off seamlessly. Now let's talk about the youth bowlers...wow, just wow. I know there are a lot of great young players out there, but seeing them all in one place really blew me away.

In the U18 boy's division, it felt like about 50% of them are two-handers, not surprising at all, and I bet that number will only go up from there. Anthony Simonsen Wins PBA Tour Finals for Eighth Career PBA Tour Title

Allen Park, Mich.—Anthony Simonsen won the race-to-two-points championship match, 2-1, over Kyle Troup to win the 2021 PBA Tour Finals as Simonsen's eighth career Guaranteed Rate PBA Tour title. In a rematch of last season's PBA Tour Finals title match, Simonsen avenged his 2020 loss and claimed his first title since he won twice in 2019.

"I wanted to get out and bowl well," said Simonsen. "If you bowl well and you lose, it's a little easier to accept than when you bowl badly and lose. I was able to just bowl today and not have to manipulate everything."

In the race-to-two points format, Troup took the first game and Simonsen responded with a 279 in game two to force a ninth-and-10th-frame roll-off.

"We're bowling two games for a reason in this format," said Simonsen. "I wanted to get myself lined up and find a clear mindset going into the next game. Once I got into a rhythm, it was on from there."

Simonsen, the higher seed, elected to have Troup start the roll-off. Troup struck. Simonsen spared and then filled the 10th with three strikes, forcing Troup to get two strikes and a single pin to win. Troup struck on his first shot but left a 10 pin on the second shot, giving Simonsen his eighth career title.

"My double in the 10th was huge," said Simonsen. "Making him have to get up and double on a lane that didn't seem like any of us were super comfortable on. He made two really good shots, but the 10 pin is hard to knock over."

Simonsen and Troup made it



to the championship match by winning their respective groups during yesterday's four-game qualifying block, then surviving the group stepladder finals earlier today.

Simonsen led Group 2 into the stepladder, then defeated Kris Prather in a roll-off in the Group 2 final match to advance to the championship against Troup.

Troup qualified as the second seed after four games of qualifying, then defeated Chris Via in a single game and Bill O'Neill in a roll-off to win the Group 1 stepladder and get to the championship match.

In the opening match of the Group 1 stepladder, Chris Via rolled the 32nd televised 300 game in a PBA Tour title event, knocking out two-time PBA Tour Finals champion EJ Tackett. Via, who joined Sean Rash and François Lavoie as the only players in PBA history to roll two televised perfect games in title events, also became the first player ever to bowl two televised perfect games in the same season, having rolled his first during the PBA Players Championship East Region Finals earlier this year. Via received a \$10,000 bonus for

the feat.

Hills, California, to earn her second win of the season and fourth career PWBA Tour title. The win garnered Kovalova a \$10,000 top prize, and the championship round was broadcast live on BowlTV.com. She led all but the first round this week in Louisville, and she earned the top seed for the championship round by 274 pins over Julia Bond of Aurora, Illinois, who qualified second for the stepladder after 24 games. Kovalova became the first player since Liz Johnson of Niagara Falls, New York, at the 2017 U.S. Women's Open to successfully defend a title. Johnson captured her fourth consecutive green jacket, and sixth overall, with her win at the major championship in Plano, Texas. Kovalova's win at the 2019 Pepsi PWBA Louisville Open included a perfect game in the title match to defeat Johnson, 300-163. The performance

made Kovalova just the fourth player to record a 300 game in a championship-round appearance. "Being able to defend my title here really means a lot," said Kovalova, the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Queens champion. "I had the same opportunity at the Queens this year, and I let the pressure get to me and struggled. This week, even though the pressure was on and I was nervous, I was able to do it. I'm proud of myself." In the title match, Kovalova set the tone and took the early lead with three consecutive strikes. An open frame in fifth from Parkin gave Kovalova a 33-pin lead after she responded with her fourth strike of the match in the sixth frame. Parkin bounced back with three consecutive strikes, starting in the seventh frame, to put pressure on Kovalova heading into the final frames. Finishing the match first, Kovalova tripped a 4 pin in the ninth frame for a strike and followed with another strike

to start her 10th frame, giving her the opportunity to shut out Parkin. Needing a third consecutive strike, or nine and a spare, to secure the win, she left a 4-7 combination and converted it, but that allowed Parkin the chance to roll three strikes in her final frame to force a tie. Parkin's first delivery was left of target, and she left the 3-6-10 combination. "I was very nervous heading into the match and was relying on my ball reps to tell me what to do," said Kovalova, who also defeated Parkin to win the 2021 PWBA Twin Cities Open in April. "I tried to shut off my brain and just focus on not overthinking things and executing good shots. I threw some really good shots at the end and knew I did the best I could, so I was ready to accept whatever happened and roll with it." Kovalova credited her support system in helping her during her title defense. She admitted to feeling anxious during the week and noted there was some additional pressure after her performance through qualifying, where she averaged more than 231 on the 44-foot oil pattern used during the event. She was proud to be able to persevere through those moments to collect the title while posting a second consecutive season on tour with multiple wins.

the cycle that was described, which really helped a lot. “I’m afraid to disappoint people, so I felt very anxious because I had been leading for most of the week. I start to wonder what will happen if I throw it bad during the title match, but I know I have to just enjoy the journey.” Parkin, the No. 4 seed for the stepladder, advanced to the title match by defeating Bond in a tightly contested semifinal, 232-224. Bond delivered three strikes in the final frame to force Parkin to knock over at least nine pins on her first shot for the chance to move on and face Kovalova. Parkin, who was looking for her first title since the 2011 Queens, rolled a strike and toppled seven pins on her second shot to collect the win.

She recorded her third runner-up finish of the 2021 season in her fourth championship-round appearance. In addition to the second-place finishes to Kovalova, she also lost to Bond in the title match of the Queens in May. Bond was looking for her third win of the 2021 season. Along with the tiara at the Queens, Bond claimed the win at the PWBA Hall of Fame Classic in January. She was making her third championship-round appearance of the year. Parkin began the stepladder with a 236-212 victory over two-time reigning PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O’Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois. O’Keefe was making her third consecutive championship-round appearance, and

fourth this season, after a runner-up finish at the PWBA Albany Open and third-place finish at last week’s PWBA Greater Nashville Open. O’Keefe won her 14th career title to start the 2021 season at the PWBA Bowlers Journal Classic. The 73-player field in Louisville bowled 12 games Friday, before the first cut to the top 32 athletes. Advancers bowled an additional six-game block Saturday morning, with the top 12 competing in a final six-game round to determine the four bowlers for the stepladder, based on 24-game pinfall totals. The 2021 PWBA Tour season now will take a brief hiatus, with competition resuming at the end of July with the Professional Bowlers Association/ PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles event in Houston. The tournament will take place at Copperfield Bowl from July 29 - Aug. 1.

Verity Crawley Wins First Title at 2021 PWBA Greater Nashville Open

SMYRNA, Tenn. - After several close calls during her first four seasons on the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour, England's Verity Crawley broke through for her first victory Saturday at the PWBA Greater Nashville Open.

The 26-year-old right-hander won three matches in the stepladder at Smyrna Bowling Center on the way to the title and \$10,000 top prize, defeating Poland's Daria Pajak in the final, 245-168.

The championship round was broadcast live on BowlTV.com.

Crawley had recorded four runner-up finishes on tour prior to her win Saturday, including a loss to Pajak, one of her tour teammates, in the championship match of the 2017 PWBA Greater Detroit Open.

"I've been working so hard and knocking on the door and been so close to breaking through," said Crawley, who made her third championship-round appearance of the season. "It's an amazing feeling to know all the hard work paid off and that I deserve to be here. I used to not have the confidence

that I could win, and it's something I've worked on a lot. It's always special when you can share these moments with friends, and I'm very thankful for their support."

Crawley averaged 244 in her three wins Saturday, which included victories over Germany's Birgit Noreiks (246-214) and Shannon O'Keefe of Shiloh, Illinois (241-220), before recording the win against Pajak.

She was able to get ahead early in each match, rolling at least five strikes in her first six frames to build the advantage.

In the title tilt, Crawley

was ahead by 55 pins after six frames, benefiting from a pair of opens and only one strike from Pajak. She already had locked up the win by the time she stepped up for her final frame.

"I just had really good ball motion and wanted to take advantage of that," Crawley said. "When you see your ball do the right thing, all you want to do is make the best shots possible and hope it works out in your favor. I was just focused on executing and making good shots. I didn't want to walk

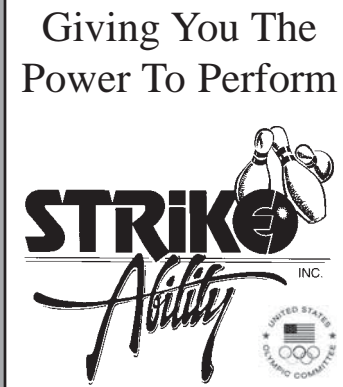

School teachers pretty much agree this was the strangest school year anyone has experienced, barely beating out the last school year. New protocol and procedure needed to be discovered and defined as school districts called back students in a wide variety of times depending on local and state government mandates.

As you may have guessed, a handful of school teachers are regular TBN and JPA readers. One of them agreed to answer

questions on a school year in where priorities shifted and refocused in ways no one could have ever seen only several years before.

Darian Miller, a teacher at Archbishop Hannan High School in Covington, Louisiana, was a four-year starter on the Spring Hill College women's bowling team from 2013 to 2017, which included three trips to the sectional round of the Intercollegiate Team Championships. In this JPA,

the 2015 IBMA Chuck Pezzano Scholarship Award winner will walk us through what her fellow teachers and students experienced in the last sixteen months while adapting to a new methodology of teaching to students online and in person.

JPA: Let's start at the very beginning. How did the faculty find out classes were suspended?

Darian Miller: I remember the day so vividly. It was March 13th, 2020, and both the students and teachers began hearing rumors about the school being shut down from national news, the Louisiana government then the school board. I was sitting in the room talking to my kids about it, and I remember everyone saying, "Oh this won't last long. There's no way." They announced there would be a stand-up faculty meeting after school, and my students got ready to go home. I told them I would hopefully see them Monday as they walked out into the weekend.

JPA: Describe the process the administration took to organize online classes.

Miller: During our meeting, they told us the school would be shut down for 2 weeks. At that same moment, we had to have a crash course on how to do virtual classes. Resources available to us such as Zoom for video instruction, different components of Canvas (our online platform for students), online quiz and assignment templates, and how to survive the next two weeks. We had to make an extremely detailed lesson plan available online for our classes every day for the students to see so instructions were clear and they knew their assignments for the day. So, I packed up everything I needed from my classroom, went home and thoroughly planned on being back in two weeks.

JPA: What did the teachers

do to organize lesson plans?

Miller: The difficulty of planning online lessons definitely depended on the class itself. For English, History, and Social Science classes, it wasn't too difficult. There were still challenges on changing it up and not doing the same activities over and over, but it was manageable. But for Math, Science and Fine Art classes... it was a whole other ball game. How do you make a hands-on interactive class...online? How do you make a physics and robotics class based on projects...all online? I was trying to help my students navigate Photoshop for Graphic Design through screen monitoring and a chat room and let me tell you...that was a nightmare! Teachers would post videos of them working out math problems or doing demonstrations on Canvas for students to see. Use online interactive sites and worksheets. Use Google apps for students to collaborate on assignments. As it neared the end of two weeks, we got the announcement of being shut down for another two weeks. Then another.

JPA: What things you took for granted could not be done?

Miller: Prom and senior trip got postponed. Then cancelled. Softball was on track to be back to back state champions. Their season: cancelled. My heart shattered for my seniors. I was extremely close with that group, and I was supposed to finally go on the senior trip with them which inevitably got cancelled. I had a group

of seniors who came into my room EVERY single day for lunch since the beginning of the school year. Although my 40 minutes of solitude were nonexistent every day, they made me laugh hysterically most of the time, brought me food sometimes and would discuss their lives and opinions with me. I missed seeing my students take their photos for my photography class, and we missed our zoo field trip we were supposed to go on. I missed seeing how excited they got when they captured their best photo so far.

Finishing the yearbook virtually was an absolute nightmare. We rallied and did it, but we had to cut pages and do what we could with all of the events and spring sports seasons cancelled. We had to extend our deadline to the end of July to incorporate the socially distanced graduation of our seniors. However, since we didn't meet our original deadline, we didn't qualify for getting the Jostens National Program of Excellence Award for the second year in a row. Something we worked extremely hard for. That really tore my heart. Collaborating on creating yearbook pages was something I missed seeing. It was so much easier for students to bounce ideas off each other. Even though we came back to school in August to wearing masks, checking temperatures, hand washing stations, one way hallways and wiping down desks in between every class, I

Dave's Corner

My Mom, My Mentor, My Friend

It has been difficult coming up with a subject to write about these past two weeks, as my Mom suffered a massive stroke last week. At the age of 96, she is still hanging on as I write these words, although the doctor has said that it's only a matter of days until she will pass along to be with the Lord.

I'm sure that my experiences with my Mom are not so different than all of you that read this bowling journal. From my earliest recollection, my Mom has always been there for me as a teacher, a confidant and a sounding board. No matter how many times I asked... "Why?" - she would stop what she was doing and take the time to answer my rhetorical questions until I was satisfied.

She was most likely a tomboy in school, participating on the high school field hockey team, but she never really talked about that part of her life. The first time that I witnessed her athletic prowess was at an early age while playing baseball with the neighborhood children. Some of the parents got involved and they asked my Mom to step up and swing the bat. On the first swing she hit it out of the park! I fell to the ground on my back as I watched the ball leave the yard - I had never seen a ball hit so far.

Another time I remember that for our summer vacation we went to see my sister and her husband John, who was stationed at Warner Robins Air Force Base in Georgia. I brought along my bowling ball all the way from California, since the thought of going without bowling for two weeks was completely foreign to me. When the opportunity arose, my Mom accompanied me to the local bowling establishment. After a lot of coaxing I convinced her to join me in a game, where I thought that I would be showing off my talent. Once again, my Mom stepped to the approach and proceeded to roll a 144 game (my score was a good deal less!).

One trait of my Mom's that I have always tried to emulate is her ability to "turn the other cheek" when an evil or argumentative subject would come up. Often while chatting long distance over the phone, or when we were enjoying a brief

get together on one of my vacations, I would simply say, "Let's talk about something else," and she would immediately drop whatever we were discussing and move on. What a remarkable characteristic!

Perhaps the most humorous moment that I can recall is the story of our eighteen cats. We lived on a farm of sorts, with more than an acre of land, where my parents grew their own vegetables and fruits every year. My Dad used to say that my Mom was happiest whenever she was around small children and animals; so we had our share of animals on that small farm, including eighteen cats, before neutering became a household word.

One year I had a science project where I raised "Jerry" and "Lewis," two white rats, by feeding them different diets, and then comparing their performance in a Rat Maze that we constructed. At the completion of the science project, we added the rats to our collection of animals. Jerry, the wiser of the rats, escaped one day and we could not find him anywhere. We just assumed that he had gotten away and discontinued our search. Not long after that, my Mom was feeding our 18 cats on a pizza tray full of cat food and scraps. She looked outside and wondered why the cats were not eating, but just sitting contentedly around the tray. When she went out to investigate, she found the missing rat eating the cat food, while all the cats just sat and watched!

Something that I recollect to this day are two books that I received on my thirteenth birthday. My Dad (1923-2010) presented me with Webster's New World Dictionary. Inside the cover he wrote: "Hope you never run out of words!" My

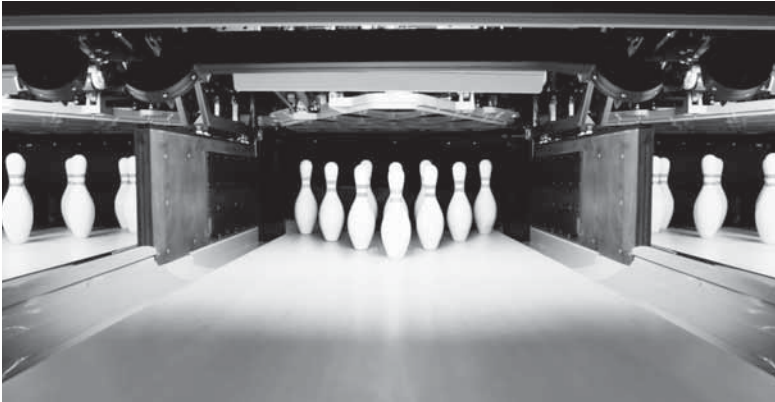

Mom gave me a King James Version of the Holy Bible - Giant Print Reference Edition. As my eyes have grown progressively worse with age, I understand now the wisdom that my Mom had in providing the giant print edition!

It's interesting how my Dad provided me with the "things of this earth," like the dictionary and a roof over my head when growing up; while my Mom gave me "spiritual support," in the form of the Bible and just being there when I needed someone. I'm at peace in my own skin, as the saying goes, because my parents were both great teachers, for which I feel very blessed.

Finally, I give you my Mom's favorite verse in the Bible that just about says it all:

For by grace are you saved through faith;
And that not of yourselves:
It is the gift of God:
Not of works, lest any man should boast.
-Ephesians 2:8-9





Never Shoot a Single Pin Spare Again!

I'll bet you've shot the 10 pin a couple of times in your bowling life and made it. You know where to stand and which ball to roll and what target to use. Still, sometimes you pull it left or plunk it in the ditch, that inexplicable miss where you know you screwed up so you act like you don't care or you hurt your hand or the ball stuck on your thumb – sort of like looking for the hole in your glove after the grounder rolls between your legs to the fence.

You usually make spares like the 6/10 or the 4/7, but occasionally feel like you've never shot them before or worse, like you could chop it all day long (unless you tried to chop it, of course). One of the best ways

I know to stop missing spares is to never shoot one alone. Regardless of what's standing up, you are shooting at something else. Here's how it works:

Let's say you leave a 3 pin. Don't just shoot that lonely 3 pin. Shoot it as though it were the 3/9 or the 3/10. Let's start with the 3/9. You line up and shoot it and hit the right side of the 3 pin. You've made the spare and now you get to slap everybody's hand and take a card to see if you made your full house. In your heart, though, you know it wasn't good enough. It would have missed the 9 pin.

You'll know two wonderful things: if you leave the 3/9, a) you are not lined up to make it and b) you could spare the 3 by itself without moving. So, you earn your slash mark AND get the bonus information of free alignment for other spares.

I'd love to say that, since you hit the right side of the 3, you have discovered where to stand and throw for the 3/10, but that

wouldn't necessarily be true. A shot that hits the right side of the 3 pin might make the 3/10 and might not. It depends on how much influence the 3 pin had on the ball.

You've got to carefully watch that shot at the 3 that missed the imaginary 3/9. Did the ball deflect into the imaginary 10 pin? If not, you have a third piece of information – what not to do for the 3/10. If it did, you're lined up for the 3/10 in case you should leave one.

The same approach (pun intended) is true for all single pin spares. You'll shoot the 4 as if it were the 4/9 or 4/10. If you do that and you hit the 4 pin in the face, you'll know you need to move to make those spares, should you leave them. If you make the imaginary 4/9, you'll know how to move to make the 4/10.

I think you'll be surprised how much easier it is to spare if you exercise your visualization muscles. No matter what pin or combinations of pins you leave, shoot more than you see. The rewards are really high and the method quite painless. Keeping in mind the #1 reason for missed single spares is lack of concentration, you'll really see your conversion percentage increase. 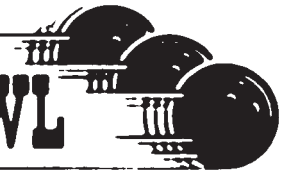

away with wanting to take back any shots. I wanted to be happy with every shot and really stay in the moment."

Both Crawley and Pajak faced visa issues that kept them out of the United States and prevented them from competing during the first part of the 2021 season, and Crawley has used that experience in changing her mindset while competing.

Prior to Saturday's victory, Crawley had recorded four top-10 finishes in her first six events this season, including back-to-back fourth-place finishes at the United States Bowling Congress Queens and PWBA BVL Open.

"My mindset changed when I went back to England in January and was unable to practice for three months," Crawley said. "When I came back to the U.S., I had three weeks to prepare for the PWBA Tour and had no expectations heading into that first event, but I was genuinely so happy to

compete. I love being out here on tour and love bowling, and I haven't been as stressed about making cuts or anything like that. I haven't been thinking about those things because I just want to be here and bowl. I will have to head back to England after the Louisville stop because of my visa, so I'm really happy to be able to bring this trophy back to my parents after next week."

Crawley's run through the ladder almost did not take place, as she entered the final game of qualifying outside of the top four spots. She was able to jump ahead of Alexis Neuer of Milton, Pennsylvania, with a 207 game and hold off a late charge from Valerie Bercier of Muskegon, Michigan, who rolled 267 in the final game.

Crawley was the No. 4 seed with a 5,131 total, with Bercier (5,121) and Neuer (5,120) finishing in fifth and sixth place, respectively.

Pajak, who was looking for her second PWBA Tour title and making her first championship-round appearance of 2021, put together a phenomenal run

on this week's 39-foot condition during the final two rounds of qualifying Saturday to earn the top seed for the stepladder with a 5,166 total.

The 2017 PWBA Rookie of the Year rolled 257 in the final game of the Round of 32 to advance to the final qualifying round in 11th place. She moved from 11th to first in the first five games of the final round and edged O'Keefe by three pins after 24 games to lead qualifying.

O'Keefe, the two-time reigning PWBA Player of the Year, was making her second consecutive championship-round appearance, and third overall, after a runner-up finish at last week's PWBA Albany Open.

The 14-time PWBA Tour titlist finished her semifinal match against Crawley with four consecutive strikes, starting in the eighth frame, followed by a nine-count on her fill ball, to force her to knock over nine pins in the final frame to advance. Crawley struck on her first delivery in the 10th frame to deny O'Keefe

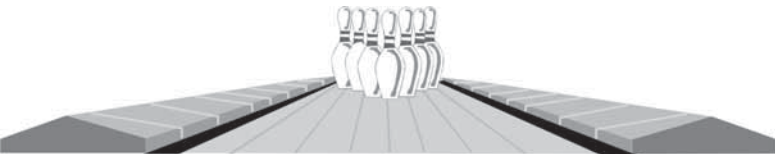

The 84-year-old right-hander entered the 2021 Open Championships needing 2,222 pins to reach 100,000, so it's only fitting for the milestone to happen in 2022 when the tournament returns to Las Vegas and the South Point Bowling Plaza, one of Mueller's favorite venues.

Mueller inched closer to his next goal of 100,000 pins this week at South Point with sets of 489 in team, 472 in singles and 416 in doubles for a 1,377 all-events total.

Through 60 years, his career pinfall stands at 99,155, for a career average of 183.6.

He'll enter the 2022 Open Championships 845 pins from the next coveted plateau.

Illinois bowler leads Classified All-Events in Las Vegas

For the first time since 2008, Michael Martinez of Cicero, Illinois, participated in the USBC Open Championships, and while his initial goal simply was to have an enjoyable trip with his friends and family, his focus now will shift to keeping an eye on the event's online leaderboards.

The 32-year-old right hander posted sets of 646 in team, 610 in singles and 544 in doubles, and a late-falling 9 pin on his final shot netted him the first 1,800 total in the Classified Division since 2014, along with the lead in Classified All-Events.

Martinez's 1,800 was the best performance of his four tournament appearances by more than 150 pins and bested Austin Eastman of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, who previously held the lead this year with 1,758.

Reigning Classified Doubles champions Amber Piper and Eric Cooke of Buckeye, Arizona, also will return to the South Point Bowling Plaza, where they claimed their Eagles in 2019 with a 1,135 total.

They'll be recognized before their team squad July 3 at 3 p.m. Eastern, and they'll hit the lanes at the South Point Bowling Center on July 4 at 4:45 p.m. EDT to see if they can find success together in the Standard Division.

Standard Doubles is for teams with combined entering tournament averages of 311-350, while Classified Doubles features teams with combined averages of 310 and below.

On July 6 at 7 p.m. Eastern, Ray Hall of Valley Center, Kansas, will add his name to the list of bowlers who have participated in the Open Championships 50 times.

Hall, 77, will be the 19th bowler this year to reach the plateau. His tournament debut came at the 1968 event in Cincinnati.

Howard Goodrich of Royal Center, Indiana, took the lanes for his 50th appearance the afternoon of June 29 and will be featured in next week's Glance.

Bowling Update

From Ten Pins & More

* Rio Rancho High School squeaked out a close win Friday for their eighth NMAA State 5-A bowling title at Tenpins & More, beating Volcano Vista by 17 pins in the three-game championship match.

The six schools, put together at short notice of a month (instead of the usual October-February time frame), did well and some youth shared more than \$ 13,000 in scholarship funds for graduating seniors and high scorers on the day.

In qualifying rounds, Rio Rancho got the number one seed, with 2,604, ahead of Volcano Vista on 2,562, Cleveland 2,506, followed by La Cueva, Manzano and Las Cruces. The "Storm" had high team game with 949 at an average of 189.8 pins per bowler.

In the next round, in which the five team members bowl two frames each to complete a game, the Rams, under long-time head coach, Dana Miller-Mackie,

extended their lead with strings of 179, 203, 213 and 212 to 187 pins over the Hawks who bowled 159, 171, 172 and 160.

The top four then bowled a further three games, with Rio Rancho adding 176, 169 and 216 for a 22-game total of 3,972, leading Volcano Vista 3,780, with Cleveland finishing third on 3,626 and the La Cueva Bears fourth with 3,355.

In the grand final, contested on lanes "socially distanced" from one another, it couldn't have been much closer with Rio Rancho scoring 204, 205 and 193 (602) with only four errors compared to 192, 205, 188 (585) and five errors from the runners-up, who have, on paper, a very strong team, losing no seniors to next season..

Overall, the Rio Rancho squad of seven averaged 182.9 over 25 games, boosted by their last three rounds where adhesive team play is most important. Members were Anthony Kohman, Konnor Havens, Jesus Prieto, J D Messenger (whose 648 was high series for the boys), Alex Thompson, Jordan Weber and captain, Kara Thompson, with 616 high series for the girls.

* Kyle Pearce hit a "purple

patch" of scoring in Sunday's round of play in the Sport Singles League at Tenpins & More. At certain points, Pearce strung 13 and 14 strikes in a row, spread over two games.

His series of 1,054 comprised 258, 239, 299 and 258, a personal best for the Rio Ranchoan.

* Dean Marie and Felecia Padilla won Sunday's Doubles Marathon at Tenpins & More, a long wait as the event was originally scheduled last Thanksgiving Eve, only to be deferred until now due to the lengthy Bowling Center closure by the state as a result of the pandemic.

Padilla, a 130 average league bowler rolled 172 in one of her matches that helped her and Marie to a 7-1 match-play record and an outright win in the 22-team field.

Marie fired eight consecutive 200 plus games, the only bowler to do so, during the five-hour contest. His games were 224, 239, 227, 216, 227, 269, 206 and 215 for an average of 227.9, a personal best.

Four teams tied for second through fifth on 6-2 records, broken by a ninth game tie-breaker. Father/son Kenneth and Karlten Friedrich, shot 376 for second place ahead of Kelly and Billy Grant 368 third, then Bobbie Vega/Dan Brenning 296 in fourth followed by Vanessa Correa and Roan Carrillo fifth with 294.

Six teams, with 5-3 records, played off for sixth, seventh and eighth place prize-money, led by Tiana Martinez and Bob Peterson 464 with Peterson contributing 267, followed by improving Francine Vallo and Aaron Johnson 423, then Kassi and Joe Romero on 381.

* Local bowlers have the first of three opportunities to win paid entry in to this year's \$ 55,000 New Mexico Open in a qualifier at Tenpins & More on Sunday June 27, starting at 9.30 am. The other two are set for August 1 and August 15.

Entries for the 17th edition are at a record level, with still seven weeks prior to the August 20-22 tournament.
