away in the southeast part of the state, west of Philadelphia, 180 miles and an hour-long flight. And yes, he was scheduled for B squad at 2:30 pm. Pajak did not compete in the PWBA BowlerX.com Twin Cities Open in Minnesota this week. Kudos to GoBowling.com for making this run as smooth as possible.

While sitting with some familiar (wishing to be anonymous USBC Hall of Famers) names for the position round match at The Luci a couple of weeks ago with some, they were in amazement at how

Liz Johnson moved to outside on the left lane only, throwing a late four-bagger in the win with E. J. Tackett over Diandra Asbaty and Jason Belmonte. Don't worry, I was also amazed. If you noticed how the pins fell, it was easy to see why. But doing it that late in the tournament's final game, well, that takes a special kind of Charlie Tapp original coined as 'maple moxie'.

I turned to them and said, yes, it indeed happened before, but not recently. In this week's JPA Lost Classic, we go back to the 1981 PBA Cleveland Open. If you saw most shows from Buckeye Lanes in North Olmsted, Ohio, the best line seemed to play better further inside for the right handers. This year was no exception.

After one strike in the first five frames and leading by one pin, the tournament top seed Mal Acosta kept the same ball, but moved to an outside line, throwing a late seven-bagger to win his first PBA title, a 235-170 over Marshall Holman. At this point in the year, Holman already had two wins and over \$60,000 in winnings. Minus many commercials, the telecast can be found here (www.youtube.com/watch?v=6O3CKmPKQrA).



ANDERSON, Ind. (Aug. 7, 2018) – Newcomer John Marsala of St. Louis, beat Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix, 224-218, in the title match to win the PBA50 Dave Small's Championship Lanes Classic presented by Roto Grip Tuesday for his first PBA50 Tour title.

Marsala, bowling in his fifth PBA50 Tour tournament, took

control after five consecutive strikes in the middle of the title match and sewed up the win with a nine count on his first ball in the 10th frame. Haugen, whose second-place finish was enough to win PBA50 Player of the Year, was unable to string strikes until the ninth and 10th frame but by then it was too late.

Marsala won all six of his matches in the final round of match play earlier in the day to earn the top spot for the stepladder finals.

"It's a dream come true," said Marsala, who won his first title in topflight competition. "Winning a tournament at this level is something I've thought about ever since I was a kid.

"I knew I had to stay relaxed because I had to make sure I kept the ball in play," the 55-year-old left-hander said of the title match. "I just had the attitude that win or lose, this tournament was a win for me. It was beyond my expectations."

Haugen, the only two-time winner this season, also has two second-place and two third-place finishes which helped him take the player of the year crown.

The 51-year-old Haugen had to work hard for his runner-up finish earning the last position in the cashers' round and then advanced through two match play rounds to earn the No. 2 qualifying position for the finals.

"To win player of the year was a goal but you never know when it's going to happen," said the 2017 PBA50 Rookie of the Year. "As the season went on the confidence was building especially after my second win but all you can do is believe in yourself and hope good things will happen.

"Like I often say; wash, rinse and repeat," Haugen added. "My goal is to keep it simple because it puts me in the best position to make the right adjustments and ball choices. I knew if I kept making shows I'd have a good shot at player of the year so I guess the formula worked."

In the opening stepladder match between two of PBA's all-time greats, Parker Bohn



said Jordan Dabby, vice-president Partnership Marketing for Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. "Our new and exciting partnership with Go Bowling highlights an activity that more than 67 million people love every year. We are thrilled to welcome Go Bowling to the Macy's Parade family and hope the entire country enjoys the most unique Turkey Day bowling tournament they've ever seen."

"The Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade is considered the start of the holiday season and an event that families across the country gather to watch and create memories," said Randy Thompson, president of the Bowling Proprietors' Association of America. "There's also nothing better than families and friends getting together over the holidays and having fun on the lanes. Our participation in the parade provides families a great reminder

of this." On Thanksgiving Day, the holiday bowling scene will come to life through nine specially created elements showcasing the fun of the game. Two 14-foot long red and blue striped bowling shoe vehicles will kick off the revelry, followed by six, 16-foot tall bowling pin balloonics (a Macy's Parade hybrid inflatable and vehicle). To complete the exhibition, a 14-foot wide bowling ball balloonicle will try to record strikes all morning as the Thanksgiving game progresses down the streets of New York City. Top Seeds Earn U20 Titles at 2018 Junior Gold Championships

ARLINGTON, Texas – Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, and Julia Huren of Westland, Michigan, each claimed emotional wins in the 20-and-under division at the 2018 Junior Gold Championships presented by the Brands of Ebonite International.

Neuer, 16, defeated Jacob Mullen of Bellingham, Washington, 267-219, in the boys stepladder final at the International Training and Research Center, while Huren, 20, knocked off Kaitlyn Eder of Lithia, Florida, 237-225, to win the girls championship.

The championship round in each division aired nationally Tuesday on CBS Sports Network.

In the boys final, Neuer provided little doubt about his intent to take home the win as the young left-hander opened the title tilt with nine consecutive strikes before leaving a 6 pin in the final frame to end his run at perfection. Mullen kept pace with strikes in six of the first eight frames, but a 4 pin in the ninth ultimately ended his chances.

Neuer exuded an increased level of focus and determination under the television lights. His experience of appearing in last year's U15 title match in Cleveland certainly helped,

but it was his desire to win for his mother, Angelina, that drove him. She passed away from breast cancer when he was 5 years old, and once the match was secured, the emotion poured out of the young champion.

"She's what drives me," Neuer said. "I just told myself I needed to keep it under control until the match is over. Then, once it was over everything else didn't matter as much. My dad (Andy) and sister (Alexis) have been important in my life. They're always there. There are times when we look back and we know stuff would be different if she was here. But, we get through it and do stuff for her."

Neuer, the inaugural U12 boys winner in 2014, avenged last year's runner-up finish to Solomon Salama of Beverly Hills, California, en route to becoming the first boy to win titles in two different age divisions.

Last year, Neuer watched as Salama tossed 11 consecutive strikes for an eventual 299 game on the way to a 553-380 victory, but this year it was Neuer who had the chance to be perfect. In all, the experience in a new division and thinking back to last year's finals all played a role in earning the win.

The 2018 event featured a different look for the televised finals, introducing a three-player stepladder final. In previous

years, the top two players in each age-based division would meet in the finals in a two-game total-pinfall match to determine the champion.

"It was fun," Neuer said. "Throughout the week, I was thinking I wanted to be back there and I wanted another shot. In the championship match, I tried to forget all of that and just bowl my game. Being in a new division was different, but after making Junior Team USA at Team (USA) Trials, I knew I belonged and I was meant to be there."

Mullen advanced to the title match after providing a mark in the 10th frame to defeat No. 2 seed Bryce Oliver of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, 244-214.

The girls championship match featured two current Junior Team USA members, but both players began with opens in the first frame and found themselves tied after two. However, it was Huren who took the advantage after tossing six consecutive strikes from frames three through eight.

Eder, the No. 2 seed, countered with a five-bagger beginning in frame six, which forced Huren to mark in the final frame to win. The right-hander struck on her first shot in the 10th to secure the win.

"I'm definitely feeling excitement," Huren said. "And, it's kind of surreal. Until I got to TV, I didn't think this was actually real. If I had let the



On the way to the gold medal, Schenck averaged nearly 231 in four matches and lost just one of the nine games he bowled.

The climb included a 2-0 (234-199, 226-199) win against Abdulrahman Alkheliwi of Saudi Arabia, a 2-0 (256-221, 266-217) victory over Sweden's Robert Lindberg and a 2-1 semifinal win against Japan's Hideaki Hata (193-210, 199-186, 213-104).

Zulkifli, who took home the Masters silver medal, earned his spot in the championship match by downing all-events silver medalist Han Jaehyeon of Korea, 2-1 (202-235, 279-210, 227-210).

In the all-Korea girls final, Lee topped Son, 2-0, to claim the gold medal.

After the two tied at 214 in the opening game, Lee won a series of three one-ball roll-offs to officially take the game and a 1-0 advantage. Both players struck on their first two shots, before Lee ended the extra play, 10-8.

Lee won the second game 223-194, giving the Koreans their first win of the 2018 World Youth Championships. Son earned the Masters silver medal.

The two also were part of Korea's silver-medal effort in team, while their teammate, Hong Sunhwa, tied for the silver medal in all-events.

Lee earned her spot in the Masters final by defeating all-events gold medalist Nur Syazwani Sahar of Malaysia, 2-0, by scores of 245-207 and 246-241. Son had to do a little more work against Australia's Emma Williamson, winning 2-1, by scores of 171-179, 227-169 and 192-189.

Sahar, Williamson, Han and Hata each earned bronze medals for advancing to the Masters semifinals.

In the final medal tally on the girls side, the United States and Korea each earned four of the 19 medals available across singles, doubles, team, all-events and Masters.

The Junior Team USA girls earned gold in team (Taylor Bailey, Breanna Clemmer, Mabel Cummins, Caitlyn Johnson), silver in singles

(Johnson), silver in doubles (Bailey and Clemmer) and bronze in singles (Clemmer).

For the boys, Sweden and Korea each earned three medals to lead the way, and Junior Team USA head coach Bryan O'Keefe expressed his pride in the way Schenck and the rest of the Junior Team USA boys - Bryan Hahlen, Jeffery Mann and Low performed all week.

"It was a tough run for us, but it means a lot to finish the way we did and get a medal," O'Keefe said. "Not only was it a medal, it was a World Championships gold medal at that. Cortez had great ball reaction and bowled well the whole week, and we knew he was going to be tough to beat in this format. I'm excited for Cortez, and I'm really proud of all the guys for fighting hard the whole way."

The World Youth Championships is held every two years, and the 2018 edition brought more than 200 competitors from 37 countries to the Detroit area.

World Bowling provided livestream coverage of the event, and bowling fans from around the globe were able

to watch the competition live from start to finish. Coverage included all qualifying, semifinal and final rounds.



course of the 2018 season.

After recording a third-place finish at the PWBA Fountain Valley Open in May, she had not approached another championship-round appearance, with a best finish of 13th at the PWBA Greater Harrisburg Open.

At last week's Pepsi PWBA St. Petersburg-Clearwater Open, travel issues caused her to miss the first round of qualifying after competing for Colombia at the Central American and Caribbean Sports Games in Barranquilla, Colombia.

Although she's still working to get back to where she'd like to be on the lanes, Restrepo now is ready to take advantage of the rest of the season.

"I know my physical game is not 100 percent yet," Restrepo said. "I know there are a lot of things to work on in the next few weeks, but I'm looking forward to competing (at the Tour Championship). Last year, I didn't perform as well as I could have, so I want to have fun and make the best of the venue we have there."

Kuhlkin had led every round leading up to the stepladder finals and made her third consecutive appearance on CBS Sports Network after winning the U.S. Women's Open and placing third last week at Seminole Lanes in Seminole, Florida.

The 24-year-old right-hander trusted her next move after making the ball change in the fifth frame and hopes to continue the momentum she's found in the second half of the season.

"I felt really good about the ball I started with, but I was confident in moving down to

the next ball after leaving the 3 pin in the fourth frame," said Kuhlkin, a two-time PWBA Tour champion. "Rocio was looking good, and I wasn't going to wait because I'm out here to win. I made the right change and made some great shots. I honestly thought I made the spare. Off my hand, I felt pretty good about it, but it caught some of the oil downlane and pushed. Those things happen, and all I can do is continue to put myself in position to win."

Restrepo earned her spot in the title match by defeating Jordan Richard of Tecumseh, Michigan, 201-170.

Restrepo was able to stay clean after an early open frame, while Richard, who's the leading candidate to claim PWBA Rookie of the Year after capturing the win at the PWBA Greater Harrisburg Open, had back-to-back open frames on the left lane to end the match.

Richard bested the front runner for PWBA Player of the Year, Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, to advance to the semifinals, 197-192. Richard bounced back from a missed 4 pin in the fourth frame to put the pressure on O'Keefe in the 10th.

O'Keefe, a two-time winner this season, needed a double in the final frame to move on, but she left her third consecutive 10 pin to finish in fourth place.

In the opening match of the stepladder finals, Richard posted an early run of five consecutive strikes against Josie Barnes of Nashville, Tennessee, to collect the win, 236-203. Barnes, the only player to roll a 300 during the week at Cedarvale Lanes, was unable to make up any ground after a pair of 7-10 splits in the first five frames.

Twin Cities Open is the second of three elite-field events taking place in August. Following the U.S. Women's Open, the top 24 players on the PWBA points list earned their way into the elite-field events with the remainder of the 32-player field determined through a pre-tournament qualifier (PTQ).

Players had 16 games of qualifying on Friday before the field was cut to the top 12. Six additional games on Saturday morning determined the five players for the stepladder finals.

MICHAEL HAUGEN JR. LOCKS UP PBA50 PLAYER OF THE YEAR HONORS

On the basis of points earned for his runner-up finish in Tuesday's PBA50 Security Federal Savings Bank Championship, presented by Track, in Anderson, Ind., 2017 PBA50 Rookie of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix has added the 2018 PBA50 Player of the Year award to his portfolio.

With only the PBA50 Cup presented by DV8 remaining on the PBA50 Tour's regular-season schedule, Haugen ended the PBA50 Player of the Year drama in Anderson by boosting his tour-leading competition points total to 28,500 – eliminating Norm Duke (20,014), Ron Mohr (19,721) and Walter Ray Williams Jr. (19,027) from contention. All three had mathematical chances to catch Haugen entering last week's tournament.

By locking up Player of the Year, Haugen became the second player to win PBA50 ROY and POY honors in consecutive years, joining Mark Roth who accomplished the feat in 2001 and '02. Duke and Tom Baker are the only two to win ROY and POY in the same year. A handful of others have won both awards, but not in the same or consecutive years.

With POY settled, the PBA50 Rookie of the Year race is still up in the air heading into the PBA50 Cup in Wyoming, Mich., along with the 12 berths in a new end-of-season PBA50 Storm Invitational that will be held at Planet Fun Bowling and Entertainment Center in Charlotte, N.C., Sept. 28-30. In addition to Haugen, Duke,

Mohr and Williams, the other eight players among the top 12 in points after Anderson include Brian Kretzer (17,015), Lennie Boesch Jr. (16,089), Ryan Shafer (14,684), Parker Bohn III (14,533), Bob Learn Jr. (14,049), Amleto Monacelli (12,634), Pete Weber (10,307) and Harry Sullins (9,814). Just off the pace are Brian Voss (9,664) and Bryan Goebel (9,430).

The PBA50 Storm Invitational will feature a field of 14 including two invitational spots to be decided later. The special event will offer a \$10,000 first prize.

Following the PBA50 Cup, Xtra Frame will cover the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship for players 60 and older, presented by 900 Global, at Pro Bowl West in Fort Wayne, Ind., Aug. 14-16, before the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour resumes competition Aug. 17-19 with the 10th anniversary Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic at Mid-County Lanes in Middletown, Del., followed by the Kenn-Feld Group Classic at Pla-Mor Lanes in Coldwater, Ohio, Aug. 24-26. PBA Tour titles will be at stake in both exclusive PBA Xtra Frame Tour events.
