ARLINGTON, Texas - For the first time, bowling's premier professional organizations in the United States will be available for fans around the world to watch through a single livestreaming service - BowITV.

BowITV.com is the multichannel livestreaming platform of the United States Bowling Congress and will be the exclusive home of the Professional Bowlers Association and Professional Women's Bowling Association in 2023.

A partnership between USBC and PBA is bringing the PBA's full lineup to Bow ITV for 2023, which includes coverage of the national tour, PBA50, PBA Jr. and regional competition.

The 2023 PW BA Tour schedule recently was announced, and BowITV will be providing coverage for all 12 national tour
stops and nine regional events. All qualifying and match play rounds leading up to any televised rounds will be featured on the livestream service. Visit PBA.com and PW BA.com to learn more about each organization's television schedule for 2023.

With the additional tour events added to the schedule, BowITV also will feature a new pricing structure starting Dec. 5. A recurring annual subscrip tion will be $\$ 119.95$, but there's an opportunity to save before the calendar flips to 2023.

From now until Dec. 31, 2022, bowling fans can get a recurring annual subscription to BowITV for \$99.95. After the first of the year, the price will automatically renew at $\$ 119.95$.

Current BowITV annual subscribers will be charged $\$ 99.95$ at their next renewal date and annually renew at the same rate with an active subscription.

A monthly recurring subscription now will be $\$ 12.95$, with the rate changing on Jan. 1, 2023, for current monthly subscribers. Event tickets still will be available for those

## Kehler kringles 806, Smith snowmans 733

ARLINGTON, Texas - The best women bowlers in the world will have no shortage of opportunities to compete this year as the 2023 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour season will run from January to December and feature 12 PW BA National Tour events, nine PWBA Regionals, three majors and the return of the Regional Showdown.

The regional season will kick off Jan. 21 at J B's Allen Bowl in Allen, Texas, where the PW BA will conduct a stand-alone tournament. One additional stand-alone regional will follow in March before the PW BA National Tour season officially gets underway May 4 with the PWBA Stockton Open at Pacific Avenue Bowl in Stockton, California.

The Stockton Open will be a landmark event in PW BA history as it will be the 100th tournament to award a tour title since the relaunch in 2015.

The season's first major will come shortly thereafter when the United States Bowling Congress Queens takes place May 17-23 at Sam's Town Bowling Center in Las Vegas. Many memorable tournaments have been contested at Sam's Town over the years; nevertheless, the 2023 USBC Queens will mark the first time the venue has hosted PW BA competition since the 2000 Sam's Town Invitational.
"There will be a lot of excit ing things happening on the

PW BA Tour this season," Bowling Proprietors' Association of America Executive Director Frank DeSocio said. "We'll have the chance to celebrate some important milestones, to return to some amazing venues and to break lots of new ground as we continue trying to improve the tour experience for our players and fans."

Germany's Birgit Noreiks broke some new ground last season, capturing her first major title at the 2022 Queens at Stardust Bowl in Addison, Illinois. This year, she will look to defend as Queens champion just as Erin McCarthy of Elkhorn, Nebraska (U.S. Women's Open), and Stephanie Zavala of Downey, California (PW BA Tour Championship), hope to repeat as titlists when the season's other two majors roll around in June and August, respectively.

Plans call for the stepladder finals of all three majors to be broadcast live on national television. Additional details including the complete 2023 television schedule for all USBC and IBC programming will be announced at a later date. All rounds leading up to the stepladder finals will be broadcast on BowITV.com

Events not featuring a national television broadcast will conclude live on BowITV.

Players will be competing for an overall prize fund of approximately $\$ 1.4$ million during the 2023 tour season, which matches last season in offering

the largest average purse per national tour event since the tour's relaunch.

The three majors will once again feature the most lucrative purses with the champion taking home $\$ 60,000$ at both the Queens and U.S. Women's Open and $\$ 50,000$ at the PW BA Tour Championship.

Standard PW BA Tour events will award $\$ 20,000$ for first place while PW BA Classic Series event winners will take home $\$ 10,000$.

The 2023 PWBA season will wrap up in December with the PW BA Regional Showdown, which will be held at the International Training and Research Center in Arlington, Texas. This will mark the second time the PWBA Regional Showdown has been contested - Julia Bond won the inaugural event in 2019.

Details for this season ending regional tournament will be announced soon along with the dates for the remaining stand-alone and in-season regional tour events. Entries for the first two regional events in January and March will open Nov. 11.

Athletes will be able to

As the original eight regular readers knew years ago, the topic of the annual final JPA of this calendar year was easy to predict, but it is with a twist. Events happening in our youth can have a bigger impact later in life, but what happened in the fall fifty years ago left a permanent imprint.

When Michelle and I moved to Texas in 2011, I had always heard what football meant in these parts having grown up in another area where football is king, western Pennsylvania.

1972 was a great year with two of the local three pro sports teams having memorable seasons. That summer featured not only the defending world champion Pittsburgh Pirates trying to get back to another World Series, but its big star Roberto Clemente was chasing his 3,000 hit, a mark only seven players had reached. The Great One did reach it on the season's next to last day, then faced Cincinnati's Big Red Machine in the National League Championship Series to get to another World Series The heartbreaking finish of the fifth and deciding game of the was rough. A 3-2 ninth inning lead disappeared on a may have been Johnny Bench's only career homer to right field, later ending on a wild pitch to score the winning run. I still think the Buccos could have beaten eventual World Series champ Oakland A's, but we'll never know. This and the 1992 NLCS finish against Atlanta with

Francisco Cabrera's hit and Sid Bream's slide remain nearly as painful.

The team they shared Three Rivers Stadium with was having an unusual year of its own. After forty years looking at a .500 season as "winning," the Steelers were actually winning. After taking us yinzers on a ride through the fall to the AFC Central Division title, they were in a spot none of us dared dream just a year ago, two wins away from a Super Bowl berth. The first game would be at home and due to conference divisional rotation, a potential AFC title game would also be at Three Rivers.

But first was the divisional round against the Oakland Raiders on a date etched forever in Steeler Iore when everything literally changed, Saturday December 23, 1972.

Oddly, the game was not sold out 72 hours before kickoff, so it was blacked out locally, even in nearby cities of Altoona, Johnstown, and Youngstown, Ohio. The closest NBC affiliate station I found was WKYC Ch 3 in Cleveland, even though the picture at our house in Brighton Township was barely watchable. Dad called the owner of Iand he rode horses in Ohioville on high terrain just inside the Pa-Ohio state line with an unobstructed view west and north. The owner's TV picture was clear from Cleveland, so he invited us there to watch the second half and the play I still can't bring up to most Raider

fans, even usually the calm Houston sports stadium audio engineer Nunee Oakes.

The Raiders scored the game's first touchdown on a scramble by backup quarterback Ken Stabler with 1:17 left in the game, good for a 7-6 lead. Had the "Same Old Steelers" found another way to lose a game, especially its first ever playoff game after its forty losing seasons? All but one Raider fans I've asked over the years still say yes. On 4th down and 10 with :22 left on their own 40, what happened over the next 17 seconds was so stunning it has been described as when the movie "The Wizard of Oz" changes from black and white to color or seeing the special effects in the original "Star Wars" movie for the first time.

Quarterback Terry Bradshaw's pass to Frenchy Fuqua at the Oakland 35 yard line bounced off defender Jack Tatum (maybe grazing Fuqua, a long time contention Raider fans believe Fuqua was the only deflector, thus rendering the pass incomplete according to NFL rules at the time) into the hands of running back Franco Harris (who blew his blocking assignment before heading downfield) who ran it in for the go ahead touchdown with :05 left, completing what the NFL deemed its most famous play on its centennial celebration two years ago, The Immaculate Reception. The 13-7 win locked up a date with the undefeated Miami Dolphins for the AFC title on New Year's Eve.

Three people who I know were at the Immaculate Reception game all described the same thing. Fans closest to the

play in 3RS wildly cheered, then the noise travelled gradually in both directions around the ring of the stadium, many still wondering what just happened. Sitting on the opposite side of the stadium, my Uncle Dave and dad of a co-worker said the noise reached them last. Legendary Steeler running back Rocky Bleier told me this past January he turned away from the play like you would if you were about to be in a minor car accident. He never saw the play, then raced to the end zone with teammates after Franco scored, still not knowing what just happened.

Euphoria reigned Christmas week as the realization sank in the Steelers were in a spot we only dreamed about, one win from the Super Bowl.

With a dozen of us crammed into Dad's friends living room (for good luck, even though the game was sold out and televised locally on WIIC Ch.11), we watched as they eventually lost 21-17, sending the Dolphins to Super Bowl VIII against the Washington Redskins (my 10-year-old self still thinks we could have beat them). But here's where the story goes sideways into the life lesson.

Later that night with 1973 only ninety minutes away, KDKA Radio broke the news there was a plane crash off the Puerto Rican coast with Clemente on board delivering

Professional Women Regional Bowlers Need a Major Sponsor

The Professional Women's Bowling Association (PW BA) announced their upcoming schedule for the 2023 season last week, with a total of 12 national tour events and nine regional events. The national events are scheduled from May through August, with the three majors being contested on May 17-23 (USBC Queens), June 13-20 (U.S. Women's Open) and August 13-15 (PW BA Tour Championship). The Queens and U.S. Open events will carry a $\$ 60,000$ first prize, while the PW BA Tour Championship winner will receive \$50,000.

There are many interesting avenues to explore from the information provided by their news release. The one that really caught my eye is the fact that while the women will be shooting for some impressive prizes in the national events, there are only nine regional tournaments scheduled for the year... in the entire country! This is in stark contrast to the men's regional program that has grown exponentially since my first involvement almost 50 years ago.

As a western region PBA member in the mid-1970's, I can remember around 12 yearly events that helped the fulltime members whenever there were no national tournaments scheduled. That was the case for most of the regions in the country, with the exception of the south. Regional director Harry O'Neale seemed to have an event scheduled almost every weekend in the southern region, and especially in Florida. It was an incentive for many national tour players to move to the sunshine state to supplement their income.

A look at the PBA regional calendar for 2022 (which turned into a two-day search on the internet and consultation with PBA eastern regional director Russ Mills) finds that there are significantly more events scheduled than could ever have been imagined in 1975, with at least one new region added (northwest) to alleviate extensive travel in that part of the country.

If our calculations are correct, there are now a total of more than 200 regionals scheduled throughout the
country. That includes senior (PBA50 and PBA60), PBA Junior (youth league members), and at least a couple of women only tournaments on the west coast. In any event, it would be fair to say that the PBA regional directors are definitely earning their salaries!

AMF Becomes Major Sponsor of Regionals

When I arrived on the scene at AM F's corporate offices in 1982, I was the only PBA member, and one of only a few bow lers among the more than 300 employees in Westbury, New York. This afforded me great opportunities in every aspect of my new found position. I was called upon to not only provide marketing services for the bowling centers division, but also to test new bowling balls and other products. I also became "the unknown bowler" in many of the AMF print ads and television commercials.

Perhaps my greatest thrill was taking advantage of AMF's failing relationship with Dick Weber and reestablishing him as the star of the AMF Staff of Champions. We utilized Dick for grand openings, exhibitions, and just about any other special event that I could dream up that would involve the greatest ambassador of bowling that the world has ever known. At $\$ 1,000$ per event (plus expenses), the marketing value of Dick Weber could not be beat!

A nother concept that we initiated at the AMF Bowling Centers was the sponsorship of PBA regional tournaments. AMF had always been involved on the national tour, sponsoring such well known tournaments as the AMF MagicScore Open, the AMF Angle Open, and the AMF Grand Prix, but the regional circuits had never been tapped.

My proposal to a couple of newcomers that had come upon the scene at the AMF Bowling Products Group about this time - George Kaltner and Scott Werthmann, was to sponsor a couple of PBA regional tournaments each summer to the tune of $\$ 2,000$ each. The impact upon the bowling centers during the lackluster summer months would be minimal in terms of displacing existing business, and in fact would

Werthmann recognized this opportunity right away, and we embarked upon a PBA regional sponsorship program at some of our more lucrative locations, as well as newly acquired properties. Our first two sites in 1985 were at AMF East Meadow Bowl in New York, and AMF Lang's Bowlarama in Rhode Island. As it turns out, the increased revenue from the food and beverage sales alone was enough to make the sponsorships successful.

A Winning Recipe For The PW BA

What the women need is a major sponsor for their regional program. Since AMF is heavily embroiled in their PBA and bowling center involvement, could Storm Bowling be the answer regarding sponsorship of the women's regional tournaments? Or perhaps the women should look to another industry for assistance. It's amazing what you can achieve just by asking.
That's what happened when I approached Seagram about sponsorship of a tournament held during league play that eventually became known as Seagram's Coolers Get Things Rolling Tournament at all AMF Bowling Centers. The next year my contact at the Seagram Building, Pat Roney, asked Continued on Page 19


Get Uncomfortable as Quickly as You Can

Comfort is whatever you're used to doing. It's not necessarily right (or wrong); it's just comfortable. When a student is working on changing something, I often hear, "That feels uncomfortable." Well, thank goodness! You've got to change something to change something.

There is a part of your game that is your most common error. It's invariably something "comfortable," but incorrect. You'll often revert to it under pressure. You and your coach must identify whatever this is and figure a key or trigger or distracter that either prevents you from going back to that quirk or helps you identify instantly you've done it again so you can get back to the real bowler in you.

It could be that when you are tired, you slow down. Maybe when you play deep inside, you miss to the inside (or send it out in the weeds). Perhaps you have a tight armswing when you need to convert the baby split. Once these areas have been identi-
fied, you and your coach can experiment until you find a fix.

Perhaps it's drinking more water (which is one of the most invigorating things you can do). Maybe it's working on different body alignments until you discover what allows you to get inside and prevents you from throwing it out in the weeds. You could shoot the bucket from every dot and every arrow until it's a nobrainer for you.

I can't let that comment about water go unembellished. We all know that water is important. I just want to share a few things with you about how REALLY beneficial to your bowling, (not to mention your life), it can be. Often thirst is often mistaken for hunger. Even mild dehydration will slow down your metabolism. One glass of water can shut down midnight hunger pangs. I think it works on those just-before-you-go-to-bed-ice-cream pangs as well!

Lack of water is the \#l trigger of daytime fatigue. W hen you feel those 2 pm yawns coming on, get a glass of water. You'll find the fog lifts and you
can concentrate and function better. This actually works anytime you get foggy, not just at 2:00 in the afternoon.

A lack of water can trigger fuzzy short-term memory, trouble with basic math, difficulty focusing on the computer screen or a printed page, as well as remembering where you were standing on the left lane. Research indicates that 8-10 glasses of water a day could significantly ease back and joint pain. Drinking five glasses of water daily may decrease the risk of certain types of cancer including colon, breast, and bladder.

## USBC Creates Collegiate Hall of Fame with Inaugural Inductions set for April of 2024

## By: Dave Schroeder

ARLINGTON, Texas - The United States Bowling Congress will create a USBC Collegiate Hall of Fame recognizing individuals in three categories and featuring an inaugural induction class in April of 2024.

The first collegiate bowling championships were contested in 1975 in Dayton, Ohio, and the sport as grown on the collegiate level to more than 4,000 student-athletes on nearly 300 college and university campuses. Each year, more than 150 certified tournaments are held across the country to show case these student-athletes and programs.

USBC Collegiate currently over sees and conducts the Intercollegiate Team and Singles Championships. The top 80 men's and top 64 women's collegiate teams compete in regional events for the right to advance to the ITC. Individual champions are crowned at the ISC.

The creation of a USBC Collegiate Hall of Fame will honor the sport's collegiate history by inducting deserving candidates in one of three categories: Student-Athlete, Coach and Contributor. The eligibility criteria for each category are:

Student-Athlete

- Completion of at least two seasons as a collegiate member with nomination eligibility beginning 10 years after an individual's last year in USBC Collegiate competition.
- Selected at least once as an NCBCA or IBMA All-American or at least twice as an NTCA, NAIA or

Club All-A merican - If a student-athlete does not meet the criteria above, the nominee's individual tournament results, nee's individual tournament results, performance in national champion-
ship events and post season awards ship events and post
will be considered. Coach:

- Eligible for nomination after 20 years of active coaching. If an individual coaches less than 20 years, they will become eligible for nomination after their years of coaching and time after coaching equals 20.
- Must have served as a coach (head or assistant) for a minimum of 10 seasons.
- Must have coached teams with a final season power ranking (if coached during this era) in the top 10 for a minimum of five seasons.
- Must have qualified for their respective national championship a minimum of five times.

Contributor:

- Must have demonstrated significant contribution to college bowling.
- Must have distinguished himself/ herself through outstanding service in collegiate bowling. These individuals shall be persons who have demonstrated service, ideals, contributions, and achievements above and beyond the ordinary to the sport.

The USBC Collegiate Hall of Fame will be a function of the USBC Collegiate Division. Governance shall be by the USBC Collegiate Hall of

Only days before, it was pure joy. Now, pure sorrow. How do you handle this? He looked at me calmly and said it is a part of the mystery in this journey we call life, even though at times the highs are high and the lows are low. It was by chance they happened this close to each other. We are all processing the weight these two events bring. You will eventually accept he's gone and your memory of him will be with you forever

The Steelers continued their winning ways, reaching that unthought of Super Bowl not once, but four times in the 1970s winning each of them (two against the Cowboys). The Pirates won three more division titles that decade, the last with the other pillar of the team, Willie Stargell leading them to its most recent World Series crown of the We Are Family Buccos in 1979.

It was some serious stuff for a 10 -year-old boy to experience. After explaining the highs and lows of those days to my stepson recently, he began to see life events in a different light and handle them in a much more proactive manner. You just never know what seventeen seconds, eight days, and fifty years can mean.

The result of that initial meeting with Mr. Roney led to Seagram becoming involved in the US Open tournaments for both men and women. The unprecedented first place prizes of $\$ 100,000$ for the men, and $\$ 40,000$ for the women, have only recently been topped, after more than 35 years. To put the women's lst place prize in perspective, only one woman in the history of professional bowling (prior to 1987) had
ever won more than \$50,000 in an entire year, so this was indeed uncharted territory.

Another of my well-known expeditions to Manhattan resulted in an interesting involve ment with Revlon, where Mr. Kaltner had previously worked for the makeup company that has been around since 1932. Looking back on that adventure now, I'm sure that George must have provided some assistance with a couple of calls to his former associates. The result was a complimentary basket filled with Revlon products that we provided to bowlers in all our daytime ladies leagues.

So, whether it's Seagram, or Revlon, or even HelloFresh that recently signed a multi-year
deal with the Women's Nationa Basketball Association (remember Colie Edison?); all that someone from the PWBA needs to do is ask, and a vibrant regional bowling program with additional prize money and events could be the result.
