

Simonsen Beats Tackett in Roll-off to Win PBA Bear Open For Seventh Career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

Simonsen beats Tackett in second one-ball roll-off 10-9 after tying 267-267 in title match

In the second tournament of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Simonsen's win came after a runner-up finish to winner Sean Rash in the PBA Wolf Open Tuesday, the first tournament of the Summer Swing.

Tackett, who finished the title match first, missed a 2 pin on his fill ball in the 10th frame which opened the door for Simonsen who needed two strikes and a nine count on his fill ball to win. Simonsen couldn't take advantage of the opportunity after he got the two strikes leaving the 3-10 split on his fill ball sending the match into overtime. Both players struck on the first roll-off ball forcing another tiebreaker which Simonsen won with a strike after Tackett left a four pin on his shot.

"I was fortunate to get into a roll-off but I didn't get it done on that last shot," said the 22-year-old Simonsen who uses the two-handed delivery.

Ex-Major League Star John Burkett Wins Houston Emerald Bowl SW Challenge for First PBA Title

HOUSTON, Texas - Former Major League Baseball All-Star John Burkett of Southlake, Texas, shot 247 in his final position round match Sunday to win his first PBA Regional title and become the first former Major Leaguer to win a PBA title at any level.

Burkett, 54, won the PBA Houston Emerald Bowl Southwest Challenge, presented by Bowling Dynamix, out-dued non-PBA member Tyler Wright of Gonzales, La., by 94 pins for the victory after swapping the lead with Wright throughout the match play finals. PBA Challenge tournaments are open to players who have not

He didn't look it or act it on the lanes, qualifying with 1,673/8 on the demanding lane condition, 67 pins ahead of the cut from a large starting field of 196 down to 48 for elimination bracket play.

In the finals, which featured stars including Jakob Butturff, Francois Lavoie, Mitch Hupe and Steve Kloempken as well as previous winners here like David Haynes, Chris Klerk and Vernon Peterson, Mellinger rode out key shots and struck out on numerous occasions to become the unbeaten top seed going 5-0 prior the championship round.

In the process, he beat Zachary Schroeder of Colorado, 386-356, Ed Smaglik of Arizona 443-436, Michael Fitzgerald of Arizona 406-341, Kris Koeltzow of Colorado 431-367 And Toby Sambueno of Nevada 430-387, with Sambueno finishing fifth for \$1,960.

The finals had one bowler each from the "four corners" states, with first up Matt Smith of New Mexico beating Rich Miller of Tucson, Arizona 462-401. Miller's first appearance at New Mexico netted him \$2,300 in fourth place.

Kloempken, of Utah, hadn't bowled here since 2007. He looked fit, and sharp, putting Smith away with a 414-397 decision, after Smith had migrated a few boards too far left, trying perhaps to avoid Kloempken's similar path to the pocket.

Smith finished third for \$3,125, the highest for a home state bowler since Tenpins' Pro-Shop operator Billy Grant took fourth in 2012.

Kloempken was consistent in his opener against Mellinger with a pair of 220's for a 443-429 win, evening the pair now at one loss apiece in a high quality pressure-packed match, viewed so far by more than 30,000 people on the (archived) BowlStreamTV.com You Tube channel.

In the final match, Mellinger put his foot on the gas with a four-bagger and turkey to take a handy lead 244-203, after Kloempken had three splits, sparing the 2-10 but including a blow-out 7-10 that cost him a potential 235.

Kloempken threw seven strikes from the first eight but a 4-6-7 in the third kept a lone double by Mellinger in front by 17. It was enough after Mellinger threw a clutch turkey in the tenth for 218 to a gallant 231 by his opponent, who collected \$6,570 as runner-up.

Mellinger averaged 213.2 over 14 games, proving that it still is "strikes for show and spares for dough" as he won


\$12,620 with only eight open frames in 22 games at an overall average of 211.7 and joining Vernon Peterson (2017) and Chris Barnes (2018) as three back-to-back winners over 40 in one of American bowling's hardest tournaments to win.

This 16th annual event attracted bowlers from Canada and thirteen states, including first-timers from North Carolina and Oregon. It paid out a record \$65,075, much of it from corporate and local sponsors, bringing to more than \$656,000 the total paid since Albuquerque's John Young won the opener in 2004 with a pay-out of \$14,000

and 78 bowlers.

A new Buick Encore SUV offered for a 300 game by the top four never got going, as Kloempken's starting double in the last game was as far as it went.

Next year's tournament is set for August 14-16, maintaining the third weekend of the month for the seventeenth renewal.

previously won a PBA title. Burkett, a lifelong bowler dating back to his formative years in the Pittsburgh area, has bowled in PBA Tour and PBA Regional competition for several years, and has been a regular on the PBA50 Tour over the past five years. His best finish in a national tournament was fourth place in the 2015 PBA50 Northern California Classic.

Burkett compiled 166 wins with 1,766 strikeouts and a 4.31 earned run average, pitching from 1987 to 2003 with the San Francisco Giants, Florida Marlins, Texas Rangers, Atlanta Braves and Boston Red Sox. His best season came in 1993 when he went 22-7 with a 3.65 ERA for the Giants. Burkett was selected to the Major League

Sam Houston State's Bea Hernandez Named 2019 PBA Billy Welu Scholarship Award Winner

 CHICAGO – Sam Houston State University sophomore and 2019 NCAA Women's Bowling Division I Rookie of the Year Bea Hernandez, has been named the winner of the 2019 PBA Billy Welu Scholarship Award which recognizes scholastic excellence and achievements in bowling.

A native of the Philippines, the 19-year-old international business major is entering her second year as a member of Sam Houston State's Bearkat women's bowling team. She holds a 3.9 grade point average, was named to the Dean's list in 2018 and most recently was named to the President's list in the spring of 2019.

In addition to her Rookie of the Year honor, she was named NCAA second team All-

American, Southland Bowling Conference Championship Most Valuable Player and Newcomer of the Year.

"As a foreign student from a developing economy who is studying here in the U.S., the scholarship means so much to me and my family," said Hernandez. "It will definitely help me fulfill my dream of being able to finish my studies here (at Sam Houston State) and at the same time being able to continue to bowl at a high level of competition.

"I also would like to extend my gratitude to the PBA for this honor and to Sam Houston State bowling coach Brad Hagen, for making me a better person both on and off the lanes, and to my Bearkat teammates and the SHSU Athletics Department for making me feel at home."

In addition to her bowling accomplishments at Sam Houston State, Hernandez is a member of both the Philippines national adult and youth teams. She earned a doubles bronze medal in the 2017 Asian Youth Bowling Championships.

The \$1,000 scholarship award was established to annually recognize a college student who combines outstanding bowling talents with academic excellence. Welu, who passed away in 1974, was best known for his expert analysis alongside legendary ABC broadcaster and PBA Hall of Famer Chris Schenkel on the "Pro Bowlers Tour" series. Welu was a two-time PBA Tour champion and a member of the PBA Hall of Fame's inaugural induction class in 1975.

Tish Johnson, Ron Mohr Ready to Lead Team USA into 2019 World Bowling Senior Championships

LAS VEGAS - When the World Bowling Senior Championships returns to Las Vegas this week, friends from dozens of countries will be reunited, and new relationships will begin.

Among the nearly 260 competitors from 41 countries will be Team USA's Tish Johnson and Ron Mohr, who have represented the United States each time since the inaugural event in 2013.

The tournament takes place every two years, and the 2019 edition will be held from Sept. 3-9 at the South Point Bowling

Plaza, the recent home of the 2019 World Bowling Women's Championships. In 2017, the World Senior Championships visited Munich.

Competitors will bowl for medals in singles, doubles, team, all-events and Masters competition.

"It has been nice getting to know players from all over the world, and the level of competition seems to get better each year," Johnson said. "But, I think we have an incredibly talented group, and we work well together. I am confident we can bring home some gold medals again this year."

Five members of the Team USA contingent also were part of the group that found success in 2017, while the three new additions have represented Team USA on the lanes in the past.

Johnson, a left-hander and United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer from Colorado Springs, Colorado, will be joined by fellow USBC Hall of Famers Leanne Hulsenberg of Pleasant View, Utah, and Lucy Sandelin of Tampa, Florida, while Sharon Powers of Lake-wood, Colorado, will experience the event for the first time.

Mohr, who resides in Las

Vegas, again will share the stage with USBC and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey and USBC Hall of Famer Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, while USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, makes his tournament debut.

"It's humbling and flattering to be selected to compete in this event each time and then have some success along the way," Mohr said. "To be able to compete in Las Vegas is special. I've probably adopted the city more than it has adopted me, but I hope there will be some hometown friends and fans to cheer us on. I do feel pretty comfortable with South Point and the environment, so that's a nice benefit as well."

To be eligible, bowlers must be 50 years of age or older during the year of the event.

Mohr acknowledged how much stronger the competitors from the other countries seem to be each time they meet, so as talented as his own team is on paper, it will take strong chemistry to elevate them above the field.

All-Star game twice, in 1993 and 2001.

In the Houston tournament, Burkett held the lead heading into the final match, 64 pins ahead of Jordan Malott, the 15-year-old son of PBA star Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas. Burkett started the final game with four strikes as Malott managed early spares before opening in the third frame. Burkett then coasted to a 247-203 win while Wright regained second place with a 224-203 win over non-member Kaden Rogillio of Deer Park, Texas. Burkett finished the tournament with 4,946 total pins for 21 games, including match play bonus pins, while Wright totaled 4,852, and Malott 4,808.

Jason Sterner Wins FloBowling PBA Illinois Open For Third Career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 31, 2019) – Jason Sterner of Rochester, New York, won all four stepladder final matches including a 243-212 title match victory over top seed EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, to win the FloBowling PBA Illinois Open Saturday for his third career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title. The Illinois Open was the pinnacle event of the three-tournament FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International at Parkside Lanes.

In a stepladder final that featured a dual lane condition pattern – PBA 41-foot Bear condition on the left lane and 32-foot Wolf condition on the right lane – both players started the title match with a spare and two strikes but Sterner was able to pull away when Tackett missed a 3-6-10 spare in the fourth frame. Sterner put together four more strikes that ultimately proved too much for Tackett to overcome.

As the No. 5 seed for the finals, Sterner won his position round match in the final match

play round against 11-time tour winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, 256-199, to make it into the finals.

“I think that (position round) win really relaxed me and put me in a good mindset for the finals,” said the 35-year-old Sterner. “I felt fortunate to make the finals, so my attitude was let’s throw a lot of strikes and go have some fun.”

The win ended a two-year drought for Sterner whose last title came in the PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles (with Birgit Poppler) in July of 2017.

“I had been struggling for a long time, but I made a (ball) grip change about four months ago and made some other physical changes,” Sterner said. “My game wasn’t evolving the way it should to keep up with the younger guys so I had to make some changes and just committed to them. There was some trial and error but now I’m really confident my game’s moving in the right direction.”

Sterner opened the stepladder finals with a 248-184 win over No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, who won the PBA Bear Open on Thursday for his seventh career title.

In the second match, Sterner then beat PBA Wolf Open winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 259-225, to advance to the semifinal match where he beat No. 2 seed two-hander Jason Belmonte of Australia, 236-208, to advance to the title match against Tackett. Tackett was trying for his second win of the season and 14th of his career.

“The win against Jason (Belmonte) gave me a lot of confidence heading into the title match,” Sterner said. “I had my share of ugly strikes, but I was thinking just knock 10 pins down, fill the frames and hope the breaks would go my way.”

Belmonte, a four-time PBA Player of the Year, was trying for his fifth win of the season and 23rd of his career.

As the points leader for the nine-tournament FloBowling PBA Summer Tour, Rash, whose Wolf Open win was the 14th of his career and second of the season, won the USBC Cup and \$20,000 first prize.

To make the Illinois Open stepladder finals, the five finalists advanced from the 14 games of qualifying in both the PBA Wolf and Bear Opens earlier in the week and then competed in 24 games of match play which also used the dual

Wolf and Bear lane conditions.



Rash Defeats Simonsen to Win PBA Wolf Open for 14th career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 27, 2019) – In front of a hometown crowd, Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, beat Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, 257-193, in the title match to win the PBA Wolf Open Tuesday at Parkside Lanes for his second Go Bowling! PBA Tour title of the season and the 14th of his career.

In the opening tournament of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Rash, the No. 3 seed for the finals

was able to jump out to the early lead after Simonsen, the No. 1 seed, threw a gutter ball and opened in the third frame. After two spares in the fourth and fifth frames, Rash threw five consecutive strikes which sealed the match win.

Simonsen, who won the 2018 Wolf Open, was trying for his second title of the season after winning the PBA Players Championship in February for his sixth career title and second major.

“Anthony had a couple bad frames and I thought now is

my chance to put it away,” Rash said. “I just took some deep breaths, refocused and made the good shots I needed to make.”

Rash advanced to the title match by beating No. 2 seed PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke in the semifinal 257-227.

“This is the third year we’ve hosted a tournament (at Parkside Lanes) and I’ve never made a show,” said Rash, who teamed with Matt Ogle to win the PBA Roth-Holman Doubles Championship in January for his first title of the season. “All I can say is it’s unbelievable to win here in front of my friends and family – it means a lot.”

Rash was coming off a runner-up finish in the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic last week where he lost to Tommy

Jones 215-179 in the title match of that tournament.

“There have been some ups and downs but overall it’s been a solid season,” Rash said. “I’ve always felt that if I just continued to work hard and believe in myself, good things will happen.”

The 55-year-old Duke was trying for his third win of the season and the 41st of his career. He won the Go Bowling! Indianapolis and Jonesboro Opens earlier in the year to become the oldest player to win four titles back to back.

In the opening stepladder match, Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina beat Greg Young of Viera, Florida, 264-206, to advance to the second stepladder match where he lost to Rash 217-180. Troup was

trying for his fourth career title and Young his first.

"I threw two good shots in the 10th but I rushed the last shot and it got away from me a little bit. Looking back, I probably should have backed off and taken more time to refocus.

"Once we both struck on the first ball (of the rolloff) I felt I had to get it done the second

time because EJ was throwing the ball well too and you're not going to get many chances against a player of his ability," said Simonsen, who was the No. 2 seed for the finals.

Simonsen won the PBA Players Championship in February for his first title of the season to become the youngest player to win two majors.

"When I first started my dream was to win one title by

this time in my career but to have seven is unbelievable," Simonsen added."

Tackett was trying for his second title of the season and 14th of his career after winning the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals in July.

The stepladder finals started with No. 5 seed Kyle Sherman, trying for a second tour title, beating No. 4 seed 10-time tour winner Wes Malott 207-191 in the opening match. In the second match, Sherman beat No. 3 seed four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte 247-237 who was trying for his fifth win of the season and 23rd of his career. Simonsen then went on to beat Sherman 278-225 in the semifinal to advance to the title match.

With the conclusion of Bear Open qualifying earlier in the day, Simonsen led 24 players who advanced to PBA Illinois Open match play with a 6,532 28-game pinfall total (233 average). The Illinois Open is the third and final event of the week-long Summer Swing at Parkside Lanes.

"The world has become incredibly and increasingly more competitive, but, even today, if you look at the teams on paper, we should be one of the favorites," Mohr said. "Unfortunately, we don't bowl on paper, we bowl on the lanes. So, we'll see how it works out. It all comes down to how we gel as a team."

Boresch will be joining Mohr on the lanes for the third time, and Bohn will make his second consecutive appearance at the event. That experience, plus the many weeks the team members spend bowling against each other in PBA50 competition, means they're familiar with each other's games and demeanor on the lanes.

To maximize their cohesion, there will be conversations among the players and Team USA assistant coach Bill Spigner to clarify how they see things on the lanes and how they prefer to share and receive feedback.

The United States will enter the 2019 World Senior Championships as the defending champion in every event but women's doubles, and preparing for the event, both on and off the lanes, as noted by Mohr, is not something the team members take lightly.

It already has been announced the upcoming event at the South Point Bowling

Plaza will feature one of the oil patterns from World Bowling's Bank 40, which means it could be any one of six patterns, ranging from 40 to 44 feet.

Though the actual pattern won't be announced until the team managers' meeting on Monday, the team members have enough information to get the ball rolling - literally.

To make sure she's ready for these events, Johnson works with USBC Gold coach Hank Boomershire to select and lay out the equipment they think will work best. Johnson, who has a lifetime of pro shop experience, drills them, adjusts the surfaces and practices as much as possible to get a feel for the arsenal.

As a lifetime professional bowler and pro shop operator, Johnson hopes she can offer her expertise to the team when it comes to ball motion, equipment selection and surface preparation.

Just the opportunity to have teammates, while also representing the United States, is something she always hoped for.

"While I was out on the (Professional Women's Bowling Association) Tour, I always said I'd like to have the opportunity to represent the United States on the lanes someday. It was something I didn't know I'd ever get to experience, but I'm very proud to have the opportunity," Johnson said.

"Being on that stage makes my heart race and makes my hands sweaty. Even during the opening ceremony. The first time up on that podium, I had goosebumps and was shaking. To hear the national anthem and see that flag is as American as it gets."

Competition at the 2019 World Senior Championships will get underway Wednesday with men's singles. There will be a formal opening ceremony Tuesday night at 7 p.m. Eastern.

doubles.

Rodriguez attributes her success this week to learning from all of the close calls and mistakes she has experienced in her career, including not throwing the shots when she needed them earlier in the 2019 World Women's Championships.

It may not have seemed so at the time, but missing the cut to the singles semifinals by three pins may have been the best thing that could've happened the two-time Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour titlist.

"I think I was able to come through later in the week because I didn't do it in singles, if that makes sense," said Rodriguez, who has participated

in seven World Championships. "In singles, I tied up, I was shaking and it reminded me of when I did the same thing two years ago. Then, in doubles and trios and team, I didn't do that. I forced myself to learn from it."

In Friday's team final, Rodriguez threw one of the most memorable shots of her career, striking in her final frame to lift the Colombia women to their first team gold medal in World Bowling World Championships competition.

Colombia and Sweden went the distance in the best-of-three Baker final at the South Point Bowling Plaza, and while Rodriguez's strike sealed the win, spare shooting actually decided the outcome of Colombia's 2-1 victory.

Early in the finale, Swedish sisters Cajsja and Jenny Wegner missed 2 pins in consecutive frames. Despite the miscues, Sweden rallied and managed to grab a two-pin lead heading into the final frame, putting

the decision in the hands of the talented anchors - Rodriguez and fellow PWBA Tour champion Sandra Andersson.

After Andersson rung a 10 pin on her first shot, Rodriguez stepped up and delivered for a 222-202 victory.

"When I was in the team event and needed to strike, everything was shaking, probably even my eyelashes, but I thought about the shot I threw at the end of singles and refused to do it again," Rodriguez said. "This is what we train for, and it was amazing to see the hard work finally pay off. For it to happen in the team event means so much. We all have worked so hard, and it's incredible to make history for our country."

The rest of the three-game final match was equally interesting.

Sweden had a chance to win the opening game after Rodriguez left, and missed, a washout in the 10th frame. Andersson needed a strike on her fill ball but left the 2-8 combination to fall short, 205-204.

Game 2 featured an uncharacteristic mistake from Colombia's Laura Plazas, who missed a 1-2-4 combination. Sweden tossed four consecutive strikes starting in the sixth frame and came away with a 235-220 win.

Both of Colombia's wins in the championship match came on the left lane, which gave all four teams trouble during the team medal round.

Rodriguez and Plazas were joined in the win by Clara Guerrero, Rocio Restrepo, Juliana Franco and Anggie Ramirez Perea.

The team's previous best finish in the team event was a silver medal in 1999. They also earned bronze medals in 2003, 2011 and in Las Vegas in 2017.

Friday's team win was a bit of redemption for Thursday's doubles event, where Colombia qualified two teams for the medal round but failed to advance to the gold-medal match.

"To be honest, I'm a little shocked," Restrepo said. "Yesterday, I bowled 12 really good shots, and it didn't happen. Today, I did the same and I'm probably going to be super drained because it's so much emotion. I was shaking. At one point I thought I was going to faint after striking. But I was like, you have to keep it together."

Sweden's roster also include Joline Persson Planefors and Josefin Hermansson. On Thursday, Wegner and Hermansson won the doubles event for Sweden's first medal since 2009

and first gold medal since 2007.

Colombia, the No. 4 qualifier, was the only team able to conquer the left lane during the team semifinals, and it helped the quintet to a 2-1 victory over top-seeded Team USA.

The qualifying leaders started on the right lane and rolled to a 239-182 victory, before falling victim to the challenging left lane on the way to a four-strike, four-open 222-154 loss.

An early 7-10 split from Missy Parkin put the United States behind early in the deciding game, but the team battled back, giving anchor Shannon O'Keefe a chance to throw a double for the win. Her first offering resulted in another 7-10, however, ending Team USA's bid for a third team gold medal since 2011 by a score of 225-211.

The match featured nine PWBA champions among the 12 players - Stefanie Johnson, Liz Kuhlkin, Danielle McEwan, O'Keefe, Parkin and Jordan Richard for the United States and Guerrero, Restrepo and Rodriguez for Colombia.

It was the second consecutive heartbreaking finish for Team USA at the South Point

Bowling Plaza.

At the 2017 combined World Championships, the United States, the defending champion, missed the medal round by two pins. This time, Team USA tied the six-game qualifying record and led No. 2 seed Mexico by 379 pins, before the format changed to the knockout-style Baker matches.

Team USA was looking to become the first No. 1 seed of the week to finish the job and win the gold medal.

"It's pretty disappointing to lead by almost 400 pins and have it all come down to that one shot," Team USA head coach Rod Ross said. "We just got a couple of bad breaks with the 7-10, and if either of those fall and we get a spare, we're in that final match. This one's going to sting for a while. I'm heartbroken for the girls because they work so hard and put everything on the line."

In the first team semifinal, the left lane proved to be the difference, as all three win in the match came on the right lane. Sweden topped Mexico, 2-1 (223-192, 183-244, 212-188).

The deciding game came down to the final frame.

Three strikes from Mexico anchor Iliana Lomeli would've sent her team to the final, but she left the 3-6-9-10 combination on her first shot. Anders-

son had just delivered a strike for Sweden, and that ended up being more than enough to seal the win.

Mexico was represented in the team event by Sandra Gongora, Paola Limon, Iliana Lomeli, Adriana Perez, Lilia Robles and Aseret Zetter.

As the tournament wound down, Rodriguez, Tan, Team USA's Danielle McEwan and Sanna Pasanen of Finland took the lanes for the conclusion of the Masters event.

In the first best-of-three semifinal, Tan topped McEwan, 2-1 (165-212, 236-184, 244-213), and then Rodriguez again delivered in the final frame, striking to sneak past Pasanen, 2-1 (223-232, 257-221, 216-210).

The Masters final was the only match of the day that didn't go three games. Tan claimed Singapore's second gold medal in World Championships competition, 2-0 (203-201, 258-217).

"It means everything because everyone works so hard to come here and try to win," Tan said. "I've been trying for so many years and came close so many times. It's really something. The pressure is high, but we have been coming close for almost 10 years now. It feels really great to bring home a gold for Singapore."

Shayna Ng won Singapore's

first gold medal in all-events at the 2015 event in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates.

The 2019 World Women's Championships started with 176 competitors from 34 countries, who competed for medals in singles, doubles, trios, team, all-events and Masters competition. All games were contested on the 39-foot World Bowling Seoul oil pattern.

The 34 countries that participated this year were: Australia, Bahamas, Brazil, Bulgaria, Canada, China, Colombia, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Guam, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Israel, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Mexico, Mongolia, New Zealand, Philippines, Poland, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Singa-

pore, Spain, Sweden, Chinese Taipei, Thailand, United States, Ukraine and Venezuela.

Team USA and Colombia topped the medal table this week with six medals apiece. Sweden claimed four, Korea had three, Mexico earned two and Singapore and Finland took home one each.

McEwan was the top performer for Team USA, winning gold in singles and bronze medals in team and Masters. If she would've won the Masters event, she would've become the first woman in tournament history with a gold medal in each discipline.

O'Keefe also earned three medals this week - silver in singles and bronze medals in

Many bowlers recently finding the sport only know bowling centers, only venturing out to bowl in cosmic or glow-in-the-dark versions. Amongst those centers are places once known as that word many have tried to banish from existence, "alleys."

JPA returns this week to the work of a familiar name and the latest update on his signature project, The Vintage Alleys Project by Kevin Hong. As seen for most of the last couple of months on his Facebook

page and now on his website, vintagebowling.net, Hong travelled to upstate New York to have a look around at lanes built in summer resorts and a handful of private homes in the 1950's at the latest, with one place in particular finding its way into a critically-acclaimed streamed television series.

Upstate resorts, like Scott's Oquaga Lake House in Deposit, New York, seen in Season Two of "The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel," the comedy/period drama set in the late 1950's

releases its third season on Amazon Prime in December.

Hong is also offering what he calls a film festival. According to a Facebook page post, he will post a photo of classic bowling equipment, like a nearly 100-year-old overground ball return rack, explain the origin of the photo, then share a video clip from a feature film showing that or a very similar piece of equipment.

Hong did pass on getting another shot of me sticking my hand in the ball return, the same one the Roy Munson character did in "Kingpin" from my trip visit my dad in the 'Burgh for his birthday this past February.

Hong, who also has worked in mainstream media, answered a couple of questions about this labor of love.

JPA: What was your impression of all the lanes in resorts?

Kevin Hong: I visited 8 places in 3 days. About 808 miles and 15 hours of driving - that doesn't even count the time spent at each location. I loved visiting the places and wished I'd had more time at each site. You have to remember, they were built as playgrounds and resorts for the rich and famous. Now they operate as museums and resorts that are open to the paying public (who have purchased admission or made a reservation), so the locations are still quite impressive. And everywhere I went, the little two or four lane bowling alley with manual pinsetting was a highlight for all the visitors — most of whom are only used to seeing bowling in the context of a big, modern center with everything automated.

JPA: Was manual pinsetting the highlight?

Hong: Yes! Manual pinsetting is so cool to watch in person. Every time I posted a picture, someone said they wanted to bowl on those lanes with their Columbia Blue Dot. Well, forget it, these lanes are bare wood. They're just bowled on for fun by guests and visitors using house balls. Any Blue Dot or even a rubber ball, thrown with any hint of side rotation, would hook off the lanes! Viewers asked, "do they oil?" and the answer is no. These places are just for fun and the guests set their own pins. Adding oil to the lanes adds an extra dimension of liability that no operator wants and besides, these are not regular bowling centers so there's no staff to oil, dust and strip regularly. The lanes take more of a beating than wood lanes should, but on the plus side, they are used much less often than a lane in a public bowling center would be.

Even if you haven't seen or

ever wondered how bowling functioned or looked like in the early days of automatic pinsetting or manual pinsetting, this is one incredible piece you must see.

His critics didn't like the distinctive pushaway he taught his players. They all looked a little too much the same was the claim, almost clones, some even naming the pushaway after him. But it worked. He wanted them a use different release to shoot spares, even when using more aggressive equipment. That worked, too.

Despite the claims, Bill Straub produced results and some pretty good players for thirty-six seasons for both the women's and men's Nebraska Cornhusker bowling teams. Last Wednesday in the women team's first meeting of the 2019-2020 season, suddenly announced his retirement from coaching, effective immediately. Straub was one of the first notable coaches to have success first as a professional bowler, then even more success as a collegiate coach, winning national titles for both men's and women's squads. The numbers are amazing and pretty much speak for themselves.

Twelve national championships featuring players too numerous to name with titles on both pro tours (Paul Fleming and Mike Shady first come to mind). Straub and his 'Husker program even drew recent attention from mainstream sports media outlets like HBO's Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel and the New York Times.

Straub also gave me a few quotes over the years, especially about one unique moment in his PBA days. As highlighted twice as a JPA Lost Classic, he was the opponent when Mark Roth picked up the 7-10 split, a first on national television in 1980.

There was the aortic dissection issue five years ago, slowing him down just a little. Straub first thought of retirement once his daughter,

Meghan, made it through her four years of playing eligibility for NU. Once she did complete it this spring, the mental tennis match ensued of whether to retire or keep going.

Not only will the Lady Huskers be without Bill and Meghan, but also Bill's wife and Meghan's mom, Kim, who is also retiring as the team's office manager.

Not only did I get to watch Straub coach, but also see how he communicated with his players after a day on the tournament lanes, as they stopped in each fall for Sam Houston State University's (SHSU) Kat Klash at Houston's Emerald Bowl. He expected each of the players, future PWBA champs Liz Kuhlkin and Julia Bond among them, to answer their own questions about ball preparation for the following day, as assistant coach Paul Klempka worked his magic at the Nebraska ball spinner. Straub challenged his players to explain their answers and why they thought it would work, very often correct.

The last time I watched the tournament unfold in person, Straub was kind enough to be interviewed after Nebraska's win two years ago after their 2017 Kat Klash victory. As part of the SHSU official live stream, Straub took time for some questions of mine as the team prepared to return back to Lincoln. Even though time was tight, Bill made sure I had the answers I needed, thanked me for MY time, shook my hand, then left.

Competitor, driven, class, results, and a hell of a coaching history all describe Straub.

This week's JPA Lost Classic shows the grit of a younger Straub as he won the 1982 PBA Rolands Open at Dick Weber Lanes in Florissant, Missouri, his lone PBA singles tour title. The clip is found here: (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=F0p7bwstgGk>).



Who Needs Practice?
 You just stand there and throw here. It's not that hard. What do you need to practice for? Maybe you'll get better through osmosis! Gripping because your average doesn't go up or thinking that bowling a game before league constitutes practice or calling the ten minute league warmup period a training session won't serve you well. Training is a concentrated, goal-driven, and specific time devoted to the improvement of your skill level.
 Any skill change is driven by repetition. To make something a habit, to insert

it in your sub-conscious as a keeper, takes many reps with the specific goal of adopting the new skill. Its effectiveness cannot be measured under fire. Therefore, you have to own it so that when it's really time to test it under fire, it doesn't crumble.
 I recommend the Talent Code by Daniel Coyle to you. He studied outstanding athletes and musicians and all kinds of talented folks all over the world and discovered some very interesting things about talent and skill. For example, they are grown. You may not have come onto the planet with

great bowling ability but you absolutely can grow it. Sometimes people come to their lesson and tell me they haven't practiced and they just aren't seeing any improvement for their investment in lessons. I guess not. Sometimes people try something once or twice in league and when it doesn't work, discard it as though the new skill had failed when actually, it had no chance to succeed.
 In addition to skill acquisition, training is something you must do to stay sharp competitively. People who bowl four leagues a week, for example, are either really bad (there's no time to work on any improvement or additional skills) or think they are good enough (since there's no time to work on improvement or additional skills). If you take the summer off, it's usually November before you are back in the

groove. Now sometimes that groove is the same old, same old where you are unintentionally getting your average back down where you can handle it and sometimes you start to see glimpses of the good bowler

you were when you stopped in May. Either way the layoff hurt. Train to get great and stay great. It actually can be fun especially with the Training Games available at strikeability.com.

Sean Rash Tops USBC Cup, FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points Races

 AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 31, 2019) – Jason Sterner's victory in the PBA Illinois Open, the concluding event in the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, at Parkside Lanes Saturday was not only the most memorable of his 13-year PBA Tour career, but resulted in rewards far beyond his third career title and a \$20,000 payday.

The 35-year-old right-hander, newly-relocated to Rochester, New York, knocked off four future PBA Hall of Fame candidates – Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas; Sean Rash, Montgomery, Illinois; Jason Belmonte, Australia, and EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Indiana – to also earn 5,000 competition points that allowed him to share in three incentive programs tied to the FloBowling Summer Tour.

For starters, he advanced from 34th place to fourth in the USBC Cup point standings to earn a \$3,000 bonus. By defeating Tackett for the Illinois Open title, Sterner denied Tackett the points he needed to overtake Rash for first place in the USBC Cup points competition. Rash won the USBC Cup, earning a \$20,000 bonus. Tackett finished second for \$10,000, Simonsen was third for \$5,000 and AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, took home the \$2,000 bonus for fifth place.

By qualifying fourth in Summer Tour points, Sterner also earned a berth in the FloBowling ATX Invite that will take place on September 21 at Dart

Bowl in Austin, Texas, and pay \$25,000 to the winner along with guaranteed money to all eight qualifiers. Sterner also qualified for an expenses-paid trip to China for the first PBA China Tiger Cup that will take place in suburban Shanghai November 19-21 where another \$20,000 tops the guaranteed money all eight will earn.

There were no major changes among the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour's top eight money-winners who will participate in the second PBA Clash at the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Florida, on October 21. The Clash will air on FOX on Nov. 3. With only money won in the ATX Invite remaining to influence the earnings list, Australia's Jason Belmonte is No. 1 and can't be caught.

Belmonte leads the PBA Tour with \$275,290 in official earnings. He is followed by Jakob Butturff, Tempe, Ariz., \$185,780; Kris Prather, Plainfield, Ill., \$173,990; EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Ind., \$166,695; Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas, \$155,690; Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., \$152,148, and Sean Rash, Montgomery, Ill., \$119,170, in seventh place. Norm Duke, Clermont, Fla., is eighth with \$97,415, and could be knocked out of the top eight if Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Mo. (in ninth place with \$78,968) wins the \$20,000 top prize in Austin.



AT AGE 22, SIMONSEN BECOMES YOUNGEST TO QUALIFY FOR PBA HALL OF FAME BALLOT...IN 2033

With his victory Thursday in the PBA Bear Open, the second event in the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing, Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, became the youngest player in PBA history to qualify for eventual placement on the PBA Hall of Fame ballot. The thing is, he has a considerable wait ahead of him.

There are two key qualifiers to become PBA HOF-eligible. First is "title eligibility," which calls for winning a minimum of 10 "standard" PBA Tour titles or five "standard" titles plus two majors. The Bear Open was Simonsen's fifth standard title, won at age 22 years, 235 days. He also has won two majors: the 2016 USBC Masters and the PBA Players Championship earlier this year.

The second qualifier to

get on the PBA HOF ballot is 20 years of PBA membership. Assuming he will remain a member, Simonsen will reach his 20-year requirement in 2033.

In that unusual record category, Simonsen displaced EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., his victim in Thursday's Bear Open title match. Tackett became HOF "title eligible" when he won the 2017 PBA Tournament of Champions in Shawnee, Okla., at the age of 24 years, 191 days. Tackett, who now owns a total of 13 PBA Tour titles, also is on the wait list for participation eligibility. He'll be on the HOF ballot a year ahead of Simonsen, in 2032.

MYKEL HOLLIMAN TOPS PBA TOUR ROOKIES IN COMPETITION POINTS

Thanks to his runner-up finish in the USBC Masters, 26-year-old Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tenn., continues to pace rookies on the overall 2019 PBA Points list, which is a barometer of how players on the 2019 Bowl4Life PBA Rookie Watch list are faring in their first year of PBA Tour competition. The points list

will be one of the factors voters consider when they select the 2019 Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year. Other rookies on the watch list are Kenneth Ryan of Farmingdale, N.J.; Wichita's Patrick Hanrahan; Mike Coffey of Melbourne, Fla.; Jake Rollins of Glen Rock, N.J. and Greg Young of Viera, Fla.
