"I don't think I managed my emotions at all. I was nervous the entire match and yelled a few times during the telecast But what a gift I was given. The pressurel felt was in making sure that I gave all of the bowlers their spotlight. Everyone deserves their moment and it's important to the bowlers and to their family and friends. I was actually told that I didn't talk about Alyssa much and that Dave actually said more. Honestly, I had more to say but was watching the bowling too much. With that said, Del and I have always made sure to give credit where credit is due, but at times I think we hold back on talking about Alyssa."

What was the best part of watching a child accomplish something so large in scale?

I'm enjoying these 2023 PBA Tour updates, so here we go... after 12 events, and the 12th was possibly the best one yet, the PBA World Championship with EJ Tackett and Jason Belmonte in the final, we have some new data, but pretty much the same story.

As before, here are my five studs, Jason Bel monte, A nthony Simonsen, EJ Tackett, Dom Barrett, K ristopher Prather...and how are they doing..

EJ Tackett - five titles, first in points

Anthony Simonsen - two titles, second in points

Jason Belmonte- one title, third in points

Dom Barret - 10th in points
K ris Prather - 15th in points
M att Ogle - onetitle, fourth in points

Jakob Butturf - one title, fifth in points

Packy Hanrahan - onetitle

The BIG 3 have eight of the 12 titles and most of the money. Simonsen has cashed in all 12 events, Tackett 10, and Bill O'Neill 10. O'N eill is so amazingly good, but he just doesn't have the strike ball that the top three have. He has earned $\$ 41,400$ on the year and is 16th in points. A very successful year, but no wins, no TV Shows, and only three match-play appearances.

If you start from the other end of the stat sheet, that is where things really get depressing. Brad Miller, exempt, amazing talent, was definitely on his way up...yet 12 events, no cashes. Chris Barnes has 12 events and two cashes. Sean Rash 11 events and two cashes. Francois Lavoie 12 events and
three cashes. Andrew Anderson 12 events and three cashes.

Top of the heap bowlers yet they are battling hard each week to just get a check. If you are ever wondering how tough this game is at the very top, or how good the top five are...there is your answer.

The top 60 professional bowl ers are light-years ahead of the rest, but only 13 have made over $\$ 50,000$ this season.

I love this game, but boy is it a tough game.

Bowling Proprietors' Association of America, tournament organizer and host, and accomplished bowler.

As a proprietor, he has put his creativity and ingenuity into action with a variety of formats and concepts. In Houston, he hosted the 1974 USBC Women's Championships at his 72-Iane Stadium Lanes, and two U.S. $O$ pens at his $74-I$ ane Big Texan, as well as other PBA national and regional events.

He founded the Senior All-Star Bowling Association in 1990, and more than 30 events are held annually.

Brooks was recognized in 2010 as the USBC Proprietor of the Year for his longtime support of various programs, such as hosting charity events for Bowl for the Cure and developing SASBA

In 2019, the BPAA recognized Brooks as its President's Award Winner.
"The one thing I learned after owning and running 44 bowling centers is customer service," Brooks said. "I talked to the league bowlers every night. I got to know them and madefriends with them. That's what I do, I go and talk to the bowlers, and I make them my friends. And the funny thing about it is, your friends bring their friends."

Brooks has been very active at the local, state and national levels. He was one of the
founders of the Texas State Bowling Council, he supported the start of the Texas Grand Prix Scholarship Program, and he has ser ved on countless task forces and committees.

As BPAA President from 1984-1986, he hosted numerous summit meetings to solve bowling's lane-conditioning challenges.

Brooks also is an accomplished bowler having won the 1961 Texas State AII-Events title and earning a title at the 1973 Open Championships when he captured the doubles championship with partner Jimmy Paine. Brooks joined the 100,000 Pin Club at the Open Championships in 2021 and is one of 26 bowlers to accomplish the feat. He has

62 appear ances at the 0 pen Championships.

In addition to his USBC Proprietor of the Year Award and his BPAA President's Award, Brooks has been honored with the Joyce Deitch Award (2016) and the Flowers for the Living (2018) award. He was inducted into the Houston USBC Hall of Fame in 1974 and the Texas State USBC Hall of Fame in 1982.

But it's not the accolades that mean the most to Brooks.
"The best part of bowling is getting together with your friends," Brooks said. "I mean it's truly amazing. The friends that you meet from all over the world. It's great. I love it."

Diandra Asbaty of Chicago and Dave Ferraro of Kingston, New York, were inducted in the Superior Performance category.

# Dana Ausec Claims 2023 USBC Senior Queens in Las Vegas 

By: Gene J. Kanak LAS VEGAS - M any people dread turning 50, but that wasn't the case for Dana Ausec of Colorado Springs, Colorado. Instead, she looked for ward to it because once she celebrated that milestone birthday back in August, she became eligible to compete in the United States Bowling Congress Senior Queens.

Ausec certainly made the most of her debut performance as she defeated top seed Tish Johnson, also of Colorado Springs, 211-157 and 190-184 Tuesday night at Gold Coast Bowling Center to become the 2023 USBC Senior Queens champion.

The victory allowed Ausec to leave L as Vegas with the coveted tiara awarded to the champion and the $\$ 8,000$ top prize. Johnson earned $\$ 6,150$ for the runner-up finish.

All rounds of competition at the 2023 Senior Queens were broadcast live at BowITV.com, and the at-home audience and capacity crowd in attendance Tuesday night were certainly treated to a thrilling title match

Because Johnson entered the bout as the only undefeated player from the tournament's double-elimination bracket, Ausec had to beat her twice in the finals in order to win the tournament.

Nobody in attendance expected that to be an easy task as Johnson had dominated the field since competition began on Sunday, leading qualifying by morethan 160 pins and breezing through most of her bracket matches enroute to a 5-0 record and the top seed for the stepladder finals.

Nevertheless, Ausec wasn't intimidated heading into the title match. Perhaps that's because Johnson wasn't just another opponent; she's al so a teammate and friend.

Johnson and Ausec are doubles partners and league teammates in the Colorado Springs area, and that hel ped take a bit of the edge off for the Senior Queens rookie heading into the finals.
"Twenty years ago, when Tish (Johnson) moved to Colorado Springs, I was in awe when she came to sub during a league that I bowled in," Ausec said. "N ow, we bowl doubles and leagues together, so that intimidation factor that she holds over a lot of people probably isn't there for me anymore."

Ausec made that fact quite clear during the title match.

She and Johnson were tied midway through the first game of the championship bout, but after Johnson suffered back-toback opens in the seventh and eighth frames, Ausec pounced, striking on four of her last five shots to secure a 211-157 victory that forced the second and deciding game.

The final 10 frames of this year's tournament definitely lived up to the hype as Ausec jumped out to a 12 pin lead after four frames only to open twice and allow Johnson to er ase the deficit and establish a 14 pin advantage of her own after seven.

That's when the excitement really ratcheted up.

Johnson's ball crept high in the eighth frame, leaving the 2-4 standing, which she easily converted.

That's when Ausec, who had only struck once up to that point in the game, got a fortunate break by carrying very light mixer strikes in both the eighth and ninth frames.

Despite Ausec's double, Johnson stepped up for her last two frames with a chance to lock up the win.

Johnson delivered a quality shot in the ninth frame, but the 7 pin refused to fall. She converted the spare and then proceeded to strike in the 10th and 11th before her last shot went high for an

## EJ Tackett Wins Fifth Title of Season at 2023 PBA World Championship Presented by Pabst Blue Ribbon

Wauwatosa, WI - In a title match that bore a cursory resemblance to not one, but two 2023 major championships, EJ Tackett claimed the 2023 PBA World Championship presented by Pabst Blue Ribbon title. Tackett stepped onto the approach of Bowlero Wauwatosa needing two strikes to win. Just as he did at the U.S. Open presented by Go Bowling! in February, he delivered.

The 30-year-old defeated Jason Belmonte, 254-247, to win his second major championship and fifth title of the season at the
finale of the Guar anteed Rate PBA World Series of Bowling XIV.
"It feels really good to have the opportunity to have to get up to double in the 10th agai nst the greatest of all time and get it done," Tackett said. "T hat is what dreams are made of. It's so rewarding because you know that all the hard work you've put in is actually worth it."

With the win, his fourth career major title, Tackett became the youngest player to win 21 PBA Tour titles, though he joked he would have rather been the first to 20.
"Twenty would have been a lot cooler because it's that nice, round number," Tackett said. "I feel like 20 is a number that puts you in very elite status in the history of the PBA Tour."

If not for the man opposite him in the title match, Tackett likely would have reached 20 titles long ago. Bel monte defeated Tackett in last month's Tournament of Champions title match, moving to 3-0 in major championship finals and 6-2 on tel evision agai nst Tackett.

Belmonte's ascent to the World Championship title match this week also eerily resembled his monumental comeback at the TOC.

After finishing 10th, 34th, and 14th, respectively, in the PBA Cheetah, Scor pion and Shark Championships, Belmonte entered the 12-game match play round in 12th place, more than 300 pins outside of the top five. He averaged 250 and compiled an 11-1 record to charge all the way to the No. 4 seed.

Boasting a career record of 32-18 and average of nearly 220 in televised major championship matches, Belmonte won three consecutive matches against
players who made three of four championship rounds at the WSOB XIV.

In the opening match, Belmonte defeated reigning PBA Rookie of the Year Santtu Tahvanainen. The 26 -year-old made two poor shots early that gave Belmonte the lead, but Tahvanainen said he remained confident.
"I was like, 'N ow we're gonna look to strike out, shoot 250 and put pressure on Belmo,'"Tahvanainen said. "It was a good shot (in the fifth frame) but I left the 4 -pin. I felt like 230 wouldn't be enough anymore."

Belmonte then took down Jakob Butturff, the 2019 and 2021 PBA World Championship runner-up. Butturff had an opportunity to shut out Belmonte with three strikes in the 10th frame, but the southpaw's errant shot allowed Belmonte to advance with a mark.
"Honestly, I was very inconsistent with my ball speed," Butturff said. "You've gotta get those breaks and you've gotta make better shots when you're bowling against the best bowlers on the planet."

Once again, the three finalists of a major championship were Bel monte, Tackett and No. 2 seed Anthony Simonsen. It marks the third time over the past two seasons all three have made a
major championship round and the sixth time over all since 2016.

With Belmonte, Tackett and Anthony Simonsen all recording major titles earlier in the season, Butturff clinched a berth in M ay's PBA Super Slam Cup as the highest finisher without a major title this season.

Transition hit during the semifinal as Belmonte and Simonsen, who each started with urethane equipment, navigated the treacherous situation. On the high-scoring pattern, one error or poor decision could be detrimental.

Bel monte opted to move incrementally left and, later, loft the urethane ball over the front part of the lane; Simonsen switched to reactive on the right lane in the fifth frame, then on the left lane for the 10th.

After leaving a 10 -pin on the left lane in the eight frame, Simonsen made the ball change needing a massive 10th frame to put pressure on Belmonte. Instead, he left a 2-8 and allowed Belmonte to continue climbing with a mere mark.

Belmonte, typically stoic until all is said and done, demonstrated a great deal of emotion after clinching wins over Butturff and Simonsen.
"A few days ago I was 400 pins behind fourth, and then herel

LAS VEGAS - Delegates elected three board members and voted on nine legislative proposals at the 2023 United States Bowling Congress Convention and Annual M eeting, which concluded Thursday at South Point Hotel, Casino and Spa. The ballot for the USBC Board election had five candidates slated by the USBC N ominating Committee-Glenda Beckett of Palmetto Bay, Florida; Brandon Bowman of M ukilteo, Washington; M ike Cannington of Fort M yers, Florida; Adam Mitchell of M yrtle Beach, South Carolina; and Cheryl Younger of Leavenworth, K ansas.

On the first ballot, incumbents Cannington (497 votes) and Beckett (417 votes) were re-elected, with Bowman also gaining election (392 votes). Younger received 385 votes, and $M$ itchell received 325. A candidate had to receive a majority of the 689 votes cast to be elected.

Team USA athletes re-elected Nick Pate of Inver Grove Heights, M innesota, to a second term and elected K ris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois.

The newly elected board members begin their three-year terms Aug. 1, 2023.

Robert Cincotta of M assapequa Park, New York, and Elizabeth DeWerth of La Vista,

Nebraska, are joining the International Bowling Campus Youth Committee, which also returns current members $M$ atthew Orvis of Green Bay, Wisconsin, and Allen Soloman of Neptune Beach, Florida.

Additionally, on M arch 6, 2023, IBC Youth Chairperson Chrissie Kent appointed BrookIyn Gagnon of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, to the Youth Committee. The Youth Committee met and approved the recommendation. Gagnon will serve out the remaining term of a vacant position, and her term will expire on July 31, 2024.

In addition to the board elections, delegates voted on five proposed bylaw amendments and four proposed rules amendments (two league and two tournament).

Delegates rejected a bylaw proposal to allow remote electronic voting for future USBC Annual Meetings.

In other news, North Texas USBC was awarded the Association Excellence Award. Beckett, who also serves on the USBC Awards Committee, surprised the N orth Texas USBC delegates as part of the USBC Convention awards ceremony.

The presentation of national awards, including the Alberta E. Crowe Star of Tomorrow Award to K atie Heady of Richardson,

Texas, and the Chuck Hall Star of Tomorrow Award to Zachary Andrews of Jacksonville, Florida, also took place.

USBC Executive Director Chad M urphy introduced a new multi-faceted brand awareness campaign featuring current USBC certified bowlers. The campaign, titled "W hy I Certify," features USBC members talking about the importance of USBC certification and what bowling certified means to them. The campaign features its own website at WhylCertify.com.

M urphy and USBC Senior Director of Equipment Specifications Tom Frenzel delivered a presentation detailing the USBC's most recent research on string pinsetters and announced USBC will certify string pinsetters and string pin bowling as an independent category of equipment and competition effective August 1, 2023. M ore information can befound at BOWL. com/equipment-specifications/ string-pinsetter-research.

USBC President M elissa McD aniel and M urphy presented their annual reports, and delegates heard reports from the USBC Strategic Planning Committee and from International Bowling Campus Youth Development.

During Convention week, del egates attended a variety of educational seminars. The agenda also featured presentations from USBC charity partners Bowlers to Veterans Link (BVL), which provides recreational and therapeutic programs and services to America's active duty and veter an service men and women, and Bowl for the Cure®, the year-round fundraising initiative sponsored by USBC in partnership with Susan G. Komen ®.

In 2024, the USBC Convention will return to South Point Hotel, Casino and Spa in Las Vegas in conjunction with the USBC Open Championships, with the event scheduled to run from April 22-25.

Yes, I am still stunned, but more on that later. Let's get to one of the favorite times of year for bowling on national television. The month of April was once filled by PBA, PW BA and the start of the then PBA Senior Tours on ABC and ESPN. Nowadays, it's PBA action on Fox and FS1 with NCAA Collegiate National Championship followed by the USBC Singles and Team Championships for men and women.

The three major finals on the main Fox network were steady as usual, but the surprising numbers came from FS1, up, over last year. According to N iel sen numbers from show buzzdaily.com. The Tournament of Champions, M asters, and World Championship were all over 700,000 in aver age viewership and over 0.40 rating, similar to 2022 numbers. The increase on FS1 came from preliminary shows to the main finals either with an extended stepladder at the ToC to match play to determine the championship round finals on the M asters, or the pattern championship finals in the PBA World Series of Bowling (WSOB).

The Association tried something different to try to drum up more interest in the 17-players stepladder format, cutting to the top 9 for a second round to determine the fifth seed for the finals.

I'll give them an A for effort, but seventeen is just a little too much. The chances of someone, even a name player, breaking
through on three straight shows is a stretch. The flip side idea was getting more bowling on TV to prepare the viewing public for a second round to set up the finals on the main Fox network.

M ore watched those back-toback nights of shows rather than the one-off shows we've seen in the past. Was ad revenue also up? Hopefully. In these days of struggling N iel sen ratings for professional sports on television, the PBA is anything but the programming al batross the Disney management group of ABC-TV thought when they kicked The Association off the network in 1997.
(For those of you scoring at home, Disney has started another round or two of layoffs at ESPN and is rumored to be trying to sell the network.)

The one drawback of the Nielsen numbers on Fox was the PBA led off the network schedule on a couple of those days. When there was another network show beginning at 11:00 am Central, it served as a stronger lead-in program for a 1:00 pm Central PBA start rather than local programming, all too often informercials.

I'm curious to know what the last several 15 -minute segments of the PBA World Championship had for average viewership. With four future Hall of Famers and a rising star as the fifth player, there was as much to watch and appreciate as any of the Firestone ToCs and PBA National/ World Championships from twenty to

fifty years ago when most if not all the finalists were eventually Hall of Famers. The title match often went dow $n$ to the tenth frame, putting the viewership well above the announced average viewership number. While averaging 710,000, I wouldn't be sur prised if there were as many as 800,000 watching truly mustsee tel evision.

## \#\#\#\#\#\#

There have been strange shots on tel evision from time to time, but three gutter balls and two fouls in the same match with Jakob Butturff and A.J Johnson in the PBA Cheetah Championship? M arshall Holman had a double gutter frame in 1989, M ark Baker won an open-filled 1986 PBA King Louie Open over Walter R ay Williams, Jr., and last summer's PBA League finale was out of left field, but I can't remember a match with results seemingly found after shaking and looking at your Magic 8-Ball. Butturff switched to an older literally-falling-apart pair of shoes the following night, winning the PBA Scorpion Championship. Oddly, I remember Butturff's back pack with those same older shoes di sappearing at the 2018 Luci, fortunately recovered hours later after tournament founder and chair Donna Conners put the word out on social media.

The Women's Intercollegiate Singles finals a few nights later saw something in a similar vein with a foul on a fill shot. Despite the foul, Wichita State's Paige Warner won the match when Savannah College of Art and Design's (SCAD) Lara Kurt missed a 4-pin on a spare attempt, then beat M aryville's Anna M axwell for the title.

The rest of the finals weren't

unusual, except for the lack of crowd reaction. It was oddly quiet.

It's still a shame CBS doesn't publicly disclose CBSSN view ership numbers. It would be interesting to see exactly how many people watch, but as of now only the network knows for sure.

After a few pieces in Bowling This M onth, former IBM A Executive Director Jackie Wyckoff took notice and appointed meto the IBM A Bowler of the M onth committee in 2006. At the time, George Wooten was chair and eventually offered it to me in 2009, a post I held for twelve years. After reading what she still callsJPA the most esoteric bowling column ever, she started the push for my nomination. Wooten also deserves to be in the Hall as well. I always walk away from our conversations knowing more about bowling and writing.

While researching bowlingonly radio shows, I stumbled upon one out of Kansas City hosted by

Dave Waswo. I interviewed him, then he interviewed melive on the air off and on for the next ten years on The Bowlers Show, creating the best bowling radio experience of my career.

Along with The Waz, Craig Elliott invited us to commentate on PBA Xtra Frame for the 2017 Luci Doubles at Copperfield Bowl. A dream was realized

As a youngster the question of whether or not to join a sanctioned bowling league just never came up as an argument for debate. Why else would anyone want to bowl, if not for the competition and recognition provided by USBC certified leagues?

The game came naturally to me, when at the age of 8 , I first stepped onto the approach and proceeded to throw a strike, and then another strike! Two in a row on my first two rolls of the ball. D rawing on vast new data that reveal Amer ican's changing behavior, the author shows how we have become increasingly disconnected from one another and how social structures - whether they be PTA, church, leagues - have disintegrated.

In their latest attempt to figure out the demise of league bowling, the USBC reached out to current league bowlers and asked them for their thoughts on why bowling in certified USBC competition was important, according to writer Dave Schroeder. The result was "W hy I Certify," a new multi-faceted brand awareness campaign featuring current league bowlers.

If your armswing is tight, the pins know it. If your legs are tight, you lose your knee bend and leverage (not to mention you'll fatigue more easily). ## USBC Certifies String Pin Bowling as Independent Competition <br> Effective August 1, 2023

ARLINGTON, Texas - The United States Bowling Congress released a new research report on string pinsetters and the USBC Equipment Specifica tions Committee has approved final specifications based on the research. USBC will certify string pinsetters and string pin bowling as an independent category of equipment and competition effective August 1, 2023. The final specifications reduce the string length to a minimum of 54 inches.

Under those final specifications, key findings of this 2023 report include:

USBC's lab data indicates strike percentage on string pin bowling will be 7.1\%less than when using free-fall pinsetters.

This could result in average differences as large as 10 pins or more.

Unusual spare conversion rates have been nearly eliminated.

Additional testing is needed to determine if a conversion between string pinsetter competition and free-fall is reasonable.

This 2023 report follows up on previous USBC string pinsetter research that began in 2020. Results from an initial study were published in December of 2020 and another research report on the subject was made public in September of 2021

In the 2021 report, USBC released the results of its initial phase of research on string pinsetters along with preliminary

USBC will certify string pinsetters and string pin bowling as an independent category of equipment and competition separate from free-fall machines
effective August 1, 2023, for the 2023-2024 season.

USBC will conduct addi tional testing with an objective of determining whether string averages can be used the same as freefall or whether a conversion can be created.

USBC will provide an update on the additional testing and potential for conversion in advance of the 2024-2025 season.

2023 national title up to a fifth and deciding game.

That put the Bearcats in position to win. If anchor bowler Hope Gramly could go strike-seven in the 10th frame, McKendree would be national champions once again.

Showing the poise and shotmaking ability that caused her to
be named a 2023 N ational Collegi ate Bowling Coaches Association First Team All-American, Gramly calmly stepped up and delivered a flush strike.

N eeding seven pins to officially secure the title, Gramly hit the pocket again in the 11th, toppling nine pins to officially eliminate $M$ aryville and earn M cK endree its second ITC crown - the Bearcats won their first in 2017 - to go along with its pair of NCAA championships.

For Gramly, who was named the 2023 ITC women's most valuable player shortly after the title match concluded, being asked to deliver in crunch time is nothing new.
"Hope (Gramly) had some weird breaks throughout our matches this week, but I'm always confident that she's going to step up and throw a good one when she needs it," O'Keefe said. "She's shown it over and over again over the years; she's the best player in college bowling for a reason."

But M cK endree didn't win the title because of one bowler; it won because of the hard work and dedication of every player and coach and the support of all

In a tongue in cheek manner to my critics, I say if you want to blame anyone, blame the one and only Charlie Tapp, my first interview subject nearly forty years ago after he bowled his first Firestone ToC. Now that I've won this award, Tapp may feel free to admit our interview actually did happen.

Finally, I want to thank you, the TBN reader. It doesn't matter when you star ted reading as one of the original eight, one of the TBN original eight, or started more recently. It is your attention I've garnered and hopefully keep while explaining why things are the way they are in our little corner of the world. I thank you all.

Jill Albrecht-Weber of Burlington, Wisconsin, and Mike Rose Jr. of Orlando, Florida, were inducted in the USBC Outstanding Performance category. Ron M ohr of Las Vegas was inducted in the Veter ans category and Jamie Brooks of Fort Worth, Texas, was inducted in the M eritorious Service category.

Five of the six members of the 2023 were in attendance for the ceremony Wednesday, with Ferraro unable to attend after coming down with an illness just prior to the event that prohibited him from traveling.

Asbaty, 42, excelled collegiately at the University of Nebraska, internationally with Team USA and collected wins on the professional level, including a victory in the 2012 USBC Queens.

Asbaty continues to inspire the next gener ation and serve the sport by providing lessons at her home center and as co-founder of the Elite Youth Tour.
"I imagine a little girl and her family wal king through the hall of fame," Asbaty said. "And I imagine her seeing my picture, and the little girl stops and she
says, 'That's the bowler that was a world champion, a mom, a change maker.' I want my legacy to be that I left bowling better than I found it."

Ferraro, a 63-year-old righthander, left his mark during a career that saw him collect nine PBA Tour victories, including three majors.

Those majors included a pair of wins at the PBA Players Championship (1988 and 1991) and, in the most important win of his career, a victory in the 1990 Tournament of Champions at historic Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio.

In addition to those major wins, Fer raro collected six additional PBA Tour titles between 1986 and 1994. His pair of wins in 1992, while al so earning the George Young High Average Award and the Harry Smith Point Leader Award, propelled him to PBA Player of the Year honors.

Ferraro was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 1997 and, in 2009, was voted 36th on the list of the PBA's 50 Greatest Players. Although unable to attend in person, Ferraro passed along some sentiments that he asked to be shared.

for this prestigious award," said Ferraro. "When I looked at all the other nominees in my category, there wasn't anyone on that list that wasn't deserving of this award. Congratulations to all the other inductees, the honor is well deserved. For someone who grew up in the bowling business and has co-ow ned several bowling centers with my brother Steve, this award means the world to me. So, thank you."

Albrecht-Weber, a 54-year-old right-hander, is a three-time champion at the USBC Women's Championships.

Her first title came in 2002 when her team, High RollerCherry Hill, N.J., won the Classic Team title with a then-record score of 3,327. Albrecht-Weber contributed 741 to that total.

Two years later, the same team won the same title with a nearly identical total. This time, High Roller-Cherry Hill, N.J., totaled 3,320, with Weber contributing 706 .

The last of Albrecht-Weber's trio of Women's Championships victories came in 2008 as she teamed with Gina Daroszewski to win the Classic Doubles title. Albrecht-Weber rolled a 697 series, while Daroszewski added 748. The team's total of 1,445 was 29 pins better than their nearest competitor.
"All the titles with my friends throughout the years, that's what's special," Albrecht-Weber said. "Those experiences were great. We had such good camaraderie. We were very honest with each other. We would help each other. We had such good experiences on the lanes and off the lanes. You need to enjoy the whole journey, the whole adventure. But then when the lights came on, we were there to bowl. We were there to win. We were all competitors."

Albrecht-Weber also collected one professional title on the then

Ladies Professional Bowlers Tour (now PWBA) and also finished sixth in the 1993 USBC Queens.
"I feel like being part of bowling, and the successes and failures that I've had within the sport, hel ped me get to where I am now in so many different ways," Albrecht-Weber said. "I'm very proud of whol am and the people that I've become friends with because of bowling. This hall of fame is an accumulation of everything I've put into bowling."

Rose earned induction in his first year on the ballot on the strength of four Eagles won at the USBC Open Championships.

Rose, a 51-year-old righthander, collected his first Open Championships victory in 2007, when he totaled 2,198 to capture the title in Regular All-Events. Rose shot 687 in team, 724 in doubles and 787 in singles (where hefinished seventh).

Eagle No. 2 came in 2015 as part of Team NABR. The group captured the title in Regular Team with a 3,368 total. Rose's contribution to that was 697.

Rose's third and fourth wins at the Open Championships came in 2017, as Team N ABR won titles in both Regular Team (3,266 with Rose contributing 602 ) and Team All-Events ( 9,957 with Rose adding 1,865 ).
"We've had such a great time together, bowling on these teams at the Open Championships," Rose said. "We're like brothers; we love each other. We talk all the time, and we have a text thread that we're on all the time with each other. So, ever ybody knows about each other's lives; we pay attention to each other's children. I had two sisters growing up, so it's like having a bunch of brothers now."

He owns a 219.1 aver age at the Open Championships over his 22 years of competition, good for second on the 20 -year

aver age list. In addition to his four Eagles, he owns 10 other top-10 finishes at the event and was runner-up for Rookie of the Year during the 1993 PBA Tour season.

M ohr, a 66-year-old righthander, ownstwo Open Championships titles, a senior major win at the 2011 Senior U.S. Open that is one of 11 PBA50 Tour titles, four PBA60 titles and a pair of Super Senior Classic titles.

In addition to his professional and Open Championships titles, M ohr owns numerous medals in international competition as a multi-time Team USA and Senior Team USA member.

M ohr's two Open Championships wins span more than 20 years, with his first win coming in 2001 as a member of Team USA Support No. 2. The group captured the Team All-Events title with a 9,807 total (M ohr's pinfall was 2,008 ).

His most recent win at the event came just last year as part of Storm Products Inc. 1. The team earned the championship in Regular Team with a 3,486 total. M ohr's contribution was 603.

From 2009-2019, M ohr collected 11 PBA 50 Tour titles, highlighted by his win at the 2011 Senior U.S. Open where he defeated Walter Ray Williams Jr., 246-189, for his lone major title.

Heis a two-time PBA50 and four-time PBA60 Player of the Year. M ohr was inducted into the Greater Anchorage Hall of Fame in 1993, the A lask a State USBC Hall of Fame in 2008 and was a 2018 inductee into the PBA Hall of Fame.
"I decided to try my career, for the most part, at a later age," M ohr said. "I did the best I could with what I had, and I think it's the greatest honor when someone says, 'W hat he did, that's impressive.'"

N ow including the 2023 class, there are 452 members of the USBC Hall of Fame - 230 in Superior Performance, 126 in M eritorious Service, 54 in Veterans, 22 in Pioneer and 20 in Outstanding USBC Performance.

The USBC Hall of Fame was created in 2005 by merging the former American Bowling Congress and Women's International Bowling Congress Halls of Fame.

am bowling for the title," Belmonte said. "I just felt like this story would have been pretty epic."

The person least sur prised by Belmonte's assault on the stepladder:Tackett.
"W hen the show started, I told (my ball rep), 'I assume I'm gonna bowl Belmo today.' So I was mentally prepared better than maybel have been in the past to bowl him," Tackett said. "Your preparation for him may be a little bit different than maybefor playing another player. Although it shouldn't be - it should befull focus all the time - you just know that little bit extra you have to do to be able to at least have a match with him."

The heavyweight battle exceeded all expectations: Belmonte fired a five-bagger mid-game to take the lead, while Tackett struck on six of seven shots heading into the 10th frame to keep pace.

The use of urethane throughout the show played into Tackett's hands, he said.
"I wanted those guys to throw urethane, that gave me the best chance," Tackett said. "I think it benefited me a little bit that Santtu lost early. Had he bowled more and beat Belmo, I don't know how the Ianes would have played."

Belmonte stepped up in the ninth frame, needing strikes in the ninth and 10th frames to secure a 16th career major title and extend his record. Instead, his ball hooked early and left a 3-6-10.
"I knew it was going to hook, I was hoping it was going to last one more frame for me," Belmonte said. "The story was right there. One more shot on that right lane. If the pattern held up just one more shot, it would have been a pretty good story to tell later on."

A fter converting the spare which Belmonte said he would die not knowing how to make after the USA vs. The World event last week end - Belmonte threw all three strikes in the 10th frame If Tackett wanted to beat

Despite coming out on top on this night, Ausec still has tremendous respect for Johnson. Also, she expects to possibly get a little bit of grief from her teammate the next time they hit the lanes together back in Colorado Springs.
"My husband wasn't a bowler when hewas a kid, so he didn't know who Tish was or anything about her. I grew up watching Tish, so I told him about all about her accolades and how incredible she is," Ausec said. "She drills all my bowling balls now, so I'm surel'm going to hear about it the next time we see each other."

Belmonte for a major, he needed to double.
