

Dom Barrett Wins 2018 BPAA U.S. Open

WICHITA, Kan. – England's Dom Barrett won four matches Wednesday on his way to claiming the 2018 U.S. Open, including a thrilling one-pin victory over top-seed Jakob Butturff of Chandler, Arizona, in the title match, 207-206.

The 33-year-old right-hander became the third foreign-born player to win the U.S. Open, joining Finland's Mika Koivuniemi (2001) and Canada's Francois Lavoie (2016). He earned the \$30,000 top prize and coveted green jacket presented to the champion.

Wednesday's stepladder finals at Northrock Lanes were televised live on CBS Sports

Network.

The title match swung back and forth as both players tried to figure out the 43-foot oil pattern. An open in the fifth frame from Barrett gave Butturff a slight advantage, as both competitors headed into the final frame working on doubles.

Butturff, finishing the match first, nearly left a 7-10 split on his first shot before the 7 pin tumbled late. He converted the spare and struck on his fill ball, forcing Barrett to strike on his first shot for a chance at the title.

Barrett rolled the strike

ARLINGTON, Texas - The Rat Pack, Wayne Newton, Elvis, Celine Dion and Siegfried and Roy all are synonymous with entertainment in Las Vegas.

If bowlers were to have a seat at their table, there's no doubt that Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois, has the resume and following to fill the role.

The 14-time Team USA member has enjoyed on-lane success at bowling centers across The Entertainment Capital of the World, and she officially solidified her place as Nevada royalty when she won the 2018 United States Bowling Congress Queens in nearby Reno, Nevada.

Now, O'Keefe is looking to add to her list of accomplishments at the upcoming



QubicaAMF Bowling World Cup, which will be held at Las Vegas' Sam's Town Bowling Center from Nov. 5-10. Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina, will represent the United States on the men's side.

This year's QubicaAMF World Cup is the 54th edition of the prestigious event and will feature bowlers from more than 80 countries. The event will be streamed live on BowlTV (YouTube.com/BowlTV).

"The World Cup trophy is iconic in our sport like the

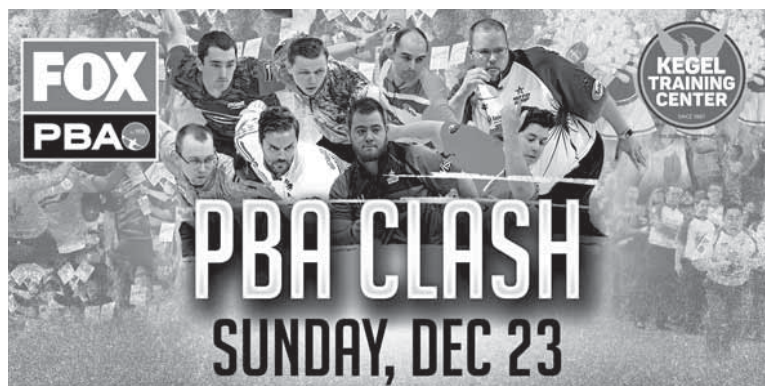

Central Florida's Kegel Training Center to Host Star-Powered 2018 PBA Clash

LAKE WALES, Fla. (Nov. 2, 2018) – Kegel Training Center in central Florida, one of bowling's most technically-advanced bowling facilities, will host the 2018 PBA Clash, a special

showcase event for eight of the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's top stars that also will include a preview of the PBA's historic 2019 debut on FOX Sports.

The announcement was made by Kegel CEO Chris

Chartrand and PBA CEO-Commissioner Tom Clark.

The 90-minute PBA Clash will take place at the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales at 6 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 10 and will air on Sunday, Dec. 23, at either 2:30 or 4:30 p.m. EST (depending upon the viewer's location). Admission will be \$10. Tickets will be available at the door or they may be purchased online through the PBA's official website (<https://www.pba.com/Tickets>).

PBA fans may recall the high-tech 12-lane Kegel Training Center was the host center for the PBA King of Bowling series and the PBA Women's

Series Showdown in 2009.

The Clash telecast will include a \$25,000 winner-take-all single-elimination competition in which all eight of the 2018 season's leading money winners will begin by bowling a ninth-and-10th frame round, with the lowest scoring bowler based on total pinfall for two frames being eliminated. Subsequent elimination rounds will be one-ball, low-man-out until two survivors remain. The final match will be a traditional 10-frame game.

Players who will participate in the Clash are Jason Belmonte, Anthony Simonsen, Andrew Anderson, EJ Tackett, Dom Barrett, Stuart Williams, Marshall Kent and Jakob Butturff.

The telecast also will feature profiles on each of the

Qualifying in 5th place was the team of John Shuffler, Phil Kepner, Sandi Charles, and Anthony Lavery-Spahr...and wouldn't you know it, they ran the ladder and defeated the tournament leaders to claim

the title.

I'm very excited for Shuffler to get his very first SASBA title with his longtime team. He's a great bowler, but an even greater guy, and I know this one means a ton to him. Also, very happy to see our best buddy Sandi get her first non-member "SASBA title," she bowled rock solid all weekend.

Fields Set for 2018 PBA Clash, 2019 DHC PBA Japan Invitational

Wednesday's U.S. Open finals closed the book on the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule, which also means the field of eight qualifiers for the end-of-season PBA Clash and 10 invitations to participate in the 2019 DHC PBA Japan Invitational are set.

The 2018 PBA Clash, a special event involving the season's top eight players in combined PBA Tour and World Bowling Tour earnings, is set for Monday, Dec. 10, at Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Fla., and also will serve as the kickoff event for the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's inaugural season of television coverage on FOX and FS1 which begins with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic from the International Training and Research Center in Arlington, Texas, on Sunday, Jan. 6.

The PBA Clash will air on FOX on Sunday, Dec. 23, at 2:30 or 4:30 p.m. Eastern, depending upon where the viewers live. General admission for the Clash will be \$10, but a limited number of VIP tickets, sponsored by Central Florida Sports, will be available for

\$40 including early access at 3:30 p.m., an interactive Q&A session with PBA players at 4 p.m., dinner at 5 p.m. and a Kegel gift bag. Tickets will be available at the door or they may be purchased online in advance through the PBA's official website (<https://www.pba.com/Tickets>).

The players who have qualified for the PBA Clash are Australia's Jason Belmonte, Anthony Simonsen of Austin, Texas; Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich.; EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind.; newly-crowned U.S. Open champion Dom Barrett of England; fellow Brit Stuart Williams who now lives in the Phoenix area; Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., and U.S. Open runner-up Jakob Butturff of Chandler, Ariz.

Based on competition points earned during the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, the 10 players who have earned invitations to compete in the DHC PBA Japan Invitational that will take place April 25-28 at Tokyo Port Bowl in Tokyo are Anderson; Simonsen; Tackett; Williams; Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill.;

Belmonte; Kent; Butturff; Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., and Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Mich. Barrett, as defending champion, also is invited. The field of 16 international players who will compete against 16 Japanese bowlers also will include three players invited by DHC, the tournament sponsor; one member of the Korean PBA, and one member of the Professional Women's Bowling Association who will be announced later.

NCAA trophy is to our college team, and seeing my Team USA teammates hold up the World Cup in the past really inspired me," said O'Keefe, the head women's bowling coach at McKendree University. "The possibility of being able to do that, too, would be such an amazingly proud moment."

The 39-year-old right-hander's time in Las Vegas has yielded eight medals in international competition, including three world championships, two titles at the 2016 USBC Women's Championships and two wins at the USBC Team

USA Trials.

It was her victory at the 2018 Team USA Trials that earned her a spot at this year's World Cup, an opportunity she did not have when she won the Team Trials for the first time in 2008.

She was especially disappointed because she'd just gotten to experience the 2007 World Cup in St. Petersburg, Russia, through her role at the time with World Bowling, and she was enamored by the history and prestige.

"When things changed, and winning the Team USA Trials again included qualifying for the World Cup, that really pushed me to want to win, along with earning a

spot on Team USA, of course," O'Keefe said. "The World Cup has representatives from more places than any other tournament, and I'm very excited to meet players from so many countries. QubicaAMF also is an incredible sponsor for the (Professional Women's Bowling Association), so that connection is appreciated, too. It's almost hard to put it all into words."

O'Keefe will make the trip to Las Vegas straight from Houston, where the McKendree Bearcats will be competing in the TRACK Kat Klash.

Though she'll be wearing her coaching hat, instead of her bowling shoes for a few

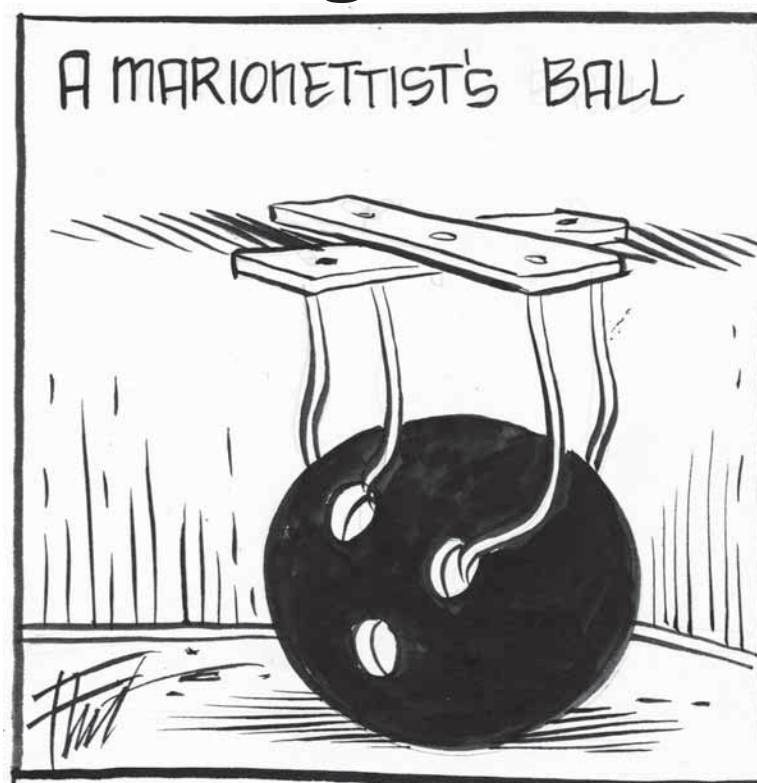

days, she expects that reading ball reaction and keeping the team members lined up during the tournament will help keep her sharp and prepared for the World Cup.

Physically, O'Keefe is at the top of her game, following a PWBA season that ended in September with player-of-the-year honors and was followed by a three-medal week at the Pan American Bowling Confederation Women's Championships in the Dominican Republic.

Troup heads to Sam's Town at the end of a successful Professional Bowlers Association Tour season that included 13 cashes in 18 events and his third career PBA Tour title at the Lucky Larsen Masters in August.

The 27-year-old two-hander also is looking for some redemption, however, after a disappointing 80th-place finish

at this week's 144-player U.S. Open in Wichita, Kansas.

"Overall, this has been one of the best years I've had on Tour, plus starting off the year with a win at the Team USA Trials was awesome, too," said Troup, a first-time Team USA member also selected as part of the six-player contingent headed to the World Bowling Men's Championships in Hong Kong in November. "Tulsa (Flo-Bowling PBA Fall Swing) and the U.S. Open didn't go how I'd hoped, but I've been practicing every day to fix anything in my game that didn't look quite right. I've been very focused on staying competitive, even during practice, and I am excited to be able to represent Team USA at the World Cup."

At the 2017 QubicaAMF World Cup in Hermosillo, Mexico, Jakob Butturff of Chandler, Arizona, took home the men's title, a memorable run fueled by his own disappointment at the U.S. Open, where he finished second after leading the field by more than

600 pins through 56 games.

The women's title went to Krizziah Lyn Tabora, who was the first woman from the Philippines to win the event since her country claimed back-to-back women's titles in 1978 and 1979. Butturff and Tabora will not be in attendance in 2018.

The last time the World Cup was held in the United States, also at Sam's Town, was in 2015, and the titles went to Colombia's Clara Guerrero and Wu Siu Hong of Hong Kong. Neither will compete in 2018.

The field this year will include a few past winners - Aumi Guerra of the Dominican Republic (2010, 2011), Osku

Palermaa of Finland (2006) and Mel Oates of Wales (2000).

The World Cup first was contested in 1965, and the tournament now is considered one of the sport's most prestigious singles titles. It also is recognized as the largest event in the sport in terms of number of countries competing.

Competitors this year will bowl 24 games over three days, beginning Tuesday, and the field then will be cut to the top 24 men and top 24 women for eight additional games. After 32 games, total pinfall will determine the eight bowlers in each division for eight games of round-robin match play.

The top four men and top

four women after 40 games, including bonus pins, will advance to the knockout-style semifinals Nov. 10, where the No. 1 seed will face the No. 4 qualifier and No. 2 and No. 3 will meet. The winners of each match will earn a spot in the championship game.

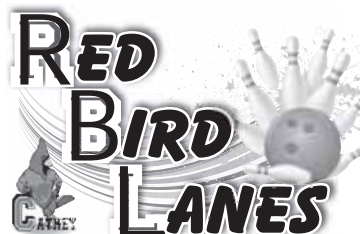

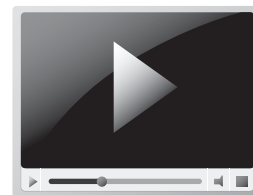

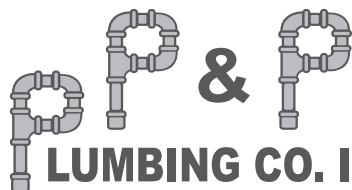

he needed to start the 10th frame, but a 4-6 split on his second shot left him needing to convert just one pin for the victory. His spare attempt was left of target, but it was enough to push over the 6 pin to give him his seventh Professional Bowlers Association Tour title and second major championship.

"For me, it's about slowing everything down as much as I can in those situations," said Barrett, who won the 2013 PBA World Championship. "I threw the one in the 10th really well, and I thought the 11th shot was OK, but I must have grabbed a lot of that one. On the spare

attempt, I told myself that I didn't want to miss it right, and I certainly didn't do that."

Barrett credited his run through the stepladder to his aggressiveness. He made a big move to the left to start the third game and made multiple ball changes over the course of his final two wins. In all, he averaged more than 238 on his way to the title.

As exciting as the win is for Barrett, he looks forward to everything awaiting him across the Atlantic Ocean. Barrett and his wife, Cassie, recently welcomed son, Colby.

"This means so much," said Barrett, the runner-up at the 2015 U.S. Open. "Especially for my family at home, too. My wife has hardly had any sleep

for the last 10 weeks with a newborn baby, so I think it's now time for me to take care of my dad duties and take care of my family."

Butturff led the U.S. Open for the second consecutive year by a sizeable margin to earn the No. 1 seed for the TV show. The 24-year-old left-hander led this year's field by 552 pins after leading by 617 pins in Liverpool, New York, in 2017.

He joined PBA and United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Earl Anthony as the only bowlers to earn the top seed in consecutive years at the U.S. Open since 1971. Anthony also was defeated in each title match, dropping the final game in 1979 and 1980.

"It definitely hurts, especially losing by one, but at least I can say I led this tournament two years in a row, by a lot," said Butturff, a four-time PBA Tour champion. "It's about the only thing I can take out of it, but it's definitely an amazing feeling.

"I threw a couple of bad shots but threw one good when I needed to and (left a) 10 pin. At least I forced him to show up. You know, Dom bowled phenomenal this week, too; we all did on the TV show. It's rough, but at the same time, I always think of it as another learning experience."

Barrett also delivered in the 10th frame to advance to the championship match, beating

Kristopher Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, 226-222.

Prather had built an early lead, striking on six of his first seven shots but missed a 6 pin in the eighth frame to allow Barrett, who had been struggling with carry, to tighten the match.

Prather missed the opportunity to shut out Barrett in the 10th. Given the chance to fill 26 pins in the 10th to advance, Barrett rolled a double and got nine pins on his fill ball to secure his spot in the championship match.

Barrett defeated EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, 264-248, to advance to the semifinals. Barrett finished the game first and delivered a double to force Tackett to do the same, but the 12-time PBA Tour champion was unable to get the 10 pin out on his first shot.

Tackett was hoping to become the seventh player to complete the PBA's Triple Crown. He had claimed the 2016 PBA World Championship and 2017 PBA Tournament of Champions.

In the opening match of the stepladder, Barrett bested Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, 258-203. Barrett delivered 10 strikes on his way to the win, while Kent was unable to recover from opens in the third and fifth frames.

All competitors at the 2018 event bowled 24 qualifying games over three days to deter-

mine the 36 players advancing to a cashers' round. After eight additional games, the field was cut to the top 24 players for round-robin match play.

The five finalists were determined by total pinfall, including bonus pins, for 56 games.

The U.S. Open is the fourth and final major championship on the 2018 PBA Tour schedule and is conducted jointly by the United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America.

PBA Spare Shots

JASON BELMONTE WINS HIGH AVERAGE AWARD; ANDREW ANDERSON TOPS POINT LEADER RACE

The final event of the 2018 Go Bowling! PBA Tour regular season also secured Jason Belmonte's fourth PBA George Young High Average Award with a 221.38 average for 270 games in PBA Tour competition, topping runner-up Jakob Butturff's 220.79 average for 297 games. Belmonte, who set the PBA single-season scoring record in 2017 with a 229.39 average, also won the award in 2013 and '14.

The other PBA award decided in the U.S. Open was the Harry Smith Competition Points Leader Award, which was re-instated after three years in hibernation. The winner is second-year player Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich., who won two titles including the USBC Masters in compiling 24,195 points – more than 3,000 ahead of runner-up Anthony Simonsen's 20,909 total.

Voting will begin soon for selection of the 2018 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year and Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year awards. The winners will be announced during the PBA Clash telecast airing on Sunday, Dec. 23, on FOX.

DOM BARRETT BECOMES PBA HALL OF FAME TITLE-ELIGIBLE WITH U.S. OPEN WIN

Another significant note from the U.S. Open is that England's Dom Barrett became title-eligible for election into the PBA Hall of Fame in the future, recording his second major championship among his seven overall titles.

Barrett, who also won the 2013 PBA World Championship, has a while to wait, however. The 33-year-old right-hander joined the PBA in 2010, which means he won't become participation-eligible for the PBA Hall of Fame until 2030 – his 20th year of membership. In order to be placed on the HOF ballot, candidates must meet both title and participation eligibility requirements.

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: TWO WIN FIRST PBA TITLES IN LAS VEGAS

Deeronn Booker of Anaheim, Calif., and Toby Sambueno of nearby Hendersonville won their first PBA titles over the weekend at South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas.

Booker and non-member partner Michael Villarreal of Lakewood, Calif. teamed up to win Sunday's South Point Member/Non-Member Doubles title after Sambueno won the South Point West Challenge portion of the PBA West Region doubleheader on Friday.

In the singles event, Sambueno defeated Villarreal, 205-175, to earn the \$1,500 first prize and his first PBA title. In the semifinal round, Sambueno defeated Tim Cagle II of Hercules, Calif., 244-235, while Villarreal eliminated non-member Michael Fitzgerald of Phoenix, 222-175, in the other semifinal match.

In Sunday's doubles title match, Booker and Villarreal defeated non-members Clay Rees of Riverton, Utah, and Cameron Foster of South Jordan, Utah, 436-380, to claim the \$4,000 first prize and Booker's first PBA Regional title.

Booker and Villarreal advanced to the title match by eliminating non-members Chris Klerk of Chandler, Ariz., and Ed Smaglik of Flagstaff, Ariz., 428-387, while Rees and Foster ousted Derek Acuff and non-member partner Michael Fitzgerald, both of Phoenix, 502-418, in the other semifinal match.

Brent Hunter of Glenville, Pa., won his first PBA Regional title in seven years Sunday when he defeated Rick Graham of Lancaster, Pa., 232-187, to win the PBA50 Bryan's Bowling Center Open presented by the Hopkins Automotive Group and 900 Global at Bryan's Bowling Center in Laurel, Del.

Hunter, who qualified in 10th place, started Sunday's first round with 10 strikes against defending champion Darryl Bower of Middletown, Pa., eliminating Bower, 2-1. He then ousted no. 2 qualifier Terry Wiley of Vienna, Va., 2-1, in his second best-of-three-game match. In the semifinal round, Hunter defeated Gary Faulkner of Norfolk, Va., 216-209, before topping Graham to claim the \$1,500 first prize.

Graham defeated Donny Carr of Laurel, Md., 2-0, and

qualifying leader Troy McKinney of Yorktown, Va., 2-0, before eliminating PBA Hall of Famer Danny Wiseman of Baltimore, 244-201, in the semifinal round.

The PBA Regional program moves into the first weekend in November with a busy weekend of activity, including the PBA/PBA50 Decker Appraisal Services Baker Doubles honoring Guppy Troup at Valley Lanes in Harrisburg, Va.; the Ken and Kathy Fowler Auto Center PBA and PBA50 West/Northwest Open doubleheader at Yokayo Bowling Center in Ukiah, Calif., and the Greater Anderson Central/Midwest Open at David Small's Championship Lanes in Anderson, Ind.

PBA Regional competition over the Nov. 9-10 weekend will include the La-Z-Boy Central Challenge at Monroe Sport Center in Monroe, Mich.; the Plaza Bowl Midwest Open in Clinton, Iowa; the PBA50 Gastonia South Open at George Pappas' Liberty Lanes in Gastonia, N.C., and the Mesa East Bowl Western Open in Mesa, Ariz.

Heading into the Thanksgiving break, the only events on the Nov. 16-18 schedule are the Bowlers Discount Pro Shop East Open at Terrace Lanes in Frederick, Md., and the PBA50 Plygem Windows South Open at Rocky Mount Bowling Center in Rocky Mount, Va.

Headlining the Thanksgiving weekend will be the Beaumont Southwest Open at Crossroads Bowling Center in Beaumont, Texas.

The November PBA Regional calendar comes to a close over the Nov. 30-Dec. 2 weekend with the Knob Hill/MJK Pro Shop Challenge (a non-champions event) presented by Brunswick at Knob Hill Country Lanes in Manalapan, N.J.; the PBA50 Victory Lanes Midwest Open presented by Allstate in Kankakee, Ill.; and the re-scheduled Break Point Alley Member/Non-Member Doubles in Tavares, Fla.

Just Paying Attention

As the CBS Sports Network graphic showed us last Wednesday night, having a really big lead after match-play going into the stepladder finals doesn't guarantee a win. For the second straight year, Jakob Butturff had a 600+ pin lead as top seed going into the U.S. Open stepladder TV finals. And for the second straight year, he finished second.

Now when the 56-game marathon turns into a one-game sprint, a large bowling center turns into a four-lane television studio with cameras, brighter overhead lights, fans seated where they haven't been all tournament long, throw in a potentially bizarre 10th frame, something changed.

We don't have Elias Sports Bureau cracking down the numbers like the big boys do, but there's something we do know. This phenomenon is nothing new. The top seed of a stepladder final wins roughly 35 to 40 % of the time.

When PBA television coordinator Frank Esposito started using the stepladder format on a regular basis in the 1967 season, there was no way of knowing the top seed would suffer such statistical stagnation.

Will the Open be Butturff's kryptonite? At age 24, it's way too early to tell, but a closer look at some of the legends of today and what tourneys they didn't win may surprise you.

Since CBS Sports Network showed the graphic featuring Butturff and Earl Anthony, let's start there. Earl had those 578 and 551 pin leads as top seed going into the TV shows. As the top seed, Earl often won, and yet, Joe Berardi (232 - 195) and Steve Martin (248 - 222) won the U.S. Opens of 1979 and 1980. That had to magnify the frustration of his 1973 loss as top seed to Mike McGrath, opening late in the match, although his lead going into the TV show was only 29 pins over second seed Dave Davis.

As Marshall Holman reminded us on the telecast, he had a 442 pin lead going into the 1988 U.S. Open finals

before Pete Weber won four matches in the stepladder final, notching the first of his record five Open wins.

Here's your promised surprise list. The following are the four major tournaments and some players that haven't won them. Some on the list made it to the title match or were top seed before coming up short. It's not a complete list, but enough for me to illustrate my point. And of course, some bowlers are still active, some are not.

Tournament of Champions – Dick Weber, Mike McGrath, Nelson Burton, Jr., Mark Roth, Walter Ray Williams, Jr., Parker Bohn III, Doug Kent, Wes Malott, Rhino Page, Dom Barrett

U.S. Open – Dave Davis, Mike Durbin, Doug Kent, Jason Couch, Parker Bohn III, Patrick Allen, E. J. Tackett.

PBA National/World Championship – Dick Weber, Mike Durbin, Marshall Holman, Steve Cook, Jason Couch, Del Ballard, Jr., Wes Malott, Tommy Jones.

ABC/USBC Masters – Mike McGrath, Dave Davis, Marshall Holman, Pete Weber, Chris

Barnes, Wes Malott, Dom Barrett, E.J. Tackett

Barrett, now with two majors, is listed after winning his second major and the two majors now standing between him and a career Grand Slam. Pete Weber did win a Masters, the 2016 USBC Senior Masters.

Only Aulby has won everything considered a major, including the Tour Championship and Players Championship, and bowled a TV 300 to win a title. Norm Duke also has the career Grand Slam and a TV 300, but not a Players or Tour Championship.

Here's my point. Many readers know many of the Texas-based bowlers and others who became and are becoming names on the small screen (television, and now tablets and cell phones) on a regular basis.

Even for them who make the sport look incredibly easy, they will be the first to tell you we have no idea how much exponentially harder it is to win those majors, or to "close the deal." Often, it goes down to one or two more well executed shots or one or two mistakes in a title match, possibly witnessed by upwards of a million television viewers.

Hitting the independent film festival circuit this year is a film about, wait for it, bowling, well sort of. Before you roll your eyes and breathe a sigh of 'now what,' the feature film, "When Jeff Tried To Save

the World," does come from a part of the country with a well-woven bowling fabric. The executive producer, co-writer, and director Kendall Goldberg, is from Munster, Indiana, the same town, home to the famed McCune bowling family (USBC Hall of Famer Don and his children, former touring players Eugene, and daughter Kris Hall).

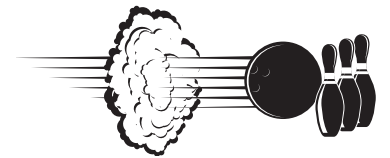
Filmed in the south Chicago suburb of Lansing at Lan-Oak Lanes (with its over-ground ball returns), the film stars a couple of familiar actors, Jon Heder ("Napoleon Dynamite") and Jim O'Heir ("Parks and Recreation"), ironically, who also grew up in Lansing. The plot involves Jeff (Heder) as a manager of a small neighborhood center, whose owner, Carl (O'Heir), plans to sell the business and land, with new owners turning the area into a strip mall. Feeling his own world and comfort zone is in danger, Jeff comes up with his own plan to buy the center with the help of co-workers, while figuring how to break the news to his family of his actual profession.

The project has been in the works for several years,

first filmed as a shorter piece for potential investors and shown at last year's circuit of film festivals. After funding was secured, more scenes were filmed to make it into a full-length feature and shown at various film festivals this year. According to Goldberg, the film is now being shopped for distribution for both the bigger (theatrical) and smaller screens (cable, live streaming television).

A question is whether lightning can strike twice for Heder. He starred in the 2004 film "Napoleon Dynamite," a small independent film following a similar path that became a sleeper hit, bringing Heder to Hollywood's 'A' list for a few years, winning several MTV Music awards, even hosting "Saturday Night Live," and a few roles in other feature films like Will Ferrell's 2007 "Blades of Glory."
