We made our visit to Jr Gold as the parents of athlete last month. This year the event was in Indianapolis, IN, and 3100+ kids participated.

Our daughter, Tori, is 13 and competed in the U15 girl's division and finished in the top 3rd. Definitely exceeded our expectations and probably hers

The other youths we travelled with, Madison Damer and Ryan Burgess, were also bowling in their first Jr. Gold and did really well for their rookie attempt.

As always, I was very impressed with the overall talent of the youth bowlers and the sheer numbers of kids that participated.

The USBC and all of the volunteers do an amazing job ensuring that the event runs smooth, there were zero hiccups that I witnessed, and that is very rare these days.

One takeaway for me was the size of every bowling center we went in to. They are all HUGE up there, 80 lanes plus. There was even one center that was out in the corn fields, also 80 lanes, amazing that the area can support bowling centers

that big. There was a lot of conversation amongst the parents on this topic, something you don't see much of in other cities it appears.

We don't have ONE center in DFW that big, let alone eight that big.

Another big observation is again with the parents. My assumption going into this tournament was that the parents would be potentially loud, abrasive, and strong handed with their kids. Making sure that they gave them lots and lots of coaching and guidance from the sidelines. That's the type of behavior I see on volleyball and softball fields, but at the Jr. Gold...not the case at all.

I had heard some horror stories about how it can be for the kids, but I didn't see that from the parents at all. Very refreshing and honestly cool to see. I think a big part of it is because in today's youth bowling world, not all of the top players came from a bowling family like my generation did.

The parents aren't breathing down the kid's necks, because the kids know much more about bowling than their parents. Who would have thought that would be the case?

Now Genie and I...yeah, we kinda breath down Tori's neck, I will try and get better.

Last point...the lane conditions are still way too tough across the board. That is a conversation for another day, but I can't be convinced differently.

We finished off our whirlwind trip to Indianapolis with a detour to Iowa for a memorial service for Genie's grandfather, who passed away in November at 97 years old.

As we left Indy on Thursday morning, we drove past corn fields as you might imagine and we continued to drive past corn fields for the next 9 hours until we got just north of Des

Through bowling, I think I have driven just about everywhere across this great country, but clearly, I have not made this path much. It was corn fields as far as the eye could see for a day and a half.

We visited Clinton, IA for a Single A baseball game, the Clinton Lumber Kings, on our way to a destination I have wanted to visit since 1988...the Field of Dreams.

I saw the movie when I was 16 years old with my good friend Rene Asprion and fell in love with it right away. I've seen the movie a million times and always get emotional at the end when Ray asks his 'ghost' dad to have a catch.

To be able to drive right up to it, in rural Iowa, was pretty special and something I will always remember.

Tori got to hit some balls, Genie shagged. Tori got to pitch some off the mound and at the end we got to have a catch. It was a pretty special moment that was 33 years in the making.

Just one more time when bowling allowed us to have a great family moment.



the tournament. The victory is Tackett's 14th PBA Tour title and McEwan's sixth PWBA Tour title.

With 20 games bowled by each player in the event, Tackett and McEwan accumulated a +1,279 score over 40 total games to secure a 212-pin margin over second-place François Lavoie and Tannya Roumimper.

This is the second win for Tackett in the Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles, also claiming the title in 2018 with Liz Johnson. In 2019, Tackett also competed alongside Johnson while McEwan teamed with Anthony Simonsen. Johnson and Simonsen were

set to compete together in 2020 due to Tackett and McEwan having a conflicting event, but both events were canceled. This year, the foursome opted to stick with the new lineups and claimed two of the top three spots, with Johnson and Simonsen finishing third.

Also making the top eight were Wes Malott and Verity Crawley, Tommy Jones and Shannon Pluhowsky, Chris Via and Bryanna Coté, Jakob Butturff and Stefanie Johnson, and Richie Teece and Liz Kuhlkin.

The win moves Tackett into the lead in the PBA Summer Tour points race through two events. At the conclusion of all five Summer Tour events, the player with the most competition points will receive \$20,000 from the \$40,000 bonus prize fund. The top 10 players will get a share, depending on their final position, of the prize fund.



2021 PWBA Tour Season Set to Resume, Location Determined for Fall Classic Series

ARLINGTON, Texas – The first half of the 2021 Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour season was filled with amazing stories, historic performances and the emergence of new stars, and the action is set to resume this week for the next swing on the schedule.

The Professional Bowlers Association/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles event will get things underway from July 29 - Aug. 1 at Houston's Copperfield Bowl and be followed by the PWBA Summer Classic Series from Aug. 2-10 at the International Training and Research Center in Arlington.

The PWBA Tour then will head to the Pacific Northwest for the PWBA Spokane Open at Lilac Lanes & Casino in Spokane, Washington, from Aug. 19-21, before competition in August concludes with the U.S. Women's Open, the final major of the 2021 season.

The U.S. Women's Open will

The U.S. Women's Open will take place at Double Decker Lanes in Rohnert Park, California, from Aug. 24-31.

For the final events on the 2021 schedule, the PWBA Tour will return to the National Bowling Stadium in Reno, Nevada, and the 78-lane venue will host the PWBA Fall Classic Series from Oct. 24-30. The NBS also hosted the United States Bowling Congress Queens in May.

The 2021 PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles will begin with the event's official practice sessions Thursday, before competition gets underway Friday with the first of four qualifying squads, beginning at 9 a.m. Eastern.

Each mixed doubles team will bowl seven qualifying games to determine which teams advance to Sunday's semifinal round, which will feature five additional games. The top eight teams will advance to round-robin match play, with total pinfall, including bonus pins, determining this year's champions.

Every round of the 2021 PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles will be broadcast live by FloBowling and simulcast to

The Summer Classic Series will feature three national tour stops and one regional tournament during the event's nineday run at the home of Team USA. said. "Having some of that inside knowledge pays off. That saves you 10-pins here or 20-pins there."

That valuable information made him feel relaxed on the lanes while also bowling in front of his wife, Lynda and son, Ryan. Plus, his Storm Axiom Pearl allowed him to take advantage of his rev rate while blending out the wet-dry pattern.

Barnes faced No. 5 seed Bob Learn Jr. in the third match. Learn, who defeated Steven Smith 192-152 in the first match and beat John Marsala 226-216 in the second match, rolled his best game as he was climbing the stepladder. But his 248 wasn't enough as Barnes started with the front nine then left a 7-pin on his way to a 279

In the championship match, Barnes faced Pete Weber who dominated the field in match play earlier in the day. Weber opened with a split in the first frame followed by five-in-a-row, before leaving a costly 7-10 in the seventh frame. Barnes had just one strike in his first five frames while staying clean and was down by 30-pins.

That's when an important coaching moment changed Barnes' fate. Ryan noticed his dad was getting a little bit forward in his second step. Once he relayed that information to his dad, Barnes went through his process on the next shot and realized Ryan was right.

"Dang, I am going to hate telling him that," he jokes. "He coached me up in the middle and that was right before that string of seven strikes there at the end. So, there is no doubt he had a little impact on the outcome today."

Barnes did have a little bit of a hiccup during that string of strikes in the ninth frame. He took a step off the approach and had to refocus. He was planning to make a move based of his shot in the seventh frame, but he hadn't fully committed to the adjustment, plus he didn't get his thumb all the way in the ball the way he wanted to.

"It was too important of a spot to throw a bad one or an undecided one, so I just reset, committed to what I was doing and just got my hand in the ball the right way," he said. "Then things went pretty well."

He went on to defeat Weber 247-224 to get his first PBA50 Title in just his fourth event of the year.

"Winning never gets old," he said. "It felt like I bowled

More than 2,900 United **States Bowling Congress Youth** members competed across six centers in the Indianapolis area in an attempt to take home part of the largest scholarship fund in tournament history (\$502,100), make their run at the coveted titles and earn spots on Junior Team USA.

BowlTV.com livestreamed competition throughout qualifying and the double-elimination brackets from four of the six centers, along with Saturday's stepladder finals.

With the finals in each division being broadcast by BowlTV, the top overall seed for the stepladder had to be defeated twice in the true double-elimination format.

Hamman captured the U18 title with a 225-163 win against Victoria Varano of Stony Point, New York.

She made it clear during the title match why she had earned the top seed for the stepladder finals. Hamman was in control from start to finish, locking in on the pocket from the very first shot and never making mistakes Varano could capital-

Hamman started with a pair of doubles in her first five frames and stayed clean to go up by 23 pins halfway through the game. Varano stayed clean and tried to stay in the match, but a 1-2-4-6-10 combination in the eighth frame allowed Hamman to close out the victory.

"I really try to keep my eyes down and not really pay attention to what my opponent is doing, but it's hard to do that in a setting like this, with the

crowd and everything," Hamman said. "I sort of knew I'd won when I stepped up for my ninth frame. Still, I just tried to close it out and make my shots.

Hamman's ability to make those shots and come away victorious was thanks in large part to a solid game plan established during practice.

"My plan coming in was to play the gutter and just roll the ball, because that would keep me away from splits," Hamman said. "Junior Gold is always such a demanding and mentally exhausting tournament, but it's worth it. Even if I hadn't won, it would still be worth it. I'm just really happy right now. This is surreal.'

Varano, who made the stepladder and finished third in the U15 division at the 2019 Junior Gold Championships, earned the right to take on Hamman for the title after she got past Elena Carr of Hilton, New York, 211-168, during the opening match.

Carr was in the pocket throughout the match, but poor pin carry allowed Varano to get ahead and stay ahead. After she connected for a four consecutive strikes in frames five through eight, she had locked Carr out and secured her position in the championship match.

Bohn defeated Edgar Burgos of St. Charles, Illinois, in a battle of previous Junior Gold champions, 232-200, to win the U18 title in the boys division.

Bohn captured the 2017 U12 title, while Burgos won the U12 trophy in 2016.

The U18 division featured 558 girls and 1,166 boys at the 2021 event.

Six boys and six girls from the U18 division also earned spots on Junior Team USA for 2022 based on their performances this week at the Junior Gold Championships.

The boys team will feature Bohn, Jordan Malott of Austin. Texas; Zach Greim of Poway, California; Spencer Robarge of Springfield, Missouri; Brandon Bonta of Wichita, Kansas; and Solomon Salama of Beverly Hills, California.

Hamman and Varano will be joined on the girls team in 2022 by Jillian Martin of Stow, Ohio; Amanda Naujokas of Ronkonkoma, New York; Annalise OBryant of Ball Ground, Georgia; and Lyndsay Ennis of Conway, South Carolina.

Around the time of The Luci in late July, more formally known these days as the PBA/ PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles at Copperfield Bowl in Houston, there seems to be a handful of players competing who have gone through their own very serious health issues. Two of the three players you'll read about shortly with their latest update are or have bowled The Luci before and have had their stories told in prior JPA's.

Earlier this year, I profiled the USBC Open Championships Eagle presentation to Jenny Wonders, winner of the Standard Division All Events crown at the 2019 tournament. Her dad Rich won five Eagles in the 1980's and enshrinement into the USBC Hall of Fame in 1990. With her win, the Wonders became the first father and daughter Eagle winners in Open Championships history.

First, here's more detail about Wonders. In 1995 at age

11, Wonders was diagnosed with systemic lupus, a disorder where autoantibodies attack healthy tissue, resulting in debilitating fatigue, very painful joints, high fevers, and blisters in her mouth, throat and esophagus.

In 2007, there was a deep vein blood clot (DVT) in her leg, traveling to her lung, becoming a pulmonary embolism. In 2009 while dealing with a broken left foot, she developed an infection around her left elbow as a result of having a lowered immune system from the lupus medication. After an MRI Wonders requested, the infection was worse than originally thought. It got into the muscle and the bone, putting her in the hospital for nine days over the course of the next 3 weeks to receive IV antibiotics. There was also a chance she could have lost her left arm due to the severity of the elbow infection.

If that MRI had been done as originally scheduled six days later, she may have lost the arm if she had lived that long.

Another DVT was caught before becoming a pulmonary embolism in 2012. As a result, Wonders gives herself a shot of a blood thinner twice a day and will for the rest of her life.

In April 2010, she contracted a flesh-eating bacterial infection (necrotizing fasciitis) which resulted in emergency surgery to remove a portion of her right calf. That was worth sixteen more hospital days, three in the ICU, and going home wearing a wound vacuum needing three weekly hospital trips to have the sponge changed. She even bowled the Open Championships in Reno in 2010 while wearing that wound vacuum.




It was after surgery on the leg infection that her surgeon gave Wonders a stunning statistic. Seventy percent of healthy young adults actually die from this type of flesh-eating infection, necrotizing fasciitis, while half of those remaining 30% who survive lose a limb. Then came those words from the surgeon looking at her directly after waking up from surgery.

"I can't tell you why you're not dead, because everything we know about medicine says you should be.'

Hearing that at any point in life is a huge shock, but at age 25 is a whole other thing. Then in August of 2010, she had a skin graft harvesting skin from the top of her right thigh to cover up the spot on her calf where tissue was removed during the April 2010 surgery. During her time wearing the wound vacuum, she managed to break for a second time not one, but both of her feet and bend the screws that had been surgically placed in late 2009 and early 2010. Once the leg was completely healed up from the skin graft surgery, she went in first to replace the bent screw in her left foot in November of 2010, then had the identical surgery done on her right foot in December of 2010. In case you're keeping track, that's a total of 6 surgeries in a span of roughly 16 months (from August 2009 - December



PBA Strike Derby Still Did Not Impress

While everyone should be thankful for what Bowlero and iStar have done for bowling in the past few years (and we are!), the one event that falls short for me is the PBA Strike Derby. Following last year's inaugural run of the Strike Derby, my comments were not completely favorable as the format seemed to be replacing the quality of shot-making with quantity of shots.

It's interesting that here in New Jersey the casual, or open play bowlers, have become more concerned in the past couple of years with the number of rolls of the ball that they can get, rather than their ultimate score, as they continue to roll balls and hit sweeps, and walk down the middle of the lane to retrieve a ball. A deskman at one of the local bowling centers calls it "speed bowling." Another calls it "bowlers run amok."

Could the Strike Derby be one of the causes of this new phenomenon? It certainly does resemble the New Jersey "speed bowlers," complete with bowlers hiding other bowler's equipment, and rolling balls at different speeds.

Last year Kris Prather impressed me when he commented, "I really emphasized quality over quantity and it worked to my advantage." What happened to him this year? He seemed to fall into the same "speed bowling" trap that has captured most of the competitors. However, there were a couple of notable exceptions in the event this year that commented on quality of shot-making, rather than quantity.

One was Andrew Anderson, the eventual winner of this year's \$25,000 first prize. Did anyone else notice that the prize money was just casually alluded to near the end of the telecast, and not even mentioned in the PBA news release? It took me about an hour of online research before finding the first place prize of \$25,000 even mentioned, on the unofficial wikipedia.org site. Even fans at the bottom of the PBA release were asking about the first place prize; and the overall prize list, because

they are tracking Kyle Troup's assault on earnings of \$500,000 in one year.

You could tell that Anderson had actually done his homework and practiced this 2-minute drill in the off season. One of his methods that was most impressive was how he jogged backwards to the ball return, in order to see the reaction of the bowling ball upon the lane and striking the pins. All of the other competitors seemed to be obsessed with releasing the ball, and then immediately turning around and running to the adjoining ball return to throw their next shot.

The other bowler that practiced quality over quantity was Norm Duke, perhaps because of his age rather than any specific game plan. At 57 years of age, Norm appeared to be winded after each round and even commented that he "was spent" at the end of his session with Andrew. "I know when I started, my very first shot (in the second round), I was spent," said Duke. "My ball was going down there at half speed and I was just struggling." Duke was also the only one of the group that looked down at the approach to set his feet in a particular position, rather than relying on instinct, as noted by commentator Randy Pedersen.

In an interview on the approach with former Miss USA Kimberly Pressler, Anderson confided that he had been practicing the 2-minute drill and found that the optimal number of throws for him was eighteen, before the quality of his shots was affected. He did seem very much at home during the 2-minute drill, as though this was something that he had been doing for much of his life... most likely while growing up at the Holly Bowling Lanes in Holly, Michigan.

The Home Run Derby and the Slam Dunk Contest have tweaked their competition over the years and in most instances have made them better. Before the images of "speed bowling" become embedded in beginning bowler's minds; with machines that cannot spot pins on time, and bowlers that are not concerned with where they

position themselves on the approach, the following suggestions are made for next year's contest:

- Maximum of 12 shots in 120 seconds (consider on one lane, rather than two).
- 6 or more strikes in a row = an additional 60 seconds, and an additional 6 shots.
- Round begins when the ball is released from the bowlers hand on the first shot.

Either Colie Edison has been reading my editorials and acting upon my suggestions the past few years, or we are just on the same wave length when it comes to marketing a product, since this writer once held her position when AMF was a significant, but much smaller operator of bowling centers. Now the CEO of the PBA, Colie is in a position to address the changes that have been suggested for next year's event. The bowling industry, and Bowlero in particular, have come too far, and we certainly do not want to set a "speed bowling" example for new bowlers to emulate.

to feeling. I don't think anyone gave you a bad fit on purpose. It's not a conspiracy. Maybe it was a great fit at the time you had it done. Maybe you gained or lost a couple of pounds. Have it checked. You can get used to a change that means no pain and better results. Calluses and arm bands and elbow pain and "Just stop the bleeding, coach, and put me back in" are not the way it is supposed to be in this, for the most part, non-contact

Not Checking the Approaches

The only thing worse than not checking approaches is checking them the wrong way, like starting at the back of the approach and running up to the line to see if you can slide.

Well, duh. What if you can't? As soon as you recover consciousness out by the arrows, you'll figure there has to be a better way. Some people even do a sprint from the back of the approach with a ball in their hand! That really warrants an ambulance ride.

Here's how to do it the right and safe way: Get about four feet back from the foul line and check your slideability. Be sure to do these four things:

- Keep your trailing foot on the floor in case you can't slide or slide too much. It's your anchor:
- Slide forward with your whole body - don't check with just your toe as if you were sticking it in the ocean;
- Checking the areas to the left and right of center serves a dual purpose. Those two areas are where you'll be sliding for left and right side spares as well as in use when you get to play the ditch or to play deep.
- Do these things on both

Add in periodic lupus flare ups, arthroscopic surgery on her left hip in 2014 in hopes of delaying what will be an inevitable total hip replacement, the broken left fifth metatarsal for a third time in the left foot (which did not require surgery that time), two separate bouts with kidney stones, a change in pain management medication due to new Federal Drug Administration (FDA) regulations on opioids. For ten years, she took oxycodone daily that was prescribed by her pain management doctor to combat severe joint pain caused by lupus.

Three years ago, her oxycodone prescription was abruptly cut off, yet given nothing to replace it. Doctors told her only massages and acupuncture would combat the withdrawal of opioids while also controlling her pain, the only problem being medical insurance did not pay for those services and having been unable to work for 6 years at that point, were not possible financially. The disruption to her body caused more lupus flare ups which only recently are subsiding.

Amanda Vermilyea has also had and continues to battle a couple of potentially life-

threatening issues, as detailed by Gianmarc Manzione in the January 2021 Bowlers Journal International, besides here in JPA some years ago.

The former Team USA member and two-time national champion Nebraska Cornhusker returned to the PWBA Tour earlier this year, making the Round of 12.

After spinal fusion surgery eleven years ago to address a rare spinal condition resulting in seizures and migraines leaving minimal movement of her neck, there was a 2014 surgery to remove a brain tumor. A June 2016 video reposted recently on her Facebook page showed her tossing a 10-pound ball, bowling for the first time in three and a half years. With 14-pound equipment in 2019, Vermilyea finished fifth in Diamond Division All Events at the USBC Women's Championships.

February 2020 presented the latest issue. According to Vermilyea, the slow growing tumor was not completely removed because part of it was in the part of the brain controlling speech. A grid was put on her brain to map seizures to see if the seizures were caused by the tumor. It will be watched the rest of her life.

Besides the PWBA Twin Cities Open cash, she also made the cut the USBC Queens, finishing 59th. Vermilyea's

most recent tourney will be with doubles partner Tom Smallwood at The Luci and was inducted into the Minnesota State USBC Hall of Fame in

Another bowler achieving success despite serious health issues Chelsea Gilliam, head women's bowling coach of Bethune-Cookman University. As I profiled here in TBN after her 2018 Luci appearance and in the January 2019 Bowlers Journal International, a 2012 NAIA national champion with the University of Pikeville, Gilliam was diagnosed with Stage 0 breast cancer the following year. An updated diagnosis in 2016 showed Stage 4 as cells spread to her left femur.

After the latest six rounds of chemotherapy from October 2020 to January 2021, subsequent lost hair, and numerous scans for new cancer spots, her latest scan is in two months. Everything has been stable for the last year.

What these three women have been through is a huge testament to what will power and what we used to call 'sheer guts' can produce. There are other words I could use, but this is a family publication.

I'd like to thank each of these ladies for allowing me to share their stories here in TBN.

17th annual tournament offers \$ 55,000 prize-fund

The 17th New Mexico Open, to be held at Tenpins & More in Rio Rancho from August 20-22 has added a \$ 20,000 car for the first 300 game bowled in the four-person championship round.

The highest game bowled in the tournament's first 16 years was bowled by Craig Nidiffer of Michigan, whose 285 beat Mike Edwards' 242 in his win in 2014.

'We are thrilled to be able to have local car dealership, Pitre Kia/Buick/GMC sponsor this unique opportunity", said tournament director, Steve Mackie.

As well, this year's winner will receive at least \$ 10,500 from an estimated purse of more than \$ 55,000, based on 192 entries, less than when Coloradan Hall-of-Famer, Duane Mellinger who beat Utah's Steve Kloempken 461-423 in the two-game match in 2019.

"The pandemic not only caused postponement of the 2020 contest until now, but also cost us some sponsors who unfortunately lost their businesses due to the lengthy closures by the state", said Mackie.

It seems likely that the the event could break the entry record of 217 set seven years ago, as there are already more than 200 sign-ups. A maximum field is 240 that would see prize-money

\$ 64,000, with a prize ratio of 1:4.

Entry fee remains at \$ 270. much less than most regional and national tournaments in the US and overseas.

The NMO will be live over the internet by Emil Williams whose www.BowlStreamTV.com

is presenting it's fifth year of 30 hours of coverage that includes comments and questions for the commentators. In 2019, there were more than 33,000 views.

The roster includes many professional bowlers, Team USA members, collegiate players and "weekend warriors" from a record 20 states and Canada.

Francois Lavoie, a regular here and runner-up in 2015, has confirmed his entry. He's already a two-time major winner on this season's Professional Bowlers Association tour.

The tournament features an eight game qualifying round in squads on August 20 & 21 followed on August 22 by a 32-person bracket double elimination until only four remain for the finals on Sunday afternoon.

Since the main event started in 2004, total prize-money of more than \$656,000 has been won by over 400 different bowlers.

It is bowled on a "sport" lane condition, created by former PBA National champion, Mike Miller. Typically a 199 average cashes, with a 205 -208 mark enough to make the finals.

This time in a strong field of 63 bowlers and for a stellar prize-fund of more than \$ 4,000, bolstered by Hammer bowling equipment and Shamrock Foods.

It was an exciting, somewhat nerve-wracking five matches for Skidmore who won all by an average margin of less than ten pins per game.

Along the way he beat Mike

Riley 246-244, Diego Lucero 194-188 and Zach Harvey 236-224 before sending Michael De Vore of Santa Fe to the loser's bracket 239-226.

De Vore battled his way back to the championship round with a decisive 240-196 win over DeeRonn Booker, but lost another close one to Skidmore 211-225 after missing a split conversion in the eighth frame.

Skidmore earned \$ 1,000, De Vore \$ 500 and Booker \$ 400. Highest-averaging Harvey at 239.75 was next for \$ 325, having to retire with an injured, bloody thumb after shooting 269, 245, 224 and 221.
